NEW BUSINESS:

A. Request to Approve and Accept a Park Bench Located in Joaquin Miller Park in Memory of Marj Saunders: The staff report for this item was presented by Dana Riley for the Office of Parks and Recreation. Ms. Corinne Saunders contacted staff requesting approval to donate a park bench and plaque in memory of her late grandmother, Marj Saunders. The bench will be located in Joaquin Miller Park. Marj Saunders was an active volunteer and logged 60 years of civic contributions. The plaque would read: Dedicated in loving memory to Marj Saunders, family matriarch, friend of the community, guardian of animals, Oakland Hill advocate and hero to all. "If something needs to be done, just get in and do it." May 9, 1909 to April 21, 2010. The family will bare the cost for the bench and its installation.

Request from Phat Beets-Produce, Healthy Hearts Clinic, and Dover Neighborhood Group For Approval of Dover Park Garden Project: The staff report was presented by Sarah Herbelin, Community Gardening and Boating Supervisor with the Office of Parks and Recreation. The Office of Parks and Recreation received a proposal from Phat Beets Produce, Healthy Hearts Clinic, and Dover Park Neighborhood Group (Non-profit organizations - NPO's)) to create an edible garden inside the perimeter of Dover Park for the neighborhood and Healthy Hearts Clinic to grow food and educate patients, families and the surrounding community about healthy food. The NPO's submitted a proposal to OPR in 2010 to implement the community garden which included phase I consisting of a small vegetable garden and a desire for a phase II including the addition of fruit tree. OPR approved phase I of the project without a condition use permit (CUP) because the project was consistent with the use of the park. In the spring of 201, without consultation or notice to OPR, the NPO's initiated the phase II expansion including the planting of 30 fruit trees, the creation of a mural and scarecrow art piece, the installation of a community notice board and open compost bed. Staff requested and received an updated phase II portion of the

proposal which included desired changes and maintenance plans. Staff drafted a partner agreement that would solidify the Dover Park partnership. According to the NPO's, the staff recommendations include; a community board be approved a part of the Dover Park Project for as long as it is maintained by the NPO's; the open 2 bin compost be replaced by a 3 bin component; the expansion of the edible garden into the western part of the park be limited to plantings that do not disturb existing landscaping and irrigations needs be obtained by using the existing system; NOP's maintain fruit trees approved for the project; line of site concerning 7 trees planted on the eastern Dover Street perimeter between the two entry gates (between the sidewalk and playground) and the two avocado trees planted in the southwestern oval, in front of the path, be removed. It was also recommended that PRAC determine if a minor conditional use permit -MCUP should be required due to the extensive nature of the changes made to and proposed for Dover Park. An update to the written report included the Public Arts Advisory Committee's suggestion that PRAC make a recommendation on the mural and scarecrow art pieces prior to the NPO's submission to the PAC. Staff will draft a report on the art pieces for the July meeting.

Members of the community addressed the Commission. Presenter for Phat Beets a non profit organization - NPO and Dover Street neighbor: Sited confusion over the initial agreement due to the number of departments involved. The NPO's were under the impression that approval was given to plant trees on the perimeter of the park. The group submitted a new proposal but did not have the opportunity to review staff recommendation to PRAC. The speaker asserted that they were not aware of the concerns until after the report was filed.

Presenter for Dover Park Neighborhood Group and Park Steward:

Approximately 2 years ago, members of the local community were asked by the local district council representative to a meeting at city hall and to become a participant in the maintenance of their local park given the budget deficit. The partnership between Phat Beets, the Healthy Hearts Clinic and the neighborhood was considered a good match. It was assumed that work and effort was approved by the City of Oakland. It was asserted that the PRAC had a clear choice; support the effort that supports the development of all the proposed elements or follow the recommendation of city staff to reduce the scale of the project and risk the return of the previous condition of the park's perimeter.

Handouts were provided depicting 1993 images of the site as a vacant lot. Due to budget constraints, the community's recommendation to build and design a community garden then was discouraged. The process and having to come before the PRAC was sited to be the cause of tension for the group. No paper trail or staff report for this process has been made available. A meeting was scheduled to discuss the issues regarding the project but was believed to be cancelled by the local council representative. The park was completed in 2005 at a cost of approximately \$560.00 and is 6 years old. The speaker suggested that only one corner of the garden was to be planted with vegetables and after approval, fruit trees would be planted along the westerly wall. 40k cars pass the site per day and is the perfect place where Children's Hospital could support a community garden.

Presenters — Chief-of-Staff-for Councilmember Jane Brunner: The council's office became involved with Phat Beets and the neighboring community to create a community garden within Dover Park. The speaker agreed that the process became confusing. Council's office and the Office of Parks and Recreation also agreed that a good process would be to present the matter before the PRAC. The Councilmember's office supports this process and staff recommended to allow the plan to continue in a reasonable manner. The agreement between the volunteers and the city is important.

The opinions of the people who live near to and use the park should be considered rather than those who live further away and are used to making decisions. The 400 signatures collected showing support for the park shows the local commitment. The garden is being harvested by families who need the support of sustainable food systems. The garden has created a safer neighborhood. Good urban gardens ensure that

neighbors are connected to each other and nature. Children in Oakland are struggling with childhood obesity, food security and health food access. There must be a commitment to making healthy food choices available to everyone and we must think outside the box appropriate bathroom facilities and lighting must be added to the park. The park is unsafe. Inappropriate trees must be removed. The mural should be protected and more information should be given about the artist. The park can be made to look better. Edibles are good but flowering plants and none edibles will add beauty. Fences should be placed better. Edibles are good but flowering plants and none edibles will add beauty. The park. The around the vegetable bed. A system needs to be put in place to direct the management of the park. The park is a great gathering place for the area and is a model for Oakland and the county. Site lines, security and use for everyone are important.

The PRAC is supportive of community gardening. Every city park allows for community gardening with a minor conditional use permit. This process is in place due to the community demand for various uses of city parks. Following the process does not mean that the PRAC is anti community gardening. The process allows the Commission to determine if the design can be improved or made safer - such as the line of site issue based on the placement of trees on the front fence.

There was a discussion regarding the feasibility of moving the trees elsewhere in the park in order to address staffs concerns of line of sight issues and if the health of the trees could be preserved. Phat Beets asserted that the trees were planted with consideration of the site line and that they would be pruned to within a skirt of 7ft to accommodate this safety issue. According to Phat Beets' licensed arborist, within a skirt of 7ft to accommodate the trees at their full size without removing the city's landscaping and it is not possible to accommodate the trees at their full size without removing the city's landscaping and the center of the park is reserved for green space. Moving the trees is not an option.

Upon inquiry by the Commission, it was determined that staff did not have the opportunity to fully review the community proposal and it was suggested that the issue be held over to the July meeting.

The initial phase I proposal including changing beds within an existing planting area and was considered under the design and review process. This occurred without issue. Regarding phase II, part of the proposal was to continue planting, this included trees. City departments were consulted, however, the Office of was to continue planting, this included. A conditional use permit would have been recommended had OPR Parks and Recreation was excluded. A conditional use permit would have been recommended had OPR been consulted prior to implementation of phase II. Staff requested PRAC to approve Phase I and then consider any recommendations to the changes in phase II, including the tree plantings or other parts of consider any recommendations to the changes in phase II, including the PRAC. The art pieces will be phase II. The conditional use permit issue should also be brought before the PRAC. The art pieces will be presented before the PRAC and the Public Arts Commission. Phase II, included planting of the trees was part of the original proposal and it was stated that this phase would take place if all parties were in agreement with the direction of the park. The cost of a conditional use permit is approximately \$2,900.00. Staff clarified that as part of the draft agreement, food raised in the park would not be sold.

Upon review of the process, the Commission determined that all parties were not in agreement and that the process of implementing phase II of the community garden process was not followed and that is it not reasonable to ask the PRAC to approve the project given the fact.

Community members asserted that PWA staff agreed to planting trees along the perimeter.

A Commissioner expressed concern that the requirement of the MCUP is an issue given that parties involved went to PWA and received approval and should be considered while moving forward.

**Director's Comments:** The Office Parks and Recreations OPR has been supportive of the community garden project at the Dover Street Park from the beginning and organized a tour of the park for the Commission. This is not and should not be an adversarial process. Organizers of the project claimed they were given a verbal agreement by PWA staff to continue the project beyond phase I. OPR can not control these actions or be held accountable for them. Fees can not be waived for the minor or major conditional

use permits, nor is OPR in the position to absorb the cost given the \$58mil budget deficit and the budget cuts faced by the department. The Director extended an apology to all organizers and community members regarding the misinformation they received from other departments. The Director asserted that OPR will follow the instructions given by the Commission.

Images of the design were discussed.

All appreciated the design. Safety concerns were raised regarding the pitchfork design element of the gate. Shawn Lovell clarified that the tines of the pitchfork will be flat rather than pointed and the pointed roots will be modified. Two gates will be placed on site and will be secured opened and closed by cane bolts. A locking mechanism will be included.

Tora Rocha with the Public Works Agency has reviewed the safety aspects of the gate including child safety and the weight of the gate.

D. Request for Recommendation to Planning Commission and City Council Regarding Sale of 6,000

Square Foot Park Site at 319 Chester Street: Mark Hall with the Office of Parks and Recreation presented the staff report. Staff requested that the PRAC hold a public hearing regarding the sale and disposition of surplus-recreational property prior to Planning Commission review. Public notices were disposition of surplus-recreational property prior to Planning Commission been posted and mailed. Per Ordinance 11602 C.M.S., adopted June 29, 1993, the Planning Commission is required to determine the appropriate zoning classification for any City-owned surplus property that is 2,500 square feet or larger prior to its sale. The City's Real Estate Division requests review of one surplus property located at 319 Chester Street in West Oakland, an under-used semi-undeveloped Parks-owned site. The subject property is level and is situated between older residential buildings in West Oakland. Staff requested that the PRAC hold a public hearing and after take testimony to find that the project meets the intent of the zoning and general planning requirements for approval of zoning and residential space. Lloyd Ware from Housing and Community Development Division fielded questions from the Commissioners.

Commissioners wanted confirmation that the sale of the Chester Street Park is not a sign of the city's

policy on selling park lands and asked that a list of property in jeopardy be established. The property will be sold to the non profit, Alliance for West Oakland Development, a job training program for \$90.000. The City will hold the note and finance the construction for \$400,000. Staff has requested that the lot be rezoned to allow for the construction of more that one unit on the site. The \$90,000 will be repaid to the general fund. Proceeds for the sale will be placed in the same account so that similar projects could be considered. The posting for the public hearing was confirmed by the director. The local community brought the blight issue and illicit activity on the site to the attention of the district council who raised the issue with city staff.

E. Request for Design and Concept Approval on the Youth Urban Farm Project within Tassafaronga Park: Cynthia Armstrong, Center Director for Tassafaronga Recreation Center presented the staff report. The Office of Parks and Recreation requested approval of the design of the Urban Youth Farm within Tassafaronga Park; and for the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission (PRAC) to provide a recommendation to Planning Commission to approve the design and concept for the Youth Urban Farm Project. Oakland-based non-profit organization, Acta Non Verba and the Youth Urban Farm Project (ANV) submitted a proposal requesting approval for the general design and implementation of park improvements at Tassafaronga Park to include the creation of a community agricultural education/edible garden area. Work on the project is expect to move forward during the summer of 2011 and is a collaboration between Tassafaronga, Communities for a Better Environment, People United for a Better Oakland and Oakland resident. The materials and labor will be funded through PUEBLO, the California Endowment and a mini grant from the Elmhurst Weed and Seed Initiative. Lighting and maintenance will be managed by the project coordinator and funded through various organizations, park users and community members. Labor will be provided by project neighbors, local high schools and college student receiving course credit or paid internships. Staff recommended that the PRAC accept and approve the design and implementation of the Youth Urban Farm Project within Tassafaronga Park and recommend the Planning Commission approve the minor conditional use permit mCUP.

Speakers supported the project and the center's partnership with Acta Non Verba including the mission to provide fresh produce to the local community and the public safety benefits of the community space and neighborhood beautification. It was recommended that the PRAC support the project and recommend to the Planning Commission the approval for the mCup.

A. Request from Oakland Fukuoka Sister City Association to Install Ten Japanese "Ikekomi-Doro" Style Lanterns Surrounding the Torii Gate Located Within the Gardens at Lake Merritt: Dana Riley presented the staff report to the Commission. The Oakland Fukuoka Sister City Association, a 501(c) (3) corporation would like to commemorate their 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary by replacing the ten lanterns that once resided in the Torii gate section of the Gardens at Lake Merritt. OFSCA plans to replace the missing. lanterns with Japanese "Ikekomi-doro" style lanterns. The lanterns would be placed in the ground and not removed. The association is consulting with the Department of Public Works and it has been determined that this project will not have a fiscal impact on the agency as the association is in the process of fund raising. The lanterns may be outfitted with a solar panel and will have an on/off switch and is approximately the size of a lamp post which will mitigate damage during regular maintenance of the grounds.

B. Approval of the Design and Implementation of the Leveling the Playing Field Project Phase II and Recommend Approval to the Planning Commission for the Conditional Use Permit, Variance and Design Review: The staff report was presented by Ali Schwarz of Project Delivery with the Public Works Agency. Staff from the Public Works Agency (PWA) and the Office of Parks and Recreation request approval of the design and implementation of the Leveling the Playing Field Phase II Project. The project, funded by the Measure WW Bond funds, includes the renovation of three fields in the City of Oakland including new irrigation, sod, infields, and other amenities as needed. The project will improve the three fields while addressing the limited team sports opportunities available to girls in the City of Oakland, by converting the in fields to soft ball standards. In this way the project will in effect help "level the playing field". Part of the improvements includes new lighting systems to two fields; one located at Owen Jones Filed on Redwood Road in District 4 and the other field is Poplar located at the Willie Keys Recreation Center in West Oakland District 3. The lighting system is 20 years old and will be upgraded to a remote control system and will provide better safety and eliminate dark spots on the fields. The new LED fixtures will control light spillage off the fields. Neighbors within 300 feet of the site have been noticed on the project and will be noticed on the next phase and will have the opportunity to address the Planning Commission. Additional softball fields are being added as there are more baseball fields and fewer softball fields and to increase sports and activities for females. The fields will be open to all team sports. There were 7 fields on the Parks Priority list. The decision to upgrade these fields was based on the Parks Priority list and upon which districts needed softball fields and which parks needed to be upgraded. A variance is all that is required for this project rather than a major conditional use permit as lighting already exists at the site. The variance is necessary to cover the change in the lighting structure. Sod will be installed on the field. Area safety lighting is not part of the project.

C. Approval of the Design and Implementation for the Golden Gate Recreation Center Improvement Project: The staff report was presented by Denise Louie from the Public Works Agency (PWA) Division of Design, Engineering and Construction. Staff recommends the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission (PRAC) approve the design and implementation for Golden Gate Recreation Center Improvements Including the addition of the gymnasium and improvements to the existing recreation center. The building is 59 years old and in need of upgrades. Potential funding opportunity is available through the State 2006 Safe Drinking Water Act, or Proposition 84 - Statewide and Community Revitalization Program of 2008 (Statewide Park Grant). This is a completive grant process in which this project is 1 of 6 City of Oakland projects vying for the \$184 mil available in funding. Project staff has requested the maximum funding of \$5 mil for the project. The consultant services of Noll and Tam were contracted to lead the community outreach process and to develop the conceptual plan. Staff conducted 9 community or focus group workshops where the ideas for the design of the project were solicited. Participants included the very young to seniors. The site consists of a baseball field and recreation center. The center is the focus of this project. The Community voted on Scheme 1 at the May 9 community meeting. Which includes a new gymnasium and stage; increasing the area from 3400 square feet 11,850 square feet. The parking area, drop off of zone and tot lot will be upgraded. Staff will return to the Commission in the future for the approval of the major conditional use permit for the gymnasium sometime in 2012. The existing tot lot is too close to the curb and has been remedied in current design plan. Outreach to announce meetings were conducted through visits to neighboring schools, through email notification and door to door canvasing.

D. Request to Deny the Tree Permit Appeal for the Oakland Zoo: The staff report was presented by Darin Ranelletti from the Planning and Zoning Division and Mitch Thompson from the Tree Division of the Public Works Agency (PWA). In conjunction with Phase 1 of the amended Zoo Master Plan, the Tree Services Division approved the application of the East Bay Zoological Society to remove seven (7) protected trees including one 10 inch diameter almond missing half its bark with 3 to 4 inch dead limbs in the canopy and 6 large shrubs considered to be small trees. The Friends of Knowland Park appealed the decision. The Tree Services Division recommends that the appeal be denied thereby upholding the decision of the Tree Services Division. In review; Subsequent to the PRAC's April 2011 recommendation to approve the proposed amendment to the Oakland Zoo Master Plan and the Planning Commissions April 2011 approval of the environmental document for the project and approval of the land use permits for the amendment; The Friends

of Knowland Park, California Native Plants Society and the California Native Grasslands Association appealed the Planning Commission's decision to the City Council. Their appeal is based on their opinion that the environmental review conducted for the project was inadequate. The Friends of Knowland Park's appeal is still pending and a hearing date has not been scheduled. After the Planning Commission's decisions to approve the Master Plan, PWA will approval a tree removal permit for phase 1 of the amended master plan. The tree removal permit has been appealed by the Friends of Knowland Park. Since Knowland Park is a City owned property, the tree permit appeal was presented to the PRAC. Approval of the tree permit does not mean the tree division can immediately remove trees. The municipal code state that the tree permit must be held until all permits have been issued including the City Council approval of the amended master plan. The purpose of this meeting was for PRAC to determine if the tree removals comply with CEQA and with the criteria for tree permit approval as listed in the City's tree ordinance. The trees in question are located on the proposed site where the veterinary hospital is to be located. The ordinance allows for redesign or shifting the building if a tree is to be compromised. If staff opted to use the redesign provision, a large oak tree would be in jeopardy. The tree ordinance requires replacement of trees if removing certain natives. Landscape design plans for the veterinary hospital show the number of trees to be plan exceed the number suggested for removal.

Opposing Community Comments: A representative for the appellant stated that any consideration or decision to remove a tree or trees would be irrelevant until the Friends of Knowland Park's appeals process has been completed and until City Council makes a decision on the issue. Further, until plans are approved by Council, it is unclear where the veterinary hospital will be located and any decisions about tree removal are premature, unauthorized and an abuse of PWA's discretion. It was asserted that the required 72 hour public notice for the current meeting was not followed and that this has been the history for this project. The speaker further stated that for the commission (PRAC) to make a ruling while a decision is pending before City Council is abuse of the commission's position and that the Parks and Recreations Department has not followed its obligations to Knowland Park including its obligation to provide signs, maps or website documentation to the park for Oakland citizens.

The Commission confirmed the meeting was properly noticed on Friday, May 6.

The areas with 3 or more votes included; dog parks; open spaces; maintenance and repair of new and existing facilities; ball parks and successful program and centers in other cities. The Policy Committee will arrange to have guest speakers come in to make a presentation to the Commission. Two Commissioners expressed an interest to have PWA give a presentation of park maintenance.

# 11. ADVISORY COUNCIL REPORTS:

A. Reports were given by PRAC Commissioners: Commissioner Montauk reported on Arroyo Viejo. The first meeting for the new Advisory Council for the center was held on May 4. 700 kids participated in the Annual Egg Hunt 4/23. The project was supported by 41 volunteers. Staff organizers are planning to participate in the statewide Car Show and B-BQ on May 14 from 11 to 5 pm. Arroyo Viejo has the only cheerleader group in the city. It includes 3 to 15 year olds. The group won the regional meet and will be compete in the state finals. Kids participating in the group also have the opportunity to receive life skills

training.

Commissioner Belcher reported on Mosswood. There were over 3000 in attendance at the annual Egg Hunt. CEO, a community based organization with a focus on supporting the goals of young women, worked with staff to organize the event. The Oakland Fire Department - OFD and a local motorcycle club added to the festivities. There were activities for all children including 1 year olds who had the assistance of volunteers.

12. CONDITIONAL USE PERMITS:

A. Request for Recommendation on The East Oakland Sports Center Fence Project Minor Conditional Use Permit: Dana Riley presented a staff report. Staff recommends that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission (PRAC) approve the design of the fence and recommend to the Planning Commission approval of the Minor Conditional Use Permit for installation of the fence at the East Oakland Sports Center (EOSC) located in the William "Bill" Patterson Park. The proposed East Oakland Sports Center Fence Project (Project) is to run the perimeter of the Patterson Park closing the gap between existing fencing and creating a recreation complex. The campus will consist of the East Oakland Sports Center, the Ira Jinkins Recreation Center, Brookfield Library and the Senior Center. The proposed fence will be constructed of eight foot tall black iron posts with angled top sections with pedestrian and vehicle gates allowing access to the parking lot, dumpster and maintenance storage areas and pedestrian thoroughfare around the complex. The fence will help mitigate some of the vandalism and graffiti at the recreation and senior centers and allow youth to sit outdoors in a secure area. The approximate \$120,000 to \$140,000 cost of the fence is included in the project funding.

Commissioners commented on the height and color of the fence and requested more decorative finials and confirmation on possible height restrictions. Staff provided confirmation that the fence is powder coated and will not rust.

15. <u>DIRECTOR'S REPORT</u>:

Directors Jones-Taylor welcomed Commissioner Marsha Peterson to the PRAC. Commissioner Peterson has replaced Commissioner Osagie Enabulele. It was suggested that the Commission have a special event to honor Commissioner Enabulele's past service.

A. Budget Overview

The third City Council budget meeting will be held tomorrow, Thursday, May12th, at 5:30pm in council Chambers. Reporting agencies will be OPD, OFD Public Works and CEDA. On May 26 OPR, DHS and Libraries will make their reports. There City currently has a \$58mil deficit. OPR contributes approximately \$2.5mil to the General Purpose Fund through agency revenue generating sites of through site closures. The City has proposed 3 options (A, B and C) to address the budget deficit. Under Option A - OPR would close 6 recreation centers; General Rec. Supervisors will be removed, OPR has been charged with generating \$3mil. The East Oakland Sports Center - EOSC's opening will be delayed 6 and will open at the beginning of the year. It was projected that \$879,000 of the 3mil expected to be generated by OPR would come from EOSC. Option C is the most optimistic - including the passage of the Parcel Tax and concessions by staff (local 21 and 1021) approval of an additional 28% cut and 13% paid into PERS. In year two of the budget adjustment, OPR could possibly be merged with The Department of Human Services - DHS and Libraries. As part of the process the Director proposed eliminating the Director's

Unit including managers; others will be transferred to DHS.

DHS receives federal, state and local grants including Measure Y. The Department Directors have two months before the Acting City Administrator leaves to produce an agreed upon plan of action. Director Jones-Taylor encouraged the Commissioner's to attend the upcoming budget meetings.

Commissioner Montauk urged others to speak with their respective networks to help pass the parcel tax.

SUMMARY

Staff received a request from Playworks for permission to collect charitable donations and to allow vendors to sell merchandise on-site at Eastshore Park on Saturday, October 29, 2011.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no fiscal impact to the Office of Parks and Recreation.

#### BACKGROUND

Playworks is a national nonprofit organization that supports learning by providing safe, healthy, inclusive play and physical activity to schools at recess throughout the entire school day.



Gardens at Lake Merritt at Lakeside Park.

### **SUMMARY**

Staff received a request from the Oakland Fukuoka Sister City Association, a 501(c)(3) corporation, to complete landscaping surrounding the Torii Gate within the Gardens at Lake Merritt. The map and planting plan is attached (Exhibit A).

### FISCAL IMPACT

There is no fiscal impact on the Office of Parks and recreation. OFSCA will fund-raise or write grants to pay for all associated costs to complete the landscaping.

### PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Irrigation, islands, stone, soil products, trees and other plants will be installed by OFSCA members and volunteers led by professional landscaper, Peter Bowyer. Victoria Rocha of the City of Oakland Public Works Agency and Peter Bowyer have been in conference over the past several months regarding plant materials and have reached agreement on plant material selection and plan.

### **BACKGROUND**

The Oakland Fukuoka Sister City Association (OFSCA) is a 501 (c)(3) corporation that was formed in 1962 as an organization through which Oakland residents can become involved in the sister city relationship between the City of Oakland and the City of Fukuoka, Japan. The mission of OFSCA is to foster and promote cultural awareness, understanding and friendship between the people and cities of Oakland and Fukuoka.

OFSCA will be celebrating a milestone 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 2012, making it the 46<sup>th</sup> sister city in Sister Cities International to achieve 50 years. In 2002, for their 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary they raised the necessary funds to rebuild the Japanese Torii Gate that now resides within the Gardens at Lake Merritt. In May, 2011 PRAC approved their request to install ten Japanese style lanterns to commemorate the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary. To complete the landscaping of the area is of utmost importance for the celebrations and dedications that will take place later next year.

### RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission approve the design and installation of the Fukuoka Sister City Association landscaping surrounding the Torii Gate within the Gardens at Lake Merritt. See Exhibit A for map and planting

Design of an off-leash dog area at the former Police Horse Stables within

Lakeside Park. (An alternative to the Lakeview Dog Play Area at Eastshore Park.)

### SUMMARY

In response to significant community concerns about the proposed change in use that would be needed to accommodate the Lakeview Dog Play Area at Eastshore Park, the following design for an alternative off-leash dog area is proposed. This alternative location will be considered by the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission (PRAC) at its July 13, 2011 meeting, at which time the Commission will also be reviewing proposed changes to open space and recreation allowances for the proposed Lakeview Dog Play Area project (Lakeview Dog Area).

The alternative site for an off-leash dog area is located at the former Police Horse Stables within Lakeside Park. Preliminary analysis indicates that the alternative location may raise significantly fewer zoning issues than would the proposed Lakeview Dog Area at the corner of MacArthur Boulevard and Lakeshore Avenue. Specifically, the alternative location could likely be found consistent with the City of Oakland's Open Space, Conservation and Recreation (OSCAR) element of the General Plan, the Oakland Planning Code, and the City's Open Space zoning regulations.

The site of the Lakeview Dog Area at the corner of MacArthur Boulevard and Lakeshore Avenue is the result of a well-intentioned effort to locate an off-leash dog area within the Lake Merritt area. The idea has been considered for many years. However, the Lakeview Dog Area is currently proposed within a highly visible and well-used recreational space and the proposal has divided the Lake Merritt community, particularly over the past six months. Hundreds of community members have spoken both for and against the idea. Until very recently, the Lake Merritt community was told that the corner of MacArthur Boulevard and Lakeshore Avenue was the only suitable location for a fenced, off-leash dog area.

Since the PRAC's approval of the design of the Lakeview Dog Area in December 2010, Councilmember Pat Kernighan and her staff have identified a potential alternative location for a dog park at the former Police Horse Stables within Lakeside Park. In preliminary discussions, the Oakland Police Department (OPD), the Office of Parks and Recreation (OPR), and the Public Works Agency have all expressed interest in pursuing this location as an alternative site if a conditional use permit is not approved for Eastshore Park.

FISCAL IMPACT

If the Lakeview Dog Area at Eastshore Park does not receive approval for zoning changes, the public funding commitments for that project may be transferred to the Police Horse Stables site. Current funding available for the Lakeview Dog Play Area is \$21,000 from the Public Works Capital Reserves Fund, \$10,000 from Council District 3 carry-forward Pay-Go funds, \$2,000



from Council District 2, and \$2,000 from At-Large Council for a total of \$35,000. It is our hope that the Oakland Dog Owners Group (ODOG) would be involved in the project. Additionally, a group of Lake Merritt neighbors led by Maria Alderete (Owner of Luka's Taproom & Lounge in Oakland, California) are committed to this alternative site and would continue to be involved in project funding and the development of a maintenance and stewardship plan.

### PROJECT DESCRIPTION

## Alternative Location - Former Police Horse Stables

The alternative location for a dog play area is at the former Police Horse Stables located within Lakeside Park at Lake Merritt. The site is located on Bellevue Avenue, west of the Lakeside Park Garden Center. The site is accessible to pedestrians and bicyclists from the service road behind Children's Fairyland as well as from the parking lot on Bellevue Avenue. Until 2006, the Police Horse Stables, otherwise known as the mounted patrol stables, were used by the Oakland Police Department. Tucked discreetly behind Children's Fairyland, the site often goes unnoticed by visitors to Lake Merritt. The stables site has been unused for the past five years. The majority of the site is vacant, enclosed with a chain link fence and closed to the public. The site sits atop a small knoll that is bounded by Lake Merritt to the west and south, Children's Fairyland to the north and the Oakland Bandstand to the east. The site is slightly crowned, contains a variety of mature trees and is currently overgrown with weeds. Shipping containers and a former stable (barn structure) are found within the enclosed area. Outside of the enclosed area are picnic tables within a dirt area and grassy slopes facing the bandstand area to the east and Lake Merritt and downtown Oakland to the west.



The proposed dog play area at the Police Horse Stables (PHS) site would include the same amenities that the proposal at Eastshore Park includes.

Given the site's vacant condition, the dog area would not displace recreational uses. The primary change of use would involve relocating three picnic tables.

The PHS off-leash dog area would be comprised of the former horse area and an extension to the south into the dirt area on top of the knoll. The barn area would be retained by OPR and the Oakland Police Department for overflow

storage and police dog training. The total dog park area would be approximately 20,000 square feet. The PHS Dog Park would be accessible for citizens with disabilities and seniors.

Specific elements of the PHS Dog Park would include:

- Removal of empty shipping containers by the Office of Parks and Recreation.
- Removal of the existing weeds and dead plant material.
- Removal of barbed wire from existing six-foot-tall fence.
- Reuse of the existing six-foot-tall fence, replacement of existing service gate, and installation of 300 feet of chain link fencing to enclose the exterior boundary.
- Separate play areas for large and small dogs.
- Double gate entries that are ADA accessible with service vehicle access.
- Low interior fences to define small and large dog areas.
- Waste receptacles.
- Directional and regulatory signage within Lakeside Park at access points.
- Two ADA parking spaces adjacent to existing restrooms.
- A stewardship agreement with a Lake Merritt-based volunteer group.

The following regulations would govern the use of the PHS Dog Area:


- Dogs must be leashed while walking to and from off-leash area.
- Dogs must be licensed and have all required shots.
- Dogs showing aggressive behavior must leave the park immediately.
- Excessive barking must be controlled.
- Keep dogs in sight and maintain voice control.
- Children under 16 must be accompanied by an adult.
- Adult handler must be in fenced area with dog at all times.
- Limit 3 dogs per adult.
- Dog owners must clean up after their dogs immediately. Always bring plastic bag.
- Dogs under 25 pounds and elderly dogs should use small dog area.
- No dogs under four months of age.
- No dogs in heat.
- No smoking.
- Dog owners shall observe all rules posted in the dog play area and within Lakeside Park.

To ensure that the dog park use would not adversely impact Lake Merritt wildlife and visitors' experience at Children's Fairyland, the following signs would be posted:

- Sign at the Grand Avenue service road entrance:
  - "On-Leash Dogs Must Remain on Service Road."
  - "No Dogs Permitted on Park Paths".
- Sign at parking lot entrance:
  - "On-Leash Dogs Allowed Only Between Parking Lot and Dog Park."
  - "No Dogs Permitted on Park Paths".
- Directional signage at pathway entrances reminding of on-leash requirements.
- Regulatory signage near El Embarcadero reminding that dogs are not permitted on Lakeside Park paths.








The working group was unable to meet with the City of Oakland's Association of Disabled Americans office prior to submitting this design proposal, but we intend to work with them to ensure the design is accessible for citizens with disabilities and seniors. Additionally, we will submit a request to the City Council to amend the Oakland Municipal Code to include the PHS Dog Play Area as an off-leash dog play area and Eastshore Park as an on-leash dog use area. Furthermore, operation of the PHS Dog Play Area will also require a stewardship agreement with a Lake Merritt volunteer group for ongoing stewardship.

### **BACKGROUND**

**Policy Framework** 

In 1996, the Open Space, Conservation and Recreation (OSCAR) element was updated and adopted by the City Council establishing the policy framework for open space, conservation, and recreation zoning and land uses. Following this, the open space zoning regulations of the Oakland Planning Code were updated in parallel sequence with the updating and adoption of the General Plan land use map. In 1998, amendments to the Open Space zoning regulations (Chapter

17.11 of the Zoning Code) and the General Plan Land Use Map were formally adopted by City Council.

The following points provide policy analysis regarding both the Lakeview and PHS sites.

- 1. The OSCAR acknowledges that active recreation use is inadequately served in the Lake Merritt area. The Lakeview Dog Area would remove 50% of the usable playfield, resulting in a loss of active recreation area. No such loss would occur at the alternative PHS site. (OSCAR Chapter 4, pg 43)
- 2. The OSCAR states that open space preservation in the Lake Merritt community is a priority. Preservation of Eastshore Park is needed due to higher density residential development and park demand. At Eastshore Park, the surrounding land use pattern and the presence of Interstate 580 create a need to preserve open space. The PHS site is currently vacant. (OSCAR Chapter 2, pg 7)
- 3. The OSCAR identifies Eastshore Park as a "Gateway" to the Lake Merritt District. The OSCAR explicitly recommends signage improvements, a monument or fountain at Eastshore Park. A fenced dog run is not identified as part of the open space vision for Eastshore Park. (OSCAR Ch 5, pg. 10, 11 & OS 9.3)
- 4. The OSCAR recommends no more than 15% of neighborhood park for new uses. Eastshore Park is too small to accommodate additional uses. Eastshore Park is a 2-acre neighborhood park and the Lakeview Dog Play Area is 21,000 square feet, or 24% of Eastshore Park. (OSCAR Chapter 4, pg. 28)

As was mentioned above, the OSCAR was adopted by the City of Oakland in 1996. Although it identifies dog parks as an unmet citywide need, it must be noted that four new dog parks have opened in Oakland since the OSCAR was adopted, for a total of five. The OSCAR requires that in built out areas, an emphasis should be on **underutilized resources**(OSCAR Chapter 2, pg. 2 &3). Consistent with this policy, development of Oakland dog parks has historically targeted underutilized park resources that, in several instances, harbored unwelcome activities. The Police Horse Stables site fits this underutilization requirement as does the following list of built dog parks.


- Grove Shafter: \$55,000 budget w/ significant redevelopment grants. Park has history of underutilization and Commissioner Ricards expressed concerns about drug use and crime.
- **Jefferson Square:** Part of big redevelopment funded park restoration. After freeway construction in the 1970s, this historic park became increasingly neglected and one of the community's most underutilized parks.
- Mosswood: \$24,000 NPI Grant. Dog Park Area is near freeway with history of blight and crime. Homeless encampment, drug dealing and needles present in park.
- Joaquin Miller: \$30,000 budget funded from former Councilmembers Quan's & Chang's offices.
   Dog Park is located in overflow parking area of the park which was used only 30 days per year.
- Hardy Park: Park is under freeway overpass and was previously not utilized as public space.
- Police Horse Stables Site (Pending): \$35,000 (potential) of public funding is described above in the Fiscal Impact section. Dog Park would be located in remote area of Lakeside Park where crime is reported.

Comparison - Eastshore and Police Horse Stables Sites

Many community members can agree that a dog park is needed near Lake Merritt. However, the proposed Lakeview Dog Park at the corner of MacArthur Boulevard and Lakeshore Avenue has created a heated debate within the Lake Merritt Community, due primarily to Eastshore Park's active recreational use and its visibility in the neighborhood.


As proposed for PRAC review, there is concern the Lakeview Dog Play Area at Eastshore Park is not supported by the strategic vision for the area and is not suitable for what is currently the neighborhoods primary open space. When compared side by side, it appears that the underutilized, former Police Horse Stables site is a better fit for a fenced dog area than is the well-used Eastshore Park at the corner of MacArthur Boulevard and Lakeshore Avenue.

## Key details to consider for the Police Horse Stables(PHS) site:

- The PHS dog park would be located mostly in an underutilized portion of Lakeside Park.
- The Police Horse Stables site, located at the south end of Children's Fairyland, has a history of homeless residents and crime that would be deterred by greater use.
- The original need for a dog park came from Adams Point constituents. This high density, multifamily residential area has the greatest need for a dog area nearby. The PHS site would give the best access to the neighborhood with the greatest need.
- The PHS location has a history of animal use (horses and dogs) and is in the recommended "geese exclusion area" identified in the July 2007 Lake Merritt Canada Goose Management Study.
- The PHS site is a sound alternative because of planning considerations, City-wide budgetary concerns, and limited public agency resources, such as maintenance.
- The PHS site would be set back within Lakeside Park, in a peaceful, attractive setting, yet would not obstruct views from surrounding neighborhoods or roadways.
- The PHS site would preserve Eastshore Park, thereby allowing its improvement as a gateway to the Lake Merritt District.

As described above, the former Police Horse Stables was used as a horse corral and a training area for police dogs. While the dog park project would not be a turn-key operation, in many ways the site is "ready-to-go." Improvements to and development of the stables as an off-leash dog area could occur relatively quickly following community buy-in. Therefore, it is expected that an off-leash facility could be constructed and opened within 12 to 18 months.

RECOMMENDATION

We recommend that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission approve the conceptual design proposal for an off-leash dog play area the former Police Horse Stable site, recognizing that additional scoping and community outreach is scheduled to occur. Specifically, the dog park at the Police Horse Stables site would be vetted with Adams Point neighborhood, Children's Fairyland and the broader Lake Merritt community.

### Dear Respected Commissioners,

With deep regret I will be unable to attend the July 13th PRAC meeting where you will be discussing the application for the conditional use permit for the Lakeview Dog Park at Astro Park (aka Eastshore Park), as well as the dog park design proposal for an alternative location at the former police horse stables. I have spent many hours reading our code and meeting with members of the community, council and ODOG. Please do not take my lack of attendance as an indication of my dedication to this project. It is my 20 year wedding anniversary and my husband and I are on a long planned vacation. In any other circumstance I would be at the meeting, but I do have a dedicated team I'm working with and I'm confident they will represent our position.

Therefore, these comments are respectfully submitted in writing to Oakland's Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission related to considerations for the minor conditional use permit for the Lakeview Dog Park Proposal. I support Save Astro Park's perspective and oppose the current location, but have an alternative that will bridge the community.

strongly oppose the Lakeview Dog Park Proposal for the following reasons:

### Change of Use:

- Currently used as a neighborhood recreational field for residents and local schools.
- The proposal will take up 50% of the open field. The open field is protected by OSCAR, as it's the only large field in the area for active recreation, a use identified as an unmet need for the neighborhood.
- An unattractive fenced area with wood chips is not appropriate next to a central retail area.
- The prominent visibility in neighborhood requires a better maintenance plan and larger budget, at a time when funds and increased services are not available due to pending layoffs and budget crisis.
- Poor drainage will make this dog park unusable for parts of winter and spring, yet remain visually brown, fenced and uninviting.
- Community concerns include adverse impact on already stressed retail parking, discontinuation of youth programs due to reliance on space and child safety due to proximity to tot lot.

#### Principles for Open Space:

- Eastshore Park is designated by OSCAR as a "gateway" to Lake Merritt and not suitable for a fenced brown space.
- We need to preserve this park space for a time when the city has enough-funds to add gateways, signage or other improvements befitting for this prime space.
- Key open space guidelines are not being followed, the proposal will take up 24% of the park and 15% is the maximum allowed in a neighborhood park.
- New enhancements like a dog park should be focused in underutilized spaces.
- Preserving this open space is a priority due to surrounding dense urban high rises and highway overpass.

The original dog park proposal followed appropriate process by being reviewed in 2004 and 2006 community meetings, but the proposal at the time was for a super deluxe \$400,000 dog park. The current proposal's budget is \$45,000, just over 10% of the original budget. No pre-development community meetings were held to get input even after concerns started surfacing in community email groups in mid 2009. If that's our budget, we need to find a less visible location.

### ALTERNATIVE LOCATION PROPOSAL

The location of the Lakeview Dog Park at Eastshore Park is the key issue that has divided our community. The main question being given the original budget was reduced by 90%, where is the best place to put a fenced dog area that is covered in wood chips. An overwhelming majority (over 70%) of the community that showed up for the March 23<sup>rd</sup> meeting did not like the location, regardless of whether or not they were for or against the dog park. However, they were told it was the only location available. Even James Vann, the architect for Measure DD said of the Lakeview Dog Park, "the wood chips were unfortunate and that it's not the best place for it."

Due to community issues with the Lakeview Dog Play Area at Eastshore Park, Pat Kernighan and her staff identified an alternative location for the dog park. Additionally, OPD, OPR and PW have expressed interest in pursuing this location as an alternative site if the Eastshore site does not pass zoning. Unfortunately, only one dog park is feasible at this point.



The alterative location is a site within Lakeview Park in a peaceful, unused part of the park. It is the location of the former police horse stables (PHS) and not currently used by the public. You will find it just after entering the park on Bellevue and due west of the Lakeside Garden Center. You can visit before the meeting. The site is currently a fenced area closed to the public with overgrown weeds, 2 empty shipping storage containers and a structure that housed the horses. It is located behind Children's Fairyland, with pedestrian access from the service road behind Fairyland.

The dog park would be set back within the park and will not obstruct any views from the surrounding neighborhoods.

- The PHS dog park would be located mostly in an underutilized portion of Lakeside Park.
- The PHS site has a history of homeless residents and crime that would be deterred by greater use.
- The original need for a dog park came from Adams Point constituents. This high density, multi-family residential area has the greatest need for a dog area nearby. The PHS site would give the best access to the neighborhood with the greatest need.
- The PHS site is a sound alternative because of planning considerations, City-wide budgetary concerns, and limited public agency resources, such as maintenance.
- The PHS site would be set back within Lakeside Park, in a peaceful, attractive setting, yet would not obstruct views from surrounding neighborhoods or roadways.

### FISCAL IMPACT

There is no fiscal impact to the Office of Parks and Recreation. The butterfly murals are funded by KABOOM! at Wade Johnson Park and by Friends of Lake Merritt at the Gardens at Lake Merritt.

## PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The murals are constructed of plywood cut into shapes of butterflies. Both sides of the shapes have been colorfully painted by various volunteers under the supervision of artist Kristi Holohan. The finished murals will be installed by hanging/fixing with stainless steel eyehooks clasped to a chain linked fence and held with weatherproof epoxy allowing easy removal by trained staff if damaged or they become deteriorated. Fourteen mural pieces have been constructed. Ten are proposed to be placed on the fence boarding the southwest side of Wade Johnson Park. The remaining four are proposed to be installed on the on the inside of the fence separating the Gardens at Lake Merritt from Bellevue Avenue.

## RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission approve the installation of temporary and removable butterfly murals at Wade Johnson Park and the Gardens at Lake Merritt.



35. PARKS AND RECREATION ADVISORY COMMISSION: Any and all matters with respect to this Agreement that require policy approval by the City Council, not including administrative decisions by the City Administrator that need no such approval, shall be first submitted to the PARKS AND RECREATION ADVISORY COMMISSION which shall, in turn, submit same to the City Council in conformance with applicable procedures.

FISCAL IMPACT

No direct impact to City funds. The proposed contract amendment would allow East Bay Zoological Society to receive a \$7,000,000 grant award to fund a new exhibit at the City-owned Oakland Zoo.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff requests the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission recommend approval of the request authorizing the City Administrator to amend the master agreement between the City of Oakland and the East Bay Zoological Society / Oakland Zoo pursuant to grant requirements from Proposition 84 funds from the California Department of Parks and Recreation, which requires 1) extension of the agreement to 30 years; and 2) Elimination of the "At-Will" termination clause.

### **SUMMARY**

The Office of Parks and Recreation has received a request from the East Bay Children's Book Project to rent a space at Mosswood Recreation Center, the room known as the "Art Room and adjoining Office Space" for the purpose of collecting and donating new and used books to children and teachers throughout the bay area, from July 2011 through June 30, 2013, with an opportunity to renew for an additional two years. The address of the proposed site for the East Bay Children's Book Project is 3612 Webster Street (at MacArthur), Oakland 94609.

### FISCAL IMPACTS

The East Bay Children's Book Project will pay \$550 per month for the rental of the space, generating \$6600 in revenue each year. East Bay Children's Book Project is responsible for any and all cost to operate at Mosswood Recreation Center, with the exception of water, gas and electricity.

### BACKGROUND

The East Bay Children's Book Project was founded to help build literacy by putting books into the hands of children who have little or no access to them. Working through individuals and organizations who help children in need, the East Bay Children's Book Project has given out over 475,000 free books since opening its doors in May 2005.

### **RECOMMENDATION**

Staff recommends that the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission approve the request from East Bay Children's Book Project to operate their non-profit free books program at Mosswood Recreation Center for the proposed period of time.

### **SUMMARY**

Staff received a request from the Oakland Dog Owners Group (ODOG) to design and construct a dog play area within Lakeview Park. On December 8, 2010 the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission approved the design of the Lakeview Dog Play Area. Staff requests the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission (PRAC) recommendation of the dog play area minor conditional use permit application to the City Planning Department. The Lakeview Dog Play Area will enclose the corner of Lakeview Park bordered by MacArthur Blvd to the north and Lakeshore Ave to the southeast. The Lakeview dog play area will contain separate off-leash areas for large and small dogs to exercise and socialize.

### FISCAL IMPACT

Funding is available for the Lakeview Dog Play Area in the amounts of \$21,000 from the Public Works Agency's Capital Reserves Fund, \$10,000 from Council District 3 carry-forward Pay-Go funds, \$2,000 from Council District 2, and \$2,000 from the At-Large Council office, for a total of \$35,000. ODOG will work together with project stakeholders to seek additional resources, including gifts of services and materials for the construction of the dog play area. ODOG will also seek sustainable resources for operation and maintenance, including the organization of a volunteer program. With the addition of the dog play area, maintenance to Lakeview Park by City staff will only include: mowing and on-call emergency service for graffiti abatement and irrigation breaks.

### PROJECT DESCRIPTION

To enclose/fence a section of the Lakeview Park for use as an off-leash dog play area for dogs to exercise, and for both dogs and their guardians to socialize.

### Specific elements of the project include:

- Separate play areas for large and small dogs with name signs
- Fencing to enclose the dog play area, which will be 21,300 sq. ft. total in area. The fence fully separates those on the inside from those on the outside without imposing unnecessary visual impact on the park
- Double gate entries that are ADA accessible with supply vehicle access
- Concrete mow-band around 2/3 of the fence to provide easy access for lawn-maintenance
- Two in-ground waste receptacles
- Wood chips to provide the ground cover
- Tree planting between the fence line and MacArthur Blvd

### **BACKGROUND**

Since 2009, volunteers of ODOG have been working on a redesign of an off-leash dog play area at Lakeview Park in conjunction with the Community members, Public Works Agency (PWA), the Office of Parks and Recreation (OPR), and the Office of City Council, District 3, Nancy Nadel. On December 8, 2010 the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission approved the design of the Lakeview Dog Play Area.

## FISCAL IMPACT

There is no expected negative fiscal impact the City. The Oakland Metropolitan Chamber of Commerce Foundation and Kaiser Permanente will provide City approved signage for the park. The funds to manufacture and install the monument, lighting and visually impaired artwork are being raised as a component of the Remember Them capital campaign under the guidance and leadership of the Chamber of Commerce Foundation. The 'Remember Them' project capital campaign also includes a \$250,000 endowment for a maintenance program which will ensure that the bronze monument, lighting and visually impaired artwork are insured for damage and cleaned annually. The City does not have maintenance responsibilities at the Park due to the existing agreement with the developers of the Uptown Project.

Project site lighting plan includes six (6) 35' down pole lights. The 'Remember Them' project is an inspirational bronze monument comprised of 25 international role models and includes an educational program. The high school curriculum was developed by the Martin Luther King Institute at Stanford University and is currently being tested in Oakland Unified Schools. The project also includes unique tactile artwork for the visually impaired to provide an equal experience, which will be installed along the sides of the park bordering 19th Street and Rashida Muhammad. The monument site is ADA accessible. Bronze plaques with donor recognition will be affixed to the lower half of the visually impaired artwork.

## BACKGROUND

In 2006 City Council unanimously approved Resolution No. 80123 C.M.S (see Exhibit B) accepting the monument and placing the 'Remember Them' Monument in the Fox Square Park. Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission February 11, 2004

Request the Park and Recommendation Advisory Commission recommend the Remember Them: Champions of Humanity Minor Conditional Use application to the City Planning Department for administrative review and approval.
