SUBJECT:

Request from CEDA – Redevelopment for Proposed Aesthetic Additions

to Existing Park Facility of Cesar Chavez Park

SUMMARY

The Office of Parks and Recreation (OPR) received a request from CEDA – Redevelopment to endorse a proposed aesthetic addition (art-mural backdrop) to the previously approved (June 14th PRAC approval) and constructed community deck at Cesar Chavez Park in the Fruitvale. This project is being sponsored by the Unity Council, the AmeriCorps, the Redevelopment Agency, OUSD, and KQED and local neighborhood volunteers. All direct work, cost and upkeep for this "Gift-in-Place" will be incurred by these partners.

FISAL IMPACT

This request is for planning approvals for the specified park aesthetic accessory elements. Funds for material costs and installation of these items are secured independently of this action (through Redevelopment and volunteer in-kind contributions) and this request does not involve any direct OPR funding.

KEY ISSUES

This project has a high degree of support and "ownership" by the community and with the presence and leadership of the Unity Council, it is anticipated that community stakeholders will continue in doing volunteer maintenance and clean-up/repairs as necessary and in conjunction with park staff as appropriate (as is currently done quarterly, e.g. playground repainting, bench repainting, clean-up/weeding and tree-planting, on specific community volunteer days organized by the Unity Council and "We Mean Clean" program).

RECOMMENDATION

Staff requests and recommends the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission to endorse this proposal and associated "Right of Entry" for these aesthetic "gift-in-place" augmentations to Cesar Chavez Park. This endorsement will enable specific plans and details to be submitted to Planning and Building for final review and approval.

SUMMARY

Staff requests the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission endorse a proposed aesthetic addition (art-mural backdrop) to the previously approved (June 14th PRAC approval) and constructed community deck at Cesar Chavez Park in the Fruitvale. This project is being sponsored by the Unity Council, the AmeriCorps, the Redevelopment Agency, OUSD, and KQED and local neighborhood volunteers. All direct work, cost and upkeep for this "Gift-in-Place" will be incurred by these partners.

BACKGROUND

In 2002 Walter Hood Design, a nationally recognized landscape architecture firm was hired to produce a conceptual plan for the new Cesar Chavez Park. This plan received wide input and support from community stakeholders who use or wish to make better use of this central Fruitvale District Park. Part of these concept plans called for a community deck at the front end of the park. Working with the Unity Council, the Fremont High School Construction Academy and an affiliated volunteer contractors group, and the SDS team IV, City Redevelopment staff took the opportunity to focus on the proposed deck as a "design-build" starting point to further the on-going reclamation of the Park and as a way to increase connections and involvement in the concurrent Foothill Streetscape Project which will dramatically transform the entrance area and street-edge of the park. After gaining approval from the PRAC for this deck in June of 2006, and after required permitting review by Planning and Building, the proposed deck was built as a volunteer gift-in-place. Other phases of park improvements also included planting trees, planting flowering vines, restoring the mosaic tiles at the front planter and creek clean-ups.

This deck and initial landscaping additions are envisioned as a first phase of further improvements to the park. While City Project Delivery is now moving ahead to finalize plans for the larger restoration of the tot-lot and basketball court and other facilities, the Council and community stakeholder team wishes to begin in parallel sequence moving ahead with the second phase of minor "design-build" landscaping installations. The timing of overall Park reconstruction is still to be determined and still awaiting significant identification of gap funding (approximately \$1.5 needed). The second-phase of landscape installations are to be done as immediate short-term projects that are compatible with the overall design plans and consistent with the goals of the community stakeholders for the park and the existing uses of the park.

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Second Phase Landscape Installations include a designed mural backdrop to the deck. The purpose of this backdrop is functional, to help prevent the accumulation of debris behind the deck and aesthetic — to provide an engaging community art-piece that speaks to the cultural history an division of the park and creates an "outdoor" museum effect when such murals (3-8) are distributed at intervals along the fence (see below).

The murals are significant in bringing the work and energy of many Fruitvale residents together. The design ideas were initialized via a community-wide art contest. Winners were chosen from youth below 12, teenagers, and young adults above 18. The initial designs were then developed into high-quality art-paintings through a special Fall art studio held at Calvin Simmons Academy with Middle School students. KQED has been directly supporting this art studio and has made commitments to showcase the finished murals temporarily in the Oakland Museum and created a film documentary as well. The backdrop for the murals are being designed and reviewed by the Fremont Construction Academy and the City Building Department for all applicable life-safety code issues.

In addition to the mural backdrop, the community stakeholders have also identified other elements which, pending funding would be appropriate to include in the next design phase of park improvements. These elements include building/installing seating/tables on the deck; building/installing a low decorative seating wall framing the lawn adjacent to the deck and mural; creating a mural in the County Flood ROW along the Peralta Creek; and installing a decorative low-flow "lilly-pad" fountain inside the existing mosaic planter at the Foothill Blvd. entrance.

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RECOMMENDATION

Staff requests and recommends the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission to endorse this proposal and associated "Right of Entry" for these aesthetic "gift-in-place" augmentations to Cesar Chavez Park. This endorsement will enable specific plans and details to be submitted to Planning and Building for final review and approval.








Above: Finished Deck. Murals will be part of a backdrop that will cover the existing chain-link fence.

Students build community while constructing deck in César Chávez Park

Youth and other community volunteers were honored by the city of Oakland for their work to improve César Chávez Park during a public celebration on Friday.

A unique collaboration between students from Fremont High School's Construction Technology and Architecture Academy, Unity Council volunteers, community residents and the city's Neighborhood Commercial Revitalization staff resulted in construction of a 1,200-square-foot wooden deck. The multi-functional deck will provide seating for visitors and serve as a stage for community

events held at the park.

"It is important that we honor the youth who spent countless
hours on this project," said City
Council President Ignacio De
La Fuente. "This is the perfect
type of project that engages local youth in meaningful ways in
their community. The students
have done a great job and the
fruits of their labor will be enjoyed for generations to come."

After a semester of instruction, 25 students from Fremoni High School's Construction Technology and Architecture Academy spent five Saturdays building the deck. While learning about community develop-

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
ment and civic engagement, the youth gained real life design and construction experience that could lead to apprenticeship opportunities.

On-site mentoring was provided by the East Bay Nation of Men. Volunteers from the Unity Council and local residents were also a part of the convergence of supporters that made the park improvement project possible. Participants logged more than 1,000 hours of volunteer labor to complete the deck.

The deck is part of the larger Foothill Streetscape Renovation Project that will eventually transform Foothill Boulevard between Fruitvale Avenue and High Street.

"The deck is a beginning foundation for creating positive relationship between teenagers and the local community," said Mikel McCaig, construction educator at Fremont High School's Construction Technology and Architecture Academy.

The deck was envisioned earlier this decade when the César Chávez Park revitalization master plan was drafted by Oakland's Walter Hood, a nationally renowned landscape architect.
