Public Works Agency Requests Recommendation of the Design and Implementation of the Measure DD – Sail Boat House Shoreline Improvements Project to the Planning Commission for the Design Review Application. Staff from the Public Works Agency (PWA) and the Office of Parks and Recreation request approval of the design and implementation of the Measured DD – Sailboat House Shoreline Improvement Project. The project includes improvements to the 1,100 feet of shoreline in front of the Sailboat House,

parking, ADA Pathway/Access, restroom, lighting and creation of a natural shoreline. This project will complete the pedestrian link around Lake Merritt. The existing boat ramp will be reconstructed and improve the launches from the structure. All of the improvements will provide an attractive entry for the Sailboat House, thereby improving its "curb appeal as a rental facility and providing a space for outdoor gatherings.

SUMMARY

The Office of Parks and Recreation received a request from the Tamu Orphans Support Fund, a non-profit organization, for permission to sell food, wine, African artifacts and allow collection of funds from entry fees, auction and raffle at their Crab Feed to be held at the Lake Merritt Sailboat House on Saturday, January 26, 2013. All funds raised will support orphaned and vulnerable children supported by the Tamu Orphans Support Fund.

FISCAL IMPACT

There will be no fiscal impact. The organization is paying all fees associated with the event.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The crab feed will serve crab, bread, salsa, pasta and dessert. Water will be available free to guests but wine will be sold by the glass or per bottle. Raffle tickets will be sold before and during dinner. Miscellaneous African artifacts and fabrics will be available for sale through the evening by Board Members and miscellaneous items will be auctioned after dinner.

The following funds are being requested to collect on site:

- 1. TOSF will sell \$50 tickets in advance of the event but would like to collect \$50 per person at the door for guests who might bring additional people.
- 2. Raffle tickets to be sold for \$5 for 5 tickets or \$20 for a set of tickets. Raffle wins will include cash or miscellaneous gift items.
- 3. Wine to be sold at \$4 per glass or \$15 per bottle.
- 4. Auction items ranging in value from \$10 to \$300 will be available for bidding.
- 5. African sale items ranging in price from \$2 to \$50.

BACKGROUND

The Tamu Orphans Support Fund (TOSF) is an organization dedicated to providing a comprehensive early life support system for AIDS-orphaned children in Tamu, Kenya. Funds raised by TOSF helps to provide for the basic needs of sponsored children, including food, water and clothing, shelter, medical care and access to education. TOSF's philosophy is to place children in a home-based environment rather than an orphanage in the belief that a family environment with community support best provides for their growth and development.

This is a proposal from Tamu Orphans Support Fund (TOSF) to rent The Lake Merritt Sail Boat House for a fundraising crab feed scheduled for January 26, 2013 from 6pm to 10pm. During the crab feed we will serve and sell wine, sell African artifacts, have auctions and raffles as noted below. All funds raised at the crab feed will support orphaned and vulnerable children supported by TOSF.

TOSF was founded and achieved 501(c)(3) charitable organization status in 2010. We are dedicated to providing a comprehensive early life support system for AIDS-orphaned children in Tamu, Kenya. TOSF is based in Northern California, with a nine-member Board of Directors. Funds raised by TOSF helps to provide for the basic needs of our sponsored children, including food, water and clothing; shelter; medical care; and access to education. We are passionate about bringing forth a nurturing environment coupled with the gift of education. Our philosophy is to place children in a home-based environment rather than an orphanage in the belief that a family environment with community support best provides for their growth and development.

The crab feed will serve crab, bread, salad, pasta and dessert. Water will be available free to guests but wine will be sold by the glass or per bottle; raffle tickets will be sold before and during dinner; miscellaneous African artifacts and fabrics will be available for sale throughout the evening by Board Members; and miscellaneous items will be auctioned after dinner. TOSF will apply for ABC 221 from Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control to allow temporary sale of wine at the crab feed.

Funds will be collected on site for the following:

- 1. TOSF will sell \$50 tickets in advance of the crab feed. However, a few paid guests might bring additional people so we may collect \$50 per person at the door.
- 2. Raffle tickets will be sold for \$5 for 5 or an arms-length for \$20. Raffle wins will include cash or miscellaneous gift items.

3. Wine will be sold for \$4 by the glass or \$15 per bottle.

4. Auction items ranging in value from \$10 to \$300 will be available for bidding. Auction items are not known at this time but may include jewelry (\$20), wine packages (\$30), kitchen appliance (30), and other items donated for auction.

5. African sale items will include jewelry (ranging in price from \$2 to \$20), fabric (ranging in price from \$5 to \$20), and art batiks (ranging in price from \$5 to \$50).



SUMMARY

The City of Oakland Municipal Code section 12.64.110, provides that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission may fix the hours during which the parks, or any particular park, is open to public use. Staff has prepared and is requesting approval of a comprehensive list of city parks with corresponding hours in which the park is open for public use.

FISCAL IMPACT

There will be no other fiscal impact then the cost to produce Park Rules/Hours signs, many of which are old and worn and have been slated for replacement since 2010. There is no loss of revenue anticipated as any event going beyond designated hours would require, as it does now, an approved permit from the Office of Parks and Recreation (OPR) and when required, approval from the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission (PRAC).

BACKGROUND

Incidents of crime and unhealthy activities in Oakland parks have increased over the past years. In addition, parks in Oakland have undergone changes where designation of parks and or park hours may have become convoluted. One step towards reducing undesirable behavior in parks is to clearly define public use hours. The PRAC is granted the authority to designate park hours and has done so in the past, but these hours have never been collected into one easily accessible document. Staff has prepared such a document that it believes will fulfill the need for information and better serve park users. The hours listed on the attached reflect the type of use at each park. For example, a park which contains a recreation center has park hours of 6:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. reflecting the hours of the recreation center. Other parks such as Pocket Parks are designated open from dawn to dusk to reflect community use.

RECOMMENDATION

The Office of Parks and Recreation recommends the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission approve the attached resolution designating City of Oakland parks and park hours
