SUMMARY

Oakland Parks & Recreation (OPR) received a request from Don Link, of the Shattuck Neighborhood Crime Prevention Council, (SNCPC), to host and collect funds at their Community Garage Sale Fundraiser at Bushrod Park on Saturday, August 16, 2014. Proceeds from this SNCPC and Oakland Parks and Recreation event will benefit the organization's community policing activities.

FISCAL IMPACT

Fees for the park use include \$30 Permit Application Fee, \$400 park use fees (\$50 per hour for 8 hours). There will be no other fiscal impact on the Parks & Recreation.

BACKGROUND

The SNCPC has been in existence since September 1994, making it the oldest NCPC in Oakland. The SNCPC has held an annual sale at Bushrod Park almost every year since 1997. Oakland Parks and Recreation has documentation of the annual garage sale by the SNCPC since 2002. The SNCPC made presentations before PRAC in 2007, 2008 and 2009 and was granted approval for co-sponsorship and authorization to collect funds from the fundraiser.

The 2012 event was administratively approved due to the timing of the request and past history. The 2013 event raised approximately \$1,400.00. The proceeds from the sale were used to fund SNCPC operations such as meeting flyers, general meeting rental fees at the North Oakland Senior Center, meeting supplies, refreshments and support of Bushrod Park activities. In 2012, the SNCPC provided Bushrod Recreation Center with \$800.00 to fund camp scholarships for 17 youth whose families were unable to afford to fees.

SUMMARY.

The City of Oakland's Parks and Recreation, Carmen Flores Recreation Center at Josie de la Cruz Park will host its 4th Annual Carmen Flores Day of Music in the Park on Sunday, August 17, 2014. The event will take place at Josie de la Cruz Park from 11:00am-6:00pm. In partnership, Oakland Parks and Recreation staff and the Flores Family request the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission grant permission for the organizers to fundraise for the event and where the proceeds collected will then pay for overhead costs. The majority of the funds will be used to pay the scholarships for Carmen Flores Recreation Center children and youth unable to afford to fees.

The Carmen Flores Day of Music in the Park is an annual event where the City of Oakland Parks and Recreation partner with the Flores Family to bring the community together to enjoy live music, entertainment, food, arts, crafts and a kid's fun zone. The City of Oakland provides the park location and the family helps to coordinated the event, volunteers the day of the event, donates food to sell, they bring the bands, as well as helping to seek vendors from the community.

The event brings over 500 families to the park every year. It is always a peaceful event where people dance and kids enjoying the festivities. The event was inspired and put together by the Flores family in honor of their mother Carmen Flores who was an activist here in the Fruitvale community.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

For this year's event, we plan to host food and art vendors who will pay for a spot in the park to sell their food and goods. The vendors will be chosen by committee members and are seeking them from the Fruitvale community first. Vendors will pay for their spot in the festival by check or money order paid to the Friends of Oakland. Bands will be selected by the Flores family and will play music on two stages, one main stage for all our adult bands and another for our youth bands and entertainment. There will be a percussion booth, jumpers, crafts, and face painting. We will serve the Oakland community and beyond.

FISCAL IMPACT

At our 1st Annual Carmen Flores Day of Music in the Park, all of the musicians donated their time for the event and everything was free of charge. This past year at our 2nd Annual Carmen Flores Day of Music in the Park we had a total of five local restaurants, four artists, and three local community groups that set up booths. The fees generated came out to be \$1,050.00. We also held a raffle that

generated \$550.00. We generated a total of \$1,600 dollars that day, which was deposited in the Friends of Parks and Recreation Account for future use of scholarship programs. This year we would like to follow the same plan as the year before, inviting local restaurants and artist to show up and support our community. The 3rd music in the park fees generated came out to be \$1, 2500. We also held a raffle that generated \$550.00. We generated a total of \$1,800.00 dollars that day, which was deposited in the Friends of Parks and Recreation Account for future use of scholarship programs. This year we would like to follow the same plan as the year before, inviting local restaurants and artist to show up and support our community. RECOMMENDATION



SUMMARY

Oakland Parks and Recreation has received a request from the San Francisco Mime Troupe (SFMT), a non-profit organization, for permission to collect donations by passing a hat and selling event related merchandise at Montclair Ball Field on Wednesday, July 30, 2014 and at Lakeside Park on Wednesday, August 6 and Thursday, August 7, 2014. The funds collected will help cover the cost for the season. A Post Event Report is attached from the 2013 events at these locations.

FISCAL IMPACT

There will be no fiscal impact on the Oakland Parks and Recreation. The SFMT will pay rental and sound fees for all three dates.

BACKGROUND

This is the 55th year that the SFMT has performed in Bay Area parks with free theatrical performances. The SFMT has rented Montclair and Lakeside Park in the past and has come before the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission for approval for collection of donations and selling event related merchandise. The events have been well attended and went as planned.

The type of merchandise that will be available for the public to purchase will be San Francisco Mime Troupe hats, shirts, recorded music, books, and bags. The cost of the merchandise ranges from: 1) hats - \$22, 2) shirts - \$16 to \$30, 3) DVDs - \$20; CDs - \$5, 4) sweatshirt - \$45, 6) books - \$22.

In 2013, the SFMT rented two park sites, Montclair Park and Lakeside Park. They collected on site donations at all two parks. The amount that was collected at Montclair Park - \$847; and Lakeside Park - \$3,547. The Post Event Report at all three park sites is attached.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission approve the San Francisco Mime Troupe's request to collect donations and sell event related merchandise at the free theatre performances at Montclair Ball Field on Wednesday, July 30, 2014 and Lakeside Park on Wednesday, August 6 and Thursday, August 7, 2014.

The group is aware that additional permits are required provided their request to collect donations and sell event related merchandise is granted.

The Oakland Parks and Recreation Department is requesting that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission (PRAC) consider approval of the design for the proposed Driving Range Improvement Project, located at Lake Chabot Golf Course, and provide a recommendation for approval of the Major Conditional Use Permit for the Project. The project generally consists of regrading the existing range to provide a lineof-site to 230 yards from the tee boxes to the end of the range, adding 6 tee boxes to provide a total of 18 tee boxes, removing and replacing the paving at the tee boxes to provide a level surface and improved safety setbacks, providing ADA access to the tee boxes, providing irrigation and grass cover to the range and providing stormwater treatment facilities.

Touchstone Golf, LLC, is responsible for implementing the proposed project on the behalf of the City. Touchstone Golf, LLC is under contract with the City of Oakland to manage and operate the Lake Chabot Golf Course for the Office of Parks and Recreation.

FISCAL IMPACT

The Office of Parks and Recreation has identified a planning budget of \$550,000 for the Driving Range Improvement Project from the Golf Course Fund 3200.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The proposed driving range improvements will provide a place where participants in youth programs, Oakland residents, and visitors and can go to practice and learn the game of golf at a range that resembles golf course conditions. Currently, many golfers go to other driving ranges so they can practice with all their clubs and the youth programs that utilize the range have to contend with a seriously substandard facility.

Additional elements of the project include the following:

• The project would involve the excavation and filling of approximately 38,000 cubic yards of soil over a project foot-print of 6 acres.

- There are two creeks located near the project site. The project will be designed to treat all stormwater runoff coming from the improved driving range site to preserve water quality.
- The project is being reviewed and coordinated with East Bay Regional Park District, East Bay Municipal Utility District and the City's Stormwater and Watershed Program.
- A maximum of 7 protected coast live oak trees may be removed as part of the proposed project.
 Measures are being explored to preserve the impacted trees. If it is necessary to remove the trees, they would be replaced in kind on a two for one basis at appropriate locations near the driving range.

Please refer to the attached preliminary site plans and sections.

BACKGROUND

The City of Oakland owns the Lake Chabot Golf Course property located at 11450 Golf Links Road, Oakland, CA 94605, APN: 048-5813-033-04. Touchstone Golf has managed and operated the course since April of 2007. The property consists of an 18-hole and 9-hole golf course, a small driving range, cart storage, maintenance facility, and clubhouse. Both courses operate 7 days a week from sun up to sunset.

In October of 2006, Touchstone consulted with the City of Oakland, Office of Parks and Recreation (OPR) to restore Lake Chabot Golf Course. The project has been very successful in improving the quality of the golf experience, usage and community outreach. Furthermore, the improvements thus far have resulted in a golf course which is economically self-sufficient. As the manager of Lake Chabot Golf Course, one of the goals Touchstone and OPR share is the expansion of our community outreach to grow opportunities for youths and local residents to learn the game of golf and important life skills.

In April of 2012 PRAC approved the design and construction of a new driving range at the Lake Chabot Golf Course on the former landfill that the City used until approximately 1990. Unfortunately, the cost of developing the site was not practical from a financial standpoint due to environmental remediation; therefore, the new plan involves the improvement and expansion of the current driving range site.

Youth Programs – The Lake Chabot Golf Course is the perfect venue to introduce inner-city youths to the game of golf. Specifically, Lake Chabot will serve as the host course providing facilities and access to the game at minimal costs. The course currently hosts 3 junior golf programs; Lake Chabot Junior Golf Academy, ACE for Kids, and The First Tee. The current challenge is not having adequate practice facilities to service all three groups — Which in combination service over 1.000 youths a year. The improved driving range will allow us to better support these groups which offer low-income youths a life-changing experience.

RECOMMENDATION



Staff recommends that the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission approve the request for vendors and onsite collection of money for the sales of merchandise and food.



Oakland Parks and Recreation (OPR) received a proposal from the Oakland Girls Softball League (OGSL) to renovate the existing field at the Hellman Recreation Area located at 3400 Malcolm Avenue. The Hellman Recreation Area has been selected for renovation due to:

1) Deteriorating site conditions (backstop, drainage, bleachers etc.)

2) Underutilized space and inefficient use of existing capacity

3) Prime location for diverse and expanding user groups

FISCAL IMPACT

This project brings no foreseen fiscal impact to the City of Oakland. OGSL will develop and execute a stewardship and use agreement plan with the City of Oakland for 3-5 years with an option and every intention to renew. OGSL is actively raising funds to support the full scope of the proposed field improvements with the support of OPR.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

OGSL proposes to raise private funds to renovate the existing park and field to include:

- 1. Redesign existing single use field to provide (2) two fields to allow (1) one regulation 12U/14U High School field and (1) one smaller field for little league players
- 2. Grade existing site and install new drainage
- 3. Install new bleachers, dugout, batting cages and bullpen
- 4. Install new "snack shack", storage shed and equipment boxes
- 5. Upgrade existing play equipment and relocate swings
- 6. Upgrade restrooms
- 7. Relocate drinking fountains
- 8. Install manual scoreboard
- 9. Re-sod outfield
- 10. Install significant chain link fence for field separation and safety
- 11. Add moveable outfield fencing

OPR received a proposal from OGSL to renovate the existing field at the Hellman Recreation area to provide two fields instead of one for the diverse and expanding user groups of Oakland. OGSL has over 269 girls who currently participate in spring softball age 14 and under and 6 and under.

Staff recommends the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission accept an informational report for the Hellman Recreation Area Arnold Kelly Memorial Field Renovation Project.



Oakland Parks and Recreation received a request from the Tamu Orphans Support Fund, a non-profit organization, for permission to sell food, wine, African artifacts and allow collection of funds from entry fees, auction and raffle at their Crab Feed to be held at the Lake Merritt Sailboat House on Saturday, February 7, 2015. All funds raised will support AIDS orphaned and vulnerable children supported by the Tamu Orphans Support Fund (TOSF).

FISCAL IMPACT

There is a positive fiscal impact. The organization is paying all fees associated with the rental of the event.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The event will consist of the serving of crab, bread, salsa, pasta and dessert. Water will be available free to guests but wine will be sold by the glass or per bottle. Raffle tickets will be sold before and during dinner. Miscellaneous African artifacts and fabrics will be available for sale through the evening by Board Members and miscellaneous items will be auctioned after dinner.

The following funds are being requested to collect on site:

1. TOSF will sell \$45 tickets in advance of the event but would like to collect \$45 per person at the door for guests who might bring additional people.

2. Raffle tickets to be sold for \$5 for 5 tickets or \$20 for a set of tickets. Raffle wins will include cash or miscellaneous gift items donated by board members.

3. Wine to be sold at \$4 per glass or \$15 per bottle.

4. Auction items ranging in value from \$10 to \$300 will be available for bidding. Auction items are not known at this time but may include jewelry (\$20), wine packages (\$30) and other donated items.

5. African sale items will include jewelry (ranging in price from \$2 to \$20), fabric (ranging in price from \$5 to \$20) and art batiks (ranging in price from \$5 to \$50).

BACKGROUND

This is the TOSF's third year hosting the event. The last two events were held at the Lake Merritt Sailboat House in 2012 and 2013. The TOSF came before the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission in 2011 and 2012 with the same request and was granted approval. TOSF collected \$450 on-site for entrance fees at \$45 per person for the event held in February 2014. The 2014 Post Event Report is attached.

The TOSF was founded and achieved non-profit charitable organization status in 2010. The organization is dedicated to providing a comprehensive early life support system for AIDS-orphaned children in Tamu, Kenya. Funds raised by TOSF help to provide for the basic needs of sponsored children that include food, water and clothing, shelter, medical care and access to education. TOSF's philosophy is to place children in a home-based environment rather than an orphanage in the belief that a family environment with community support best provides for the child's growth and development.

AT CONCORDIA PARK

SUMMARY

Oakland Parks and Recreation (OPR) received a proposal from KaBoom, a national non-profit Organization to build a community garden at Concordia Park in order to encourage healthy eating, active living and encourage community engagement. Kaboom proposes to install 5-10 garden beds at Concordia Park to include a storage shed, hose bib and fencing.

FISCAL IMPACT

There will be no fiscal impact to Oakland Parks and Recreation. Kaboom has partnered with Girls, Inc.; an Oakland based non-profit organization to assume regular stewardship responsibilities with an amendment to the existing use agreement with the City of Oakland Parks and Recreation. Kaboom and Girls, Inc. have also secured a funder for the City of Oakland Minor Conditional Use Permit application and all project materials. All installation labor will be volunteer.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Kaboom and Girls, Inc. propose to install a community garden at Concordia Park consisting of 5-10 garden beds, a boundary fence, hose bib and storage shed.

BACKGROUND

The City of Oakland has worked with Kaboom to complete several projects in recent years including Wade Johnson and Tomas Melero Park for Peace and Unity, Rainbow Skate Park, Arroyo Viejo Field and Burckhalter Park. Concordia Park was selected due to its proximity to engaged community partners and the need to increase active and healthy uses of the park.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission accept the application for a minor conditional use permit for a community garden at Concordia Park.

Request for the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission to recommend

renaming the basketball courts at San Antonio Park to "Raimondas Šarūnas

Marčiulionis Courts"

SUMMARY

Since 1999, Oakland Parks and Recreation (OPR) has received significant material and labor donations from private partners including the Golden State Warriors (GSW) the Good Tidings Foundation (GTF) and Pacific Gas & Electric (PG&E) to renovate over a dozen worn basketball courts and heavily used ball fields in Oakland, totaling more than \$450,000. Most recently OPR partnered with GSW, GTF and PG&E to renovate courts at Brookdale and deFremery park, basketball courts and rename the Arroyo courts after National Basketball Association (NBA) Hall of Fame inductee Chris Mullin. In honor of recent Hall of Fame inductee and former Golden State Warrior NBA Sixth Man of the Year, Raimondas Šarūnas Marčiulionis, OPR requests the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission recommend renaming the basketball courts at San Antonio Park, the "Raimondas Šarūnas Marčiulionis" Basketball Courts.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no fiscal impact to the City of Oakland.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Office of Parks and Recreation recommends renaming the basketball courts at San Antonio Park after former Golden State Warrior and recent NBA Hall of Fame inductee, Raimondas Šarūnas Marčiulionis, signified by a plaque not to exceed 36" x 36" to be installed in honor of the dedication and contribution of GSW, GTD and PG&E. The project will include removal of the existing worn hoop systems and installation of new NBA hoop systems and new state of the art basketball court playing surface.

BACKGROUND

OPR staff has received numerous requests from community members, parents, players, coaches and staff to renovate the basketball courts at San Antonio Park. OPR was successful in securing funding from the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) to upgrade the recreation center and surrounding park lighting, and recently scheduled installation of new LED lights for the basketball courts. GSW approached OPR for a tour of potential court renovations; San Antonio was selected as the next on a list of several for renovation through this partnership. Despite a language barrier during his NBA career (Warriors coach Don Nelson hired his son Donnie as an assistant chiefly to serve as an interpreter for Marčiulionis), Marčiulionis was a devoted teammate and active in the communities he played in. In the aftermath of the 1989 San Francisco earthquake, Marčiulionis appeared at the site of a commuter train accident wearing his Warriors warm up outfit and helped by

pulling out trapped passengers and administering first aid. Marčiulionis was drafted by the Golden State Warriors in the 6th round of the 1987 NBA Draft. He moved to the NBA in 1989 and he played four years with the Warriors, finishing as the runner-up for the Sixth Man of the Year-Award in both 1992 and 1993. Marčiulionis became one of the first Europeans to get significant playing time in the NBA, helping to lead the way for the internationalization of the league in the late 1990s.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission accept and recommend renaming the San Antonio Park basketball courts after Raimondas Šarūnas Marčiulionis, a former Golden State Warrior, NBA Sixth Man of the Year and recent NBA Hall of Fame inductee.
