  PUBLIC HEARING TO REVIEW AND ACCEPT THE COLISEUM AREA SPECIFIC
  PLAN. The purpose of this public hearing is to solicit comments from the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission (PRAC) and the public on the Draft Coliseum Area Specific Plan (Draft Specific Plan) and Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR); and associated General Plan amendments, Planning Code amendments (text and map changes), and new Design Guidelines (Related Documents).

#### 8. NEW BUSINESS:

A. THE PAN AFRICAN FAMILY REUNION IS REQUESTING THE PARKS AND RECREATION ADVISORY COMMISSION APPROVAL FOR VENDORS AND ONSITE COLLECTION OF MONEY FOR ITEMS SOLD AND DONATIONS FOR THEIR 4<sup>TH</sup> ANNUAL EVENT HELD AT MOSSWOOD PARK ON SEPTEMBER 1, 2014. The Pan African Family Reunion (sponsored by the FRIENDS OF OAKLAND PARKS AND RECREATION) is an annual free event on September 1, 2014 from 11am to 7pm at Mosswood Park. The event attracts approximately 2000 attendees and outreaches to communities from all over the African Diaspora and all over the Bay Area, with a strong focus on Oakland and the East Bay. The grant's purpose is to underwrite the Phase I construction of a new skateboard park at deFremery Park. The new skateboard park will replace the existing park (currently constructed with used wooden ramps) with state-of-the-art concrete ramps. FOPR is the fiscal sponsor and advocate for this project, which will serve children and teenagers, from all parts of Oakland.

# **SUMMARY**

Oakland Parks & Recreation has received a request from the United Negro College Fund, Inc., a non-profit organization, to collect donations at the 29<sup>th</sup> Annual Walk-A-Thon for Education at Lakeside Park on Saturday, October 4, 2014. The Walk for Education helps to raise funds for minority students endeavoring to fulfill their educational dreams. There is no Post Event Report attached from last year (2013); The United Negro College Fund Inc., did not use Oakland Parks & Recreation rental space to host their event.

# FISCAL IMPACT

There is no fiscal impact on Oakland Parks & Recreation. The United Negro College fund is paying all rental fees for event held at Lakeside Park.

#### BACKGROUND

The United Negro College Fund, Inc. (UNCF) has held its Walk-A-Thon for Education at Lakeside Park for many years. The UNCF came before the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission for the last seven years and was approved for collection of donations and pledges. The event draws approximately 400 people who participate in a 5K walk.

For 69 years, the UNCF has provided funding to support 37 private, historically black colleges and universities and financial assistance to over 60,000 students nationwide who attend the schools.

PINCC's mission is to create sustainable programs that prevent cervical cancer by educating women, training medical personnel, and equipping facilities in developing countries, utilizing proven, low cost, accessible technology methods. ## **SUMMARY**

We are partnering with Culture Strike and legendary Bay Area Artist Favianna Rodriguez to present an art engagement project focused on stories of migration.

Activities include a vibrant Kids Zone, a mini Film Festival, an Art Engagement Area, Health Screenings, and more.
- The Karl Watson Sk8 Day Contest and Jam Hood Games once again presents this
  historic event at Town Park. The goal is to engage as many West Oakland youth and
  youth around the city who skate in a single day contest. The day is dedicated to a
  legendary African American Skater, to challenge the dominant narrative suggesting
  African American youth do not skate. The Hood Games Stage also features local artists
  and youth friendly performers.
- The Living Word Stage (Main Stage) We will hold a mid afternoon outdoor concert in
  the park in the midst of the public outdoor installation-in-progress activities of the graffiti
  showcase and Eco Empowerment Festival. Performances the Brave New Voices Bay
  Area Slam Team, as well as high-level local and commercial artists. This year our
  Headline Artists is Black Thought from the Roots, and local artist Rico Pabon. We will
  also have another historic performance from Oaklands own Young Gifted and Black.
- The Hip Hop Dream Stage (Park Stage) We will hold an all day jam featuring an outdoor concert, dj's and a youth Hip Hop Cipher on a stage in the middle of the park. This stage will feature Mik Nawooj, an Ensemble orchestra playing Hip Hop music. We will also have two of the best Beat Boxers in the world Ready Yo and Soulati, on this stage in the later part of the day.
- The Oakland Bandits Girls Softball Tournament and Clinic In partnership with the
  Oakland Bandits Softball Club, Life is Living will host a friendly tournament featuring three
  Girls Softball teams ages 12U. These players and coaches will also provide introductory
  instruction to girls from the greater Oakland community who are interested in softball and
  girls athletics. The Clinic will feature special guests, including former high school and
  college players.
- Reflections of Healing: Gallery in the Park In partnership with Brett Cook Dizney, this iteration of the Reflections of Healing campaign will feature the unveiling of a semi permanent installation of four Reflections Portraits, with opportunities for Festival Participants to engage with the ideas and words of the subjects through art.
- Life is Living Marketplace Vendors are selected based on their products commitment
  to the art and culture of Oakland, and their alignment with sustainable practices. These
  vendors include Clothing, food, crafts, art, and a variety of other locally sourced products.
  Vendors pay a nominal fee to participate and have any permits and coordination handled
  for them. Vendors keep 100% of their profits from the day.

## **SUMMARY**

Valarie Kalb and Jenny Greenburg representing the Temescal Masters swim team (Masters) contacted the City requesting approval to dedicate a tree and decorative boulder to honor their friend, teammate and long time Masters swim coach Karin Hurley, who passed away in 2013.

The request is to plant a Strawberry tree near the driveway at the west end of the front yard of Temescal Pool located at 371 45<sup>th</sup> Street. The Strawberry tree, Arbutus Marina, is a slow growth, low water use tree that flowers and bears non-edible fruit. A decorative boulder approximately 2.5' x 2.5' x 2.5' with an 8" x 10" bronze plaque will be installed at the base of the tree. The plaque will contain a mermaid design and read:

Karin Masal Hurley, Mermaid Warrior, 1970 – 2013 Beloved swim coach, spouse, mother, friend

Ms. Kalb has coordinated with Giacomo Damonte of Oakland Public Works (OPW) regarding the selection of the tree and boulder, location, and installation process. OPW will oversee installation of both the tree and boulder with plaque. The City and the existing volunteer gardeners at Temescal Pool will collaborate to maintain the tree and plaque.

## FISCAL IMPACT

There is no negative fiscal impact to Oakland Parks & Recreation. The total cost is expected to be \$1,400 and includes the purchase of the tree, boulder and plaque as well as estimated cost for irrigation equipment. Temescal Masters Swim Team's initial donation supplemented by privately donated funds will be used to purchase the tree, boulder and plaque.

## **BACKGROUND**

Karin Masal Hurley was the Head Coach of the Temescal Masters swim team for eight years until she retired in 2012, and was an assistant coach for several years before that. As head coach, Karin not only inspired and educated a large group of adult Masters swimmers, she also organized annual Swim-a-thons to raise funds for Oakland youth swimming programs. Karin barely missed qualifying for the Olympic swimming trials in 1988. In addition to her love of swimming, she was a beloved spouse and a mother to three young children. She was active in the parents' community for Peralta Elementary School, which two of her children still attend. She had completed a degree in Criminal Justice and was looking forward to starting a new job with the Federal government when she was diagnosed with breast cancer. She died in December 2013 at the age of 43. Karin touched many, many lives in a positive way, and the community misses her greatly.

Because Karin was loved by so many people, members of the Masters team and wider Temescal community conceived the idea to plant a tree and install a plaque in her honor at Temescal Pool. In this way, they seek to memorialize and celebrate her life in a permanent way at a place she loved.



## **SUMMARY**

The purpose of this public hearing is to solicit comments from the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission (PRAC) and the public on the Draft Coliseum Area Specific Plan (Draft Specific Plan) and Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR); and associated General Plan amendments, Planning Code amendments (text and map changes), and new Design Guidelines (Related Documents). These implementation documents will help guide the future development and built character of the 800-acre Specific Plan Area (Plan Area), by providing detailed guidance on new sports and entertainment facilities, residential and commercial neighborhoods, streets and public areas, and new and restored open spaces. One of the six goals of the Plan is to:

Create enhanced open space, Bay access, and natural habitat opportunities that will restore natural habitat, and create public educational and Bay accessibility opportunities for Oakland and Bay Area residents.

The focus of this memorandum is to present information to guide a discussion and generate comments by the Commission and the public on the proposals for open spaces and public spaces which are currently included in the Draft Coliseum Area Specific Plan (see **Chapter 4: Community Design**). The full draft of the proposed new zoning chapter and General Plan amendments will be presented at an upcoming Zoning Update Committee (ZUC) meeting in November, as described in the "Next Steps" section of this report.

The Draft Specific Plan can be viewed online at <a href="www.oaklandnet.com/coliseumcity">www.oaklandnet.com/coliseumcity</a> (under the section called 'Plans, Documents, and Presentations') and then click on Chapter 4, Community Design. The Draft Environmental Impact Report (released August 22, 2014) and Notice of Availability (NOA) may be reviewed at the City's Current Environmental Review Documents webpage:

http://www2.oaklandnet.com/Government/o/PBN/OurServices/Application/DOWD009157 (see Row #23).

Print copies of the Coliseum Area Specific Plan and DEIR are also available at no charge at the Department of Planning and Building, 250 Frank H. Ogawa Plaza, Suite 3315, Oakland, CA 94612, or for review at the Oakland Public Library, Social Science and Documents, 125 14th Street, Oakland CA 94612.

PLAN AREA BOUNDARY

The Plan Area covers approximately 800 acres, and is generally bounded by 66th Avenue and East Creek Slough to the north, San Leandro Street to the east, Hegenberger Road to the south, and San Leandro Bay and the Oakland International Airport to the west. The Plan Area is divided for Specific Plan purposes into five Sub-Areas, A-E (see **Exhibit A**). For ease of comprehension, the current Coliseum/Arena site and Coliseum BART station are designated as Sub Area A; the Oakland Airport Business Park as Sub-Areas, B, C and D, and the open space and East Bay Municipal Utility District-owned lands between Damon Slough and East Creek Slough as Sub Area E.

## FISCAL IMPACT

The fiscal impacts to the Office of Parks and Recreation, should the City Council adopt the Coliseum Area Specific Plan, have not yet been determined. Preliminary negotiations between the City and the development team (led by JRDV Urban International, under an Exclusive Negotiating Agreement [ENA] with the City) have not yet identified the projected costs to improve, maintain and operate the proposed new and restored public open spaces in the Draft Specific Plan, nor have these discussions identified the source or the entity/ies responsible for future maintenance and operation. **Chapter 7** of the Draft Specific Plan includes many potential funding sources which might be used to pay for different elements of the Plan, such as the proposed new and restored open spaces. Any new publically-accessible open space created on private property, however, will be the responsibility of the owner of that property to maintain.

## PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Coliseum Area Specific Plan supports comprehensive new development in the Plan Area over the next 20-25 years, including opportunities for retention of Oakland's three major professional sports teams. To compare open space resources as they exist today to those in the Draft Specific Plan, this report will first present the existing conditions for park and open space resources, followed by the Draft Plan's proposals for park and open space, then analysis of impacts to current facilities.

# 1. Existing Open Space Resources in the Plan Area

Table 1 details the size and ownership of open space resources in the Plan Area.

## City of Oakland Office of Parks and Recreation (OPR)

OPR operates no parks within the Plan Area, but does operate two soccer fields ("Oak Port") within Sub-Area E. Several City parks are within a mile of the Plan Area, including Coliseum Gardens Park (4.85 acres) at 966 66<sup>th</sup> Avenue, Tassafaronga Park and Recreation Center (2.5 acres) at 85<sup>th</sup> Avenue & E Street, Patterson Park/Brookfield Village Park (14 Acres) at 9175 Edes Avenue, and Columbian Gardens Park (2.33 acres) at 9920 Empire Road. OPR also operates several community recreation centers that offer sports, arts and crafts, culture arts and dance, computer labs, drama, mentoring, general learning, and afterschool activities. There are no recreation centers within the Plan Area, although two are located nearby at Tassafaronga (with an active community garden) and Rainbow parks, and Patterson Park hosts the East Oakland Sports Center which includes Fitness, Aquatic, and Dance Centers, as well as the Ira Jenkins Recreation Center and Gymnasium.

The City of Oakland General Plan establishes a parkland objective of four acres per 1,000 residents (for parks that meet the active recreational needs of the community as opposed to passive recreational open space). Oakland currently provides 1.33 acres of local serving park acreage per 1,000 residents, which falls short of the General Plan parkland objective.

According to the City of Oakland General Plan Open Space, Conservation and Recreation (OSCAR) Element, Central East Oakland has 41.7 acres of recreational land, including schoolyards and athletic fields, which equates to 0.89 acres of parkland per 1,000 residents, or about one fifth of the General Plan parkland objective. The City also puts forth in its General Plan an overall parkland objective of 10 total acres per 1,000 residents. The City exceeded this objective 2012, with 15.2 acres of parkland per 1,000 residents.

## East Bay Regional Park District (EBRPD)

EBRPD manages over 73,000 acres of parkland in 47 East Bay parks. These parks complement those provided by the City of Oakland by providing larger park areas, more isolated and wild settings, and an emphasis on naturalist activities as opposed to active recreation. EBRPD parks in Oakland include the 271-acre Leona Canyon Regional Open Space Preserve, the 660-acre Robert Sibley Volcanic Regional Preserve, the 100-acre Roberts Regional Recreational Area, and the 741-acre Martin Luther King, Jr. Regional Shoreline Park which covers much of the Project Area's shoreline on San Leandro Bay.

The Martin Luther King, Jr. Regional Shoreline Park was established in 2000 as a wetlands restoration project by a partnership between the East Bay Regional Park District and Save the Bay.

The Shoreline includes the mouths of five major creek systems and protects some the last remaining wetland in the East Bay including Damon Marsh, in the Draft Specific Plan's Sub-Area E, and the 50-acre Arrowhead Marsh (part of the Western Hemisphere Shorebird Reserve Network), which is adjacent to, but not included in, Sub-Area D. The MLK Shoreline Park features the Shoreline Center, an indoor/outdoor facility that accommodates special events. Additionally, the park is host to the Tidewater Boating Center, a 12,300-square-foot complex that consists of boat launch dock, a boathouse, training area, boat storage facility and Department offices. The park includes hiking and biking trails, benches and picnic areas.

## 2. Draft Specific Plan proposals

Because of the complexity of the Draft Specific Plan's development program for the Plan Area's 800 acres, this report will present selected goals for both the Coliseum District (site of the current Coliseum and Arena [Subarea A] and a portion of Subarea B on the west side of I-880) and the Oakland Airport Business Park and environs.

## A. Selected goals for the Coliseum District:

- New Venues: Development of up to three new multi- purpose sports/entertainment venues that retain the sports teams in Oakland, provides attractions that bring people to the area, and facilitate the development of other uses nearby. This development program includes a proposed new National Football League (NFL) stadium and multi-purpose event center for the Oakland Raiders; a new Major League Baseball (MLB) ballpark for the Oakland A's; and the potential for a new National Basketball Association (NBA) arena for the Golden State Warriors. Under some Plan scenarios, the current Oracle Arena would remain as a multi-purpose venue.
- Housing: Development of new housing, both in a ballpark village near the sports facilities (up to 1,500 residential units), and in Transit-Oriented Developments (TODs) surrounding the Coliseum BART station. A part of this new neighborhood is a proposed 2.2-acre Plaza and open space, lined with retail businesses, which connects the proposed Football Stadium to the proposed Ballpark.
- Pedestrian access: new elevated and landscaped pedestrian concourse that connects from the Coliseum BART station to the new sports/ entertainment areas at the current Coliseum site. This elevated connector could potentially extend over I-880 and link BART to the San Leandro Bay; and is envisioned to include a streetcar line that uses the elevated concourse to connect from BART to the Oakland Airport Business Park.
- Open Space and Parks: The Plan includes a total of 26.5 acres of parks and open space within the Coliseum district, consisting of the 2.2-acre "Grand Plaza" pedestrian streetscape; the 14.2-acre pedestrian elevated concourse and linear park; a 2-acre park next to the proposed MLB ballpark; and more than 8 acres of open space and natural habitat improvement along Damon Slough near the Amtrak railroad tracks and 66th Avenue. The Plan includes a proposal to relocate Elmhurst Creek, which runs through the Coliseum site (see Exhibit B).

In total, new development within the Coliseum District could include:

- a new Football Stadium with a seating capacity of 72,000 attendees;
- a new Baseball Park with a seating capacity of 39,000 attendees;
- a new Basketball Arena with a seating capacity of 20,000 attendees;
- three new hotels with a total room count of 875 rooms;
- 525,000 square feet of new event-based retail space;
- 190,000 square feet of neighborhood-serving and convenience retail space located primarily within ground-floor locations;
- up to 1.5 million square feet of new science and technology space;
- 340 new residential units in low- to mid-rise townhome-type buildings, primarily along San Leandro Street from 66th Avenue southward, and
- 3,660 new residential units in residential towers.

## B. Selected goals for the Oakland Airport Business Park:

- New office space: Creation of a new Science and Technology District of regional significance that expands opportunities for companies in the tech economy to locate in Oakland, in up to 1.5 million square feet of new and renovated buildings.
- New Arena: The Draft Plan proposes a location for a new National Basketball Association and multi-purpose arena for the Golden State Warriors, should the team not move to San Francisco and decide to remain in Oakland.
- New Residential district: Development of a new waterfront residential district, with up to 1,600 new residential units.
- Bay Inlet: The Plan includes potential development scenarios that include the creation of an approximately 12-acre new inlet of San Leandro Bay. The new inlet is not proposed as a navigable waterway (i.e., no ferries or boat docks), but instead could include intertidal mudflats that support shorebird foraging and possibly high-tide roosting habitat. The primary purpose of the potential new Bay Inlet would be to create a new waterfront edge as an attraction and amenity for new development.
- Habitat Restoration: The Draft Specific Plan recommends creation of up to 15 acres of new wetland habitat between Damon Slough and East Creek Slough. Creation of this proposed new wetland habitat would require agreement between East Bay Regional Parks District (EBRPD), the East Bay Municipal Utility District, and the City of Oakland, to exchange or sell certain properties each agency owns in the Plan Area. Any such exchange or sale would require ongoing negotiations between the City and both the East Bay Regional Parks District, which owns the current 8-acre Edgewater Freshwater Marsh in the Airport Business Park, and the East Bay Municipal Utility District (EBMUD), owners of the subject site of proposed new wetlands area next to their Edgewater wet weather facility and corporation yard. Should the vacant EBMUD Edgewater parcel and a portion of the adjacent City of Oakland property be made available, the Draft Specific Plan proposes the creation of a new 15-acre freshwater seasonal wetland habitat at this location in exchange for, and in replacement of, EBRPD's

existing 8-acre Edgewater Freshwater Marsh.

The proposed Project includes several proposed park and open space areas either restored, or added, as shown in Table 2, below, including:

- a new 2.2 acre public plaza within the residential district between the ballpark and concourse in Sub-Area A;
- 6.7 acres of new open space between 66th Avenue and Damon Slough in Sub-Area A;
- 10 acres of new publicly accessible open space on top of the proposed concourse in Sub-Area A:
- a 0.4 acre parklet within Sub-Area B;
- improving 12 acres of shoreline trail and parkland in Sub-Area B in the existing MLK Shoreline Park; and
- 63 total acres of new and restored open space and wetland habitat in Sub-Area E.

As a result, at buildout there would be approximately 33 acres of parks and open space in Sub-Areas A and B. Sub-Area E will retain its 48 acres of existing parks and open space, and add approximately 15 acres of restored wetland habitat. At buildout, the whole Plan Area would have approximately 100 acres of total parkland, close to the City's General Plan objective for total parkland. See **Exhibits C and D** for figures and illustrations of the Plans' proposals.

3. Impacts of new residents on existing parks and recreation facilities.

The Draft EIR (in Chapter 4.12) addresses the existing parks and recreation facilities in the Plan Area—namely, the EBRPD MLK Shoreline Park and the Oakland Parks and Recreation Oak Port soccer fields and adjoining land between the Damon Slough and East Creek Slough—and finds those parks would experience much greater use with the addition of up to 10,000 new residents to what is currently a sports entertainment and business park area with no residents. This greater use may overlap to nearby City parks such as Coliseum Gardens Park and Tassafaronga Park. Furthermore, the new residents will be in multi-family units with little to no private or semi-private open space available to them, and therefore are more likely to use existing and new public recreation and park facilities. Even so, the DEIR finds there is no significant impact to Parks, nor a cumulative impact (see "Parks Usage—Impact Public 2, page 4.12-13 and following).

#### BACKGROUND

In November, 2011, the City issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) seeking a master developer and environmental consultant for the 800-acre Coliseum plan area. A team, led by JRDV Urban International (an Oakland-based architecture and development firm) were selected, and in March 2012, an Exclusive Negotiating Agreement was entered into with the City. At the same time, a contract with Lamphier-Gregory (an Oakland-based Planning and Environmental consultant) was signed, to prepare the Draft Specific Plan and Draft EIR. In April 2013, the Notice of Preparation (NOP) for the Draft Environmental Impact Report was issued to interested parties, and public scoping sessions were held in May 2013 before the Planning Commission and the Landmarks Preservation Advisory Board. The Notice of Availability (NOA) for the DEIR was issued on August 22, 2014, beginning a public comment period that ends on October 6, 2014.

Public workshops were held in April and June, 2014 to gain comment and refinements for the Draft Plan, prior to its release.

### **NEXT STEPS**

Future public hearings on the Draft Plan will be held in September and October, 2014, as shown below.









CONSIDER OPEN GRILLING WITHIN DESIGNATED AREAS WITHIN

THE LAKE MERRITT PARKLANDS

### **SUMMARY**

The Oakland Municipal Code (12.64.030) prohibits fires in parks, except at designated barbeque locations. However, there are no designated barbeque locations within the Lake Merritt parklands. In recent years, immense use of the Lake Merritt parklands for outdoor grilling warrants a review by the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission to review potential changes to the municipal code and define designated locations for barbeques on Lake Merritt parkland.

### FISCAL IMPACT

Fiscal impact to the City of Oakland could include increased staff and material costs for coal and waste removal.

#### PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Oakland Municipal Code (12.64.030) prohibits fires in parks and outdoor grilling except in designated areas, however, there are no designated areas for grilling within the Lake Merritt parklands. Consistent and increasing use and demand for designated grilling locations within the parklands at Lake Merritt warrant this discussion and review of a proposed change to the Oakland Municipal Code. According to the September 2014 issue of Oakland magazine, "At noon, there's no sign of them. By 1:30pm a couple of coolers have arrived. When 3 o'clock rolls around, the grills are lit and smoking... from Borden Way to Wayne Ave., this is the new Sunday afternoon scene at Lake Merritt."

### BACKGROUND

On August 14, 2014, Councilmember Kernighan held a community meeting to field residents' reaction to the new activities and increased use of the parklands at Lake Merritt. Although concerns about alcohol consumption, noise control and park hours were noted, the scope of this report is limited to open grilling and the disposal of hot coals on Lake Merritt parkland. In 2002, voters approved the Measure DD bond to fund the revitalization of Lake Merritt and its associated park lands. Twelve years later, the dream has become a reality, as Lake Merritt and its new improvements consistently draw visitors to walk, run, bike, train and enjoy the iconic view and mild weather daily. Despite the increase in positive activity, the Oakland Municipal Code (12.64.030) still prohibits fires in parks except in designated areas.

### **RECOMMENDATION**

Staff recommends the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission consider open grilling within designated areas on Lake Merritt parklands and create a sub-committee to research the best areas for such designation, with the intent of having the ordinance changed by the Fall of 2015 to be in place for next Spring 2015.

### **SUMMARY**

Friends of the Gardens at Lake Merritt (FGLM) have requested use of the Lakeside Park Garden Center and the Gardens at Lake Merritt to hold a fund-raising The Autumn Light Festival event during the evening of Thursday, (Dress Rehearsal) Friday and Saturday, October 17-18, 2014. Net event receipts will entirely go to benefit improvements and publicity for the Gardens. This event has been approved by the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission (PRAC) over the past two years, in support of the benefits these events bring to the Gardens and the City. Upstage Productions have been hired to manage this event.

### FISCAL IMPACT

FGLM will be responsible for this event, including its costs and impacts.

FGLM has pledged: 1) This Event will have zero-impact on OPR facilities, 2) To indemnify OPR and the City for this Event, 3) To be responsible for all costs. FGLM have successfully managed events such as this in cooperation with OPR and the Public Works Agency (PWA) over the past two years. Therefore, I anticipate that this event will have no fiscal impact on the City, beyond what benefits may be funded by the proceeds.

### **EVENT DESCRIPTION**

"Autumn Light Festival" will be held on Saturday, October 18, 2014 from 6:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. The Garden gates will be closed and entrance and exit will be via the Garden Center. Admission and food service will be pre-sold, with accompanying donation solicitations by FGLM. On behalf of FGLM and Upstage productions will solicit, curate and install lighted exhibits and other art displays, primarily produced by Oakland and East Bay artists. They will also manage music production, publicity and event logistics.

The primary patron experience will be an opportunity to see the Gardens at their best, at night, illuminated by artistic illuminations and surrounded by other art work and similarly-minded garden enthusiasts. Food service, which will be solicited from local food trucks and music performances, will provide additional pleasure.

#### BACKGROUND

OPR and PWA and other City organizations have worked closely with FGLM over the past five years and with its parent organization, Oakland-East Bay Garden Center, Inc., since the early 1950s. Fundraising and publicity provided by FGLM has resulted in many benefits to the Gardens and to the people of Oakland. Among the physical improvements at the Gardens has been the redevelopment of the Sensory Garden, the Mediterranean Garden, the Japanese Garden and the Edible Gardens. Many less obvious but critical additions of soil, compost, path materials, signage and plants have been funded by or facilitated via FGLM.

A significant portion of garden maintenance has also been accomplished by teams of volunteers that FGLM has encouraged and managed. These teams have included those drawn by important dates such as Martin Luther King, Jr. Day and Earth Day, as well as by the regularly scheduled volunteer opportunities.

The event, entitled "The Autumn Light Festival" will comprise of decorating the Gardens with various styles of artist-produced lanterns and illuminations (see Appendix), food service and various sound environments and musical performances consistent with contemplation of the moonless Gardens lit up by artist illuminations. Admissions will be \$20.00 per ticket.(\$25.00 at the door) \$10.50 for Children. Food trucks, Beer and Wine will be sold at \$5.00 a glass, also silent auction, FGLM-branded merchandise and donations will be the primary sources of revenue for the event. Proceeds will be accounted for by FGLM and reported to Oakland's Office of Parks and Recreation (OPR). Net receipts will go entirely to benefit The Gardens at Lake Merritt and to extend the reach of the Gardens throughout Oakland and the East Bay.

FGLM will be responsible for obtaining appropriate permits, for ensuring that this event has zero-impact on OPR facilities and for indemnifying OPR and the City for this event. Since FGLM will be responsible for all costs, and because their improvement and publicity efforts are incremental to those of the City, the event will have no direct fiscal impact on the City, beyond what benefits may be funded by the proceeds.

As Supervisor of Park District One, I recommend and ask that PRAC approve the use of Lakeside Park facilities requested by FGLM for fund raising. FGLM provides excellent volunteer opportunities to such diverse organizations as Job Justice, Hands on Bay Area, Jack and Jill groups. Importantly, FGLM also has performed significant outreach to communities in Oakland both near to and far from Lake Merritt, and continues to find ways to broaden the awareness and use of the Gardens by Oakland residents.

Finally, FGLM fulfills an important role encouraging and managing productive relationships among the founding organizations of the Gardens at Lake Merritt, such as the Rose Society, Rhododendron Society and Mediterranean Garden Society. They also serve to integrate the work of these organizations with other, often newer, organizations focused on sustainability, organic food production and environmentally sensitive gardening and horticulture. It is with this background that I can without reservation recommend that PRAC and OPR continue their cooperation and participation with FGLM on activities such as this event.
