Friends of the Gardens at Lake Merritt (FGLM) have requested use of the Lakeside Park Garden Center and the Gardens at Lake Merritt to hold a fund-raising "The Autumn Light Festival" event. Net event receipts will entirely go to benefit improvements to the new entrance of the Gardens and Garden Center. Proud Festival Nation has been hired to manage the event.

C. REQUEST FROM MCCLYMONDS ACTION COMMITTEE TO HOLD THEIR REUNION ON SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 26, 2015 AT DEFREMERY PARK AND TO COLLECT ON SITE DONATIONS.

McClymonds has had more than 25 successful reunions at deFremery Park. It is a time for people to reunite and rekindle old friendships with former classmates, visit their old

community and family home, share family stories and have fun revisiting old memories. All class years are invited from classes of the 1950's to the graduating class of 2014. The community looks forward to a day of family engagement and community involvement. Proceeds from this event will continue to support their organization and planning for the following year's event.

D. <u>REQUEST FROM YOUTH SPEAKS ORGANIZATION TO HAVE AN EVENT</u> (LIFE IS LIVING) WITH VENDORS AT DEFREMERY PARK ON SATURDAY, OCTOBER 10, 2015.

Youth Speaks has held Life is Living Festival for five years at deFremery Park. There are various platforms for youth to enjoy. Spoken word, Food Justice, Hip Hop Dream Stage, Eco-Empowerment Health and Wellness Fair and skateboard competitions to name a few. The attendance is very high and the community looks forward to it. Proceeds from this event will continue to support Youth Speaks in the service of youth and arts in Oakland and the surrounding Bay Area.

E. REQUEST FROM THE BLACK COWBOY ASSOCIATION TO HAVE VENDORS AT THEIR ANNUAL PARADE AND FESTIVAL SPECIAL EVENT BEING HELD AT DEFREMERY PARK ON SATURDAY, OCTOBER 3, 2015.

Oakland Black Cowboy Association (OBCA), a non-profit organization, request to have up to 20 vendors at their Annual Parade and Festival event held at deFremery Park. OBCA has had forty successful parades and festivals. Horses, cars, drill teams and spectators are all strategically placed. There is anticipation among neighbors, surrounding city communities and beyond who look forward to this family friendly affair. Proceeds from their fundraising efforts will continue to support this historical West Oakland heritage.

8. NEW BUSINESS

A. REQUEST FROM BAY LOCALIZE WHO IS PARTNERING WITH SEEDS & SOUL: INDIGENOUS CULTURAL EXCHANGE AND FESTIVAL FOR PERMISSION TO FUNDRAISE ON-SITE WITH COLLECTION OF DONATIONS, SELL HEALTHY, HIGH QUALITY FOODS AND BEVERAGES AND SELL OF ARTISTS WARES AT THEIR OUTDOOR CULTURAL EXCHANGE & FESTIVAL AT LAKESIDE PARK (FAIRYLAND GRASSY AREA) ON SATURDAY, OCTOBER 24, 2015.

Bay Localize is an Oakland-based non-profit organization that inspires and supports community leaders in building equitable, resilient communities. They confront the challenges of climate instability, rising energy costs, and recession by boosting regional capacity to provide for everyone's needs, sustainably and equitably. Seeds and Soul is a one-day, Indigenous wombyn-led gathering and festival that centers around the themes of environmental sustainability, social justice, and Indigenous wombyn's leadership.

B. REQUEST FROM THE BONSAI GARDEN AT LAKE MERRITT FOR APPROVAL TO ESTABLISH A MUSEUM STORE AT THE BONSAI GARDEN AT LAKE MERRITT TO FUNDRAISE FOR RENEWEL OF THE BONSAI GARDEN DISPLAYS.

The Bonsai Garden at Lake Merritt (BGLM) is requesting permission from PRAC to create and run a Museum Shop to raise funds for revitalization of the Garden display area. BGLM

has become a member of the California Association of Museums (CAM) and the American Alliance of Museums (AAM) in order to elevate their status to an accredited museum. The project for which BGLM seeks CCHE grant funding is replacement of 40 2'x3' and 13 2'x10' display benches and 3 2'x6' seating benches for the bonsai in the collection. In addition, we would like to redesign the layout of the benches to add at least six to eight small benches plus another two to three seating benches for our visitors.

C. <u>REQUEST FOR APPROVAL TO DEDICATE A BENCH TO JO AND NORM BUDMAN.</u>

Scott and Margo Budman, children of Jo and Norm Budman, contacted the City requesting that a bench be dedicated to honor their parent's 50th wedding anniversary. The desired bench location is on the east side of Lake Merritt along Lakeshore Avenue. The specific bench faces the lake and is the most northerly of two benches across from the entrance to the Cleveland Cascades. The plaque installation process is in accordance with the Public Works Agency construction requirements.

D. REQUEST FOR APPROVAL TO DEDICATE A BENCH TO JUNE SPERO.

The family of June Spero is requesting that a bench across from the bird pond adjacent to the Rotary Nature Center inside Lakeside Park is dedicated to honor her memory. Mrs. Spero is survived by three children and five grandchildren who would like a place to remember her.

E. REQUEST FOR THE PARK AND RECREATION ADVISORY COMMISSION TO ACCEPT AN INFORMATIONAL REPORT ON THE CAMRON STANFORD HOUSE LANDSCAPING AND LIGHTING IMPROVEMENTS.

The Camron-Stanford House, as a Victorian house museum, has been a venue for many historical exhibits and public and private events since 1978, when much of the building had been restored to the 1880 period. The Camron-Stanford House Preservation Association (CSHPA) has a current lease with the City of Oakland, which is the owner of the Camron-Stanford House and its property. Existing lack of public safety during evening use and the protection of the historic house and its grounds have been on-going concerns for the CSHP. Although there is excellent exterior lighting on the front and right side of the building, installed by the City during the Measure DD project, there is no night illumination on the back and left side of the building.

F. REQUEST FOR THE PARK AND RECREATION COMMISSION TO ACCEPT AN INFORMATIONAL REPORT FOR A MURAL INSIDE VERDESE CARTER RECREATION CENTER.

Staff received a proposal to install a community inspired mural inside the Verdese Carter Recreation Center located at 9600 Sunnyside Street from One Toyota of Oakland. The Verdese Carter Recreation Center is operated by the Police Athletic League (PAL) and proposes to work in collaboration with local community leaders and youth to design and install the mural inside the recreation center to provide inspiration to program participants and visitors.

SUMMARY

Oakland Parks & Recreation has received a request from the United Negro College Fund, Inc., a non-profit organization, to collect donations at the 30th Annual Walk-A-Thon for Education at Lakeside Park on Saturday, September 26, 2015. The Walk for Education helps to raise funds for minority students endeavoring to fulfill their educational dreams.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no fiscal impact on Oakland Parks & Recreation. The United Negro College fund is paying all rental fees for event held at Lakeside Park.

BACKGROUND

The United Negro College Fund, Inc. (UNCF) has held its Walk-A-Thon for Education at Lakeside Park for many years. The UNCF came before the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission for the last eight years and was approved for collection of donations and pledges. The event draws approximately 200+ people who participate in a 5K walk.

For 69 years, the UNCF has provided funding to support 37 private, historically black colleges and universities and financial assistance to over 60,000 students nationwide who attend the schools.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission approve the United Negro College Fund Inc.'s request for collection of donations at the UNCF's 30th Annual Walk-A-Thon for Education at Lakeside Park on Saturday, September 26, 2015. The UNCF is aware of additional permits that are required provided their request to collect donations is granted.

FRIDAY' AND SATURDAY, OCTOBER 16TH AND 17TH, 2015

SUMMARY

Friends of the Gardens at Lake Merritt (FGLM) have requested use of the Lakeside Park Garden Center and the Gardens at Lake Merritt to hold a fund-raising The Autumn Light Festival event during the evening of Thursday, (Dress Rehearsal) Friday and Saturday, October 15-17, 2015. Net event receipts will entirely go to benefit improvements to the New entrance of the Gardens and Garden Center. This event has been approved by the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission (PRAC) over the past three years, in support of the benefits these events bring to the Gardens and the City. Proud Festival Nation, have been hired to manage this event.

FISCAL IMPACT

FGLM will be responsible for this event, including its costs and impacts.

FGLM has pledged: 1) This Event will have zero-impact on OPR facilities, 2) To indemnify OPR and the City for this Event, 3) To be responsible for all costs. FGLM have successfully managed events such as this in cooperation with OPR and the Public Works Agency (PWA) over the past three years. Therefore, I anticipate that this event will have no fiscal impact on the City, beyond what benefits may be funded by the proceeds.

EVENT DESCRIPTION

"Autumn Light Festival" will be held on Friday and Saturday, October 16-17, 2015 from 6:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m. The Garden gates will be closed and entrance and exit will be via the Garden Center. Admission and food service will be pre-sold, with accompanying donation solicitations by FGLM. On behalf of FGLM, Proud Festival Nation and select Oakland Public Works Staff, will solicit, curate and install lighted exhibits and other art displays, primarily produced by Oakland and East Bay artists. They will also manage music production, publicity and event logistics.

The primary patron experience will be an opportunity to see the Gardens at their best, at night, illuminated by artistic illuminations and surrounded by other art work and similarly-minded garden enthusiasts. Food service, which will be solicited from local food trucks and music performances, will provide additional pleasure.

BACKGROUND

OPR and PWA and other City organizations have worked closely with FGLM over the past 8 years and with its parent organization Oakland-East Bay Garden Center, Inc., since the early 1950s.

Fundraising and publicity provided by FGLM has resulted in many benefits to the Gardens and to the people of Oakland. Among the physical improvements at the Gardens has been the redevelopment of the Sensory Garden, the Mediterranean Garden, the Japanese Garden, and the Edible gardens. Many less obvious but critical additions of soil, compost, path materials, signage and plants have been funded by or facilitated via FGLM.

A significant portion of garden maintenance has also been accomplished by teams of volunteers that FGLM has encouraged and managed. These teams have included those drawn by important dates such as Martin Luther King, Jr. Day and Earth Day, as well as by the regularly scheduled volunteer opportunities.

The event, entitled "The Autumn Light Festival" will comprise of decorating the Gardens with various styles of artist-produced illuminating Art pieces that enhance the existing gardens (see Appendix), food service and various sound environments and musical performances consistent with contemplation of the moonless Gardens lit up by artist illuminations. Admissions will be \$20.00 per ticket. (\$25.00 at the door) \$10.00 for Children. Food trucks, Beer and Wine will be sold at \$5.00 a glass, also silent auction, FGLM-branded merchandise and donations will be the primary sources of revenue for the event. Proceeds will be accounted for by FGLM and reported to Oakland's Office of Parks and Recreation (OPR). Net receipts will go entirely to benefit The Gardens at Lake Merritt and to extend the reach of the Gardens throughout Oakland and the East Bay.

FGLM will be responsible for obtaining appropriate permits, for ensuring that this event has zero-impact on OPR facilities and for indemnifying OPR and the City for this event. Since FGLM will be responsible for all costs, and because their improvement and publicity efforts are incremental to those of the City, the event will have no direct fiscal impact on the City, beyond what benefits may be funded by the proceeds.

As Supervisor of Park District One, I recommend and ask that PRAC approve the use of Lakeside Park facilities requested by FGLM for fund raising. FGLM provides excellent volunteer opportunities to such diverse organizations as Job Justice, HandsOn Bay Area, AmeriCorps, and Victory Gardens. Importantly, FGLM also has performed significant outreach to communities in Oakland both near to and far from Lake Merritt, and continues to find ways to broaden the awareness and use of the Gardens by Oakland residents.

Finally, FGLM fulfills an important role encouraging and managing productive relationships among the founding organizations of the Gardens at Lake Merritt, such as the Rose Society, Rhododendron Society and Mediterranean Garden Society. They also serve to integrate the work of these organizations with other, often newer, organizations focused on sustainability, organic food production and environmentally sensitive gardening and horticulture. It is with this background that I can without reservation recommend that PRAC and OPR continue their cooperation and participation with FGLM on activities such as this event.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission approve the Friends of the Gardens at Lake Merritt's request for fundraising at Lakeside Park Garden Center and Gardens on Friday, October, 16Th and Saturday, October 17, 2015.

As President of the Friends of the Gardens of Lake Merritt (FGLM), I humbly submit this official proposal letter requesting the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission's approval of FGLM's use of the Lakeside Garden Center and the Gardens at Lake Merritt for our fourth annual "Autumn Lights Festival".

The Festival will require the closure of the Garden Center and Gardens from the evening of Thursday, October 15 (for set-up and "tech rehearsal"), through the Festival nights of October 16 and Saturday, October 17, 2015. The Gardens would reopen by 1pm, Sunday, October 18.

Friends of the Gardens at Lake Merritt - History

The Friends of the Gardens at Lake Merritt (FGLM) was founded in 2007 by community members whose hard effort and vision resulted in the installation of the Sensory Garden in Lakeside Park's largely neglected gardens complex. This new addition set the stage for a renaissance in Oakland's "green heart" and FGLM has since that time collaborated with the city's Public Works Agency and Parks and Recreation Department to maintain, improve and promote the Gardens' varied horticultural and cultural assets. FGLM has continually sought to engage local volunteers in meaningful and enriching community service, and to cultivate both civic pride, and the respect of and a deeper commitment to our city from our visitors..

FGLM is honored to have enhanced Oakland's onetime "hidden jewel" by enabling improvements to its Japanese Gardens, Edible Gardens and Succulent Garden. For close to a decade, FGLM has worked to raise the Gardens' profile as a center for urban pollinator awareness through establishment of charming and educational pollinator habitat, benefitting monarch butterflies, native bees and other species. The Gardens' "Bee Hotel", and Dragonfly and Treefrog Habitat resulted from FGLM efforts as well.

Autumn Lights Festival Overview

FGLM's annual fundraiser, the "Autumn Lights Festival" has in three short years become a popular and much-anticipated Oakland tradition, enjoyed by adults and children alike.



As envisioned three years ago by park supervisor Victoria Rocha, the Festival presents the Gardens in an enchantingly different light. Tapping into Oakland's astonishing arts community to illuminate the Gardens with unique sculptures and installations, Rocha pioneered a cultural cross pollination which has proven surprisingly inventive yet authentically celebratory of the Gardens' seven acres.

Festival attendees delight in the festival's illuminations while experiencing the Gardens and enjoying music and dance performances, great food and beverages and unhurried community interaction. San Francisco Chronicle columnist Jon Carroll used these words last year to describe his ALF experience:: "I walked among the dimly lit oaks with distant music drifting in the air. I thought how very much I liked the Oakland that was being created before my eyes. The event was multiracial and free-spirited; the sculpture sang in the balmy night."

Detail of Monies to be Collected

FGLM considers ourselves fortunate to have realized very respectable net proceeds from the Festival. Our guiding principals moving forward are simple: respect the festival's uniqueness, and ensure that the community which choses to support it has the best experience at it.

In 2015, our focus is to offer our guests a "front gate" experience which is far improved and as efficient as possible. Festival admission prices will not increase-- \$20 advance, and \$25 at the door, for adults and \$10 for children 5 and up.. The cost for beverages will remain unchanged as well: \$5 per serving for beer, wine and soft drinks.

We project net revenues of \$20K -\$30K from this year's festival, a cautious figure which recognizes our commitment that the event remain a "zero-cost" proposition, both for FGLM and our city partners.

Reason for FGLM's Autumn Lights Festival Fundraising and its Benefit to the Community To date, the Festival has successfully raised resources which will ensure that the Gardens new gates-- a Measure DD-funded enhancement-- are set amid an entry experience which will distinguish the Gardens at Lake Merritt as the relevant and vital Oakland institution it has been restored to be

An FGLM committee of dedicated volunteer horticultural and design experts are finalizing a design proposal which envisions a Garden Welcome Area defined by unique plantings representing the diverse plant species within the Gardens and incorporating hardscape enhancements and forward thinking irrigation features.



Festival proceeds will annually be earmarked in a large part to the upkeep of the Garden Welcome Area' by Gate #1 (adjacent to the Garden Center) and Gate #3, opposite the Sailboat Clubhouse.

In the not too distant future, we envision attendees of the Sixth Annual Autumn Lights Festival in October 2017 making their entrance into the event through the very entry plaza and gardens which their support of past festivals made possible. I fervently hope and expect that many of those present will be families including youth who can and should note of the significant role they played in this notable new feature gracing their city.

FGLM is also committed to manifesting the following benefits to the community from the Autumn Lights Festival;

- 1) FGLM is committed to expanding opportunities for any local artists to realize the goal of participating in the Festival. We will work to make sure that no artist with a compelling design concept for a festival installation— and the will to work to realize that concept— is prevented from exhibiting at the Festival strictly for lack of resources
- 2) FGLM recognizes that the need to recruit and engage volunteers-- particularly for the Autumn Lights Festival-- offer the opportunity to involve our entire community to support THEIR Gardens and the Festival which benefits those Gardens. We are committed to increased outreach which invites all of Oakland to continue to enjoy and participate in the Gardens.

MInimum Rental Payment Request

As the Autumn Lights Festival is a fundraiser benefiting the Gardens and the Garden Center, with a proven track record of productive gain for-- and with little to no cost to-- the city, the Friends of the Gardens at Lake Merritt respectfully ask that use of the facilities be granted to us at no cost for the days specified.

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

To the Oakland Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission,

Thank you for this opportunity to present a proposal to you. We are requesting that our annual Life is Living Festival be allowed to take place on October 10, 2015 at deFremery Park. We are also requesting permission to have on-site vendors at the festival. Life is Living is an intergenerational eco-equity festival presented by Youth Speaks, the leading nonprofit presenter of spoken word education, youth development, and presentation programs in the country. Life is Living was inaugurated in Oakland, California in October 2008. A celebration of life through urban performance, intergenerational health, and environmental action, Life is Living strives to activate the West Oakland community surrounding deFremery Park in a spirit of love and unity.

Life is Living has featured musical performances drawn from a diversity of styles (jazz, gospel, and hip hop), as well as live painting, sports (skateboarding and a softball tournament), a Kid's Zone (complete with face painting, art activities, and parkour), a Teen Stage, a science fair, and writing and performance workshops for youth—all for free.

This year, our festival will feature new partnerships with Cal Shakes and Yerba Buena Center for the Arts to present exclusive theater live in the park. Additionally we intend to continue strengthening our partnerships with local food justice organizations, artisans, non profits and science education organizations to increase the quality of our offerings in the park. In keeping with our focus on progressive environmental action, we will recruit vendors whose wares are environmentally sound. This year, we hope to expand on last year's successes and ensure festival participants' experience of vendors is first-rate.

We plan to continue charging our vendors a fee to participate in the festival. We estimate that our vendor fee will be approximately \$200 per booth. We will use those monies to pay for vendor and permit fees with the Alameda County Department of Environmental Health.

We will also contact the Oakland Police Department to apply for a Short Term Encroachment Permit to cordon off a section of 18th Street from Adeline to Union for our food vendor area. We successfully used this portion of 18th Street for the past few years, but are interested in utilizing all official avenues to maximize ease of experience for vendors and attendees.

In all of our editions of Life is Living, there have been no negative incidents or contention, and a genuine feeling of peace and community and peace has reigned. We are grateful for the goodwill of the West Oakland community, the support of Oakland Parks and Recreation, and the consideration of the City of Oakland and the Oakland Police Department. We hope to make this year's festival a truly positive experience for all who attend.



SUMMARY

Parks and Recreation received a request from Bay Localize a non-profit who is partnering with Seeds & Soul: Indigenous Cultural Exchange and Festival to collect donations on-site, sell healthy, high quality foods and beverages and sells of artists wares at their outdoor Cultural Exchange and Festival at the Lakeside Park (Fairyland Grassy Area) on Saturday, October 24, 2015. This is Bay Localize and Seeds & Soul: Indigenous Cultural Exchange and Festival, first year hosting their fundraising event at Lakeside Park.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is a positive fiscal impact for Oakland Parks and Recreation. Bay Localize and Seeds & Soul: Indigenous Cultural Exchange and Festival is paying all rental fees required to host their event at Lakeside Park.

BACKGROUND

Bay Localize is an Oakland-based non-profit organization that inspires and supports community leaders in building equitable, resilient communities. They confront the challenges of climate instability, rising energy costs, and recession by boosting regional capacity to provide for everyone's needs, sustainably and equitably. Bay Localize achieves this by equipping local leaders with flexible tools, models, and policies that strengthen their communities.

Building a base of collaboration with the arts communities to cultivate resilience is essential to Bay Localize. Bay Localize utilizes the arts as a bridging force between diverse communities, communicating the power of unity and mobilization in a language that resonates cross culturally. As a part of their program offerings this year, Bay Localize is co-sponsoring the Seeds & Soul Festival as an organizational effort to increase collaborations with arts communities of the Bay Area.

Seeds and Soul is a one-day, Indigenous wombyn-led gathering and festival that centers around the themes of environmental sustainability, social justice, and Indigenous wombyn's leadership. The festival is **free to all**, and will provide a creative, inclusive, and welcoming environment for Native

and non-native audiences with an emphasis on creativity, bridge building, and collaboration. Utilizing interactive art, dance, music, and community-facilitated workshops and panels, the festival will raise awareness about issues that affect the Bay Area's Native and non-native peoples, such as environmental sustainability, food justice, gender & racial equity, and the importance of the arts in creating sustainable and resilient communities.

Financial Transactions anticipated on site + rationale + ESTIMATED Amounts

Fundraiser for local non-profit, festival costs, community artists: \$1000-2000 Donation drive for funds to first provide stipends to our support staff (which are currently all volunteer), and second augment the meager stipends for participating community artists/presenters. Additional funds would go towards subsequent Seeds & Soul events in Oakland. In any event, a portion of these funds will be offered to a Bay Area Native American non-profit (TBD, could include Seventh Native American Generation, or Bay Area American Indian Two Spirits).

Individual (Indigenous and non-indigenous) artist's wares: \$50-200/vendor for 10-20 vendors Seeds & Soul would like to offer a space for vending of traditional indigenous crafts and a wide range of artists' goods.

Partial listing of anticipated goods for sale: Jewelry (\$1-\$300), cultural practice tools/implements (\$1-\$300), T-shirts and other clothing, CDs (\$15-25), Plants (\$1-30)

Local Food Vendors: \$5-\$20/Meal

Fresh, high quality, local food is expensive to provide, yet we see it as an essential part of Indigenous Cultural Exchange—sharing food is a powerful way to share culture, stories, and build bridges.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission approve Bay Localize who is partnering with Seeds & Soul: Indigenous Cultural Exchange and Festival request for permission to fundraise on-site with collection of donations, sell healthy, high quality foods and beverages and sell of artists wares at their outdoor Cultural Exchange & Festival at Lakeside Park on Saturday, October 24, 2015. The group is aware that additional permits are required provided their request is granted.

BONSAI GARDEN DISPLAYS

SUMMARY:

The Bonsai Garden at Lake Merritt (BGLM) is requesting permission from PRAC to create and run a Museum Shop to raise funds for revitalization of the Garden display area. BGLM has become a member of the California Association of Museums (CAM) and the American Alliance of Museums (AAM) in order to elevate our status to an accredited museum. We have identified the need to upgrade our display area, add new bonsai benches and new displays and upgrade our educational display. In addition, we need to replace our irrigation system to better serve our bonsai and to perhaps develop a method of recycling water for use in the rest of the Gardens. We also need to upgrade our outdoor electrical system in order to participate at a higher level in the Autumn Lights Festival. We are currently applying for a grant with the California Cultural and Historical Endowment (CCHE) which is a matching grant program sponsored by CAM and the State of California Natural Resources Agency. Since this is a matching grant program, we must raise \$50,000 in order to participate. The sales of at Bonsai Museum shop BGLM logoed t-shirts, note cards, membership pins, and coffee mugs with our bonsai pictures on them would help us raise the matching grant funds.

FISCAL IMPACT:

BGLM will be responsible for this Museum Shop, including its costs and impacts. BGLM has pledged: 1) This Shop will have zero-impact on OPR facilities, 2) To indemnify OPR and the City for this Shop, 3) To be responsible for all costs. BGLM have successfully managed sales of bonsai and related material at its annual Mammoth Auction & Sale for many years with no problems. Therefore, I anticipate that this event will have no fiscal impact on the City, beyond what benefits may be funded by the proceeds.

EVENT DESCRIPTION:

The BGLM Museum Shop would be housed in an existing un-used structure next to the Docent House and would require not additional construction beyond decorating the inside.

The primary patron experience will be an opportunity to support the Bonsai Garden and receive unique BGLM logoed merchandise in exchange. Since the Bonsai Garden is prevented from charging admission, this is the only way to increase our fundraising from the visitors at the Garden.

BACKGROUND:

OPR and PWA and other City organizations have worked closely with BGLM over the past 17 years and with its parent organization, Golden State Bonsai Federation an established 501C3 (GSBF) to

build and operate the Bonsai Garden in Lake Merritt. Over the years, the Bonsai Garden has grown to become one of the premier bonsai gardens in the US if not in the world.

"I've had the privilege to visit most of the public bonsai collections in the United States and I must say yours is one of the best. Bonsai Garden at Lake Merritt is a real gem. You, your volunteers, Lake Merritt and the city of Oakland should be very proud."

Jack Sustic, Curator, National Bonsai & Penjing Museum, U.S. National Arboretum

The 16 years of operation and thousands of visitors have taken its toll on our display garden and now the existing bonsai garden area needs a redesign to include the new display sections as well as the introduction of additional bonsai benches and seating areas for visitors to meditate, contemplate the displays and enjoy the tranquility of the garden. The project for which BGLM seeks CCHE grant funding is replacement of 40 2'x3' and 13 2'x10' display benches and 3 2'x6' seating benches for the bonsai in the collection. In addition, we would like to redesign the layout of the benches to add at least six to eight small benches plus another two to three seating benches for our visitors.

The BGLM has decided that it needs to obtain accredited museum status in order to be sustainable and attract additional funding for organizations such as the CCHE. We have also identified the need to employ a full time Director to manage the affairs of the BGLM and advance our operational performance and museum status. These goals require a larger revenue stream than we presently have. One of the best ways to increase our funding from the individuals who visit and enjoy the Garden is to increase the funds visitors provide to the Garden. Since we cannot charge admission, the best way to accomplish this is to be able to sell BGLM logoed merchandise at a Museum Shop.

The Museum Shop, like all of the things that we do at the Bonsai Garden will be tasteful and non-intrusive to the visitors. In other words, the Shop will fit seamlessly into the Bonsai Garden surroundings and simply be there as visitors feel so inclined to take advantage of the offerings. This will allow us to increase the current average contribution by visitors from \$0.25 each to over \$1.00 per visitor. This increased revenue will help us reach our goals for the revitalization of the Bonsai Garden and as it moves along the path to certified museum status.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff (Victoria Rocha) recommends that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission approve the Bonsai Garden at Lake Merritt's request for establishing a Bonsai Museum Shop in the Bonsai Garden at Lake Merritt.

The family of June Spero is requesting that a bench across from the bird pond adjacent to the Rotary Nature Center inside Lakeside Park is dedicated to honor her memory. Mrs. Spero is survived by three children and five grandchildren who would like a place to remember her. The dedication plaque will read:

June Spero 1923 - 2015 Made the world loving & kind

FISCAL IMPACT

The Spero family will make a minimum donation of \$600 to the Oakland Parks and Recreation Foundation to have the bench spruced up and the plaque purchased and installed. The plaque installation process is in accordance with the Public Works Department construction requirements.

BACKGROUND

June Spero lived in Oakland for 30 years, first on Vernon Street near Lake Merritt and then on Monte Cresta. June died in February 2015 at the age of 91. For 20 years she was a beloved docent at the Oakland Museum of California and a volunteer at the Charlotte Maxwell Cancer Clinic. Mrs. Spero was also active in Veterans for Peace and ushered at local theaters.

June loved to take people around her favorite Oakland sites such as the Lake Merritt Bird Sanctuary, the Museum, and Chinatown and was an active member of the Oakland Senior Center and did yoga there until the day before she died. She often helped out others in her housing complex and was a good friend to many of them.

RECOMMENDATION



IMPROVEMENTS.

SUMMARY

Existing lack of public safety during evening use and the protection of the historic house and its grounds have been on-going concerns for the Camron-Stanford House Preservation Association (CSHPA), the governing organization for the Camron-Stanford House museum. Although there is excellent exterior lighting on the front and right side of the building, installed by the City during the Measure DD project, there is no night illumination on the back and left side of the building. This perpetuates unsafe conditions for people coming and going from the house at night. Also, vagrancy and fires around the building have long been issues.

Because the house is a designated historic structure, no modern lighting fixtures may be attached to the fabric of the building. Thus, the CSHPA contracted to have a landscape lighting design developed that would address the lighting issues appropriately without compromising the historic structure. The landscape lighting plan has been previously reviewed and approved by Betty Marvin, City liaison to the Landmarks Preservation Advisory Board. The current target for the project is to install Part One, as well as the basic electrical connections for Phase Two in the Fall of 2015. The light fixtures in Part Two will be installed as funds are raised by the CSHPA.

FISCAL IMPACT

A private grant has provided the funds to pay for the Part One scope of work, therefore there is no cost to the City. As mentioned above, the fixtures and miscellaneous electrical work for Phase Two will be completed when the funds have been raised, and likewise will use no City funding. On-going maintenance of the lighting fixtures will be provided by the Camron-Stanford House Preservation Association.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The project is divided into two parts:

Part One: Lighting outside the garden fence.

This landscape lighting will illuminate the north side of the building and its adjacent parking areas. Low voltage light fixtures, with LED lamps, will be mounted in palm trees that are adjacent to the house, as shown on the plan. These fixtures will light the side entry of the house, the walkway to the main garden gate, the access from the parking lot and all of the parking spaces for the building. One fixture will be used to accent the antique fountain that will be installed in the garden according to the approved plans. All fixtures will have glare shields and louvers, preventing light spill into other areas. All tree straps, securing the fixtures are moveable and designed specifically to expand with tree growth.

Part Two: Lighting the garden

This lighting will illuminate the back garden lawn area and the main staircase descending from the back veranda of the house. Residential-scale pole lanterns, typical of the house's historic period, were chosen to look appropriate in the setting. The lanterns provide good illumination with few fixtures (keeping the design simple) and are much safer than the alternative stake-mounted fixtures that could create trip hazards. These pole lanterns use 110 voltage but will have LED lamps, making them highly efficient and cost-effective to run. Other features include "Dark Sky" covers on the globes, and electrical outlets for event equipment integrated into the support poles. In addition, small, low-voltage, in-ground fixtures with LED lamps will be used to highlight the antique fountain at ground level, for pedestrian safety and fountain aesthetics.

BACKGROUND

The Camron-Stanford House, as a Victorian house museum, has been a venue for many historical exhibits and public and private events since 1978, when much of the building had been restored to the 1880 period. The Camron-Stanford House Preservation Association has a current lease with the City of Oakland (March 1, 2003), which is the owner of the Camron-Stanford House and its property. The lease designates CSHPA to maintain the property, to make improvements and to run a house museum for the benefit of the general public. In addition, the lease allows CSHPA to hold a variety of rental events on the property, including weddings. The CSHPA received approval from the Landmarks Preservation Board on September 24, 2012, on plans to improve the garden at the back of the house and permission from Oakland City Planning to do the construction. The majority of the garden renovation project was completed that year. Implicit in the overall garden plan of the CSHPA was its intention to improve lighting around the structure.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Park and Recreation Advisory Board accept the informational report regarding the Camron Stanford House Landscaping and Lighting improvements.

SUMMARY .

Staff received a proposal to install a community inspired mural inside the Verdese Carter Recreation Center located at 9600 Sunnyside Street from One Toyota of Oakland. The Verdese Carter Recreation Center is operated by the Police Athletic League (PAL) and proposes to work in collaboration with local community leaders and youth to design and install the mural inside the recreation center to provide inspiration to program participants and visitors.

FISCAL IMPACT

There will be fiscal impact to the City of Oakland. One Toyota of Oakland Community Foundation has provided funding to pay for materials and supplies.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

In partnership with One Toyota of Oakland, Oakland Parks and Recreation and the Police Athletic League (PAL) the mural project team will host community design sessions to collect input for elements of design and offer a final mural design contest facilitated by a local community artist instructor. At the completion of the contest, youth from the community will participate in the mural installation, culminating with a mural unveiling ceremony.

BACKGROUND

Staff received a proposal to install a community inspired mural inside the Verdese Carter Recreation Center located at 9600 Sunnyside Street encompassing key aspects of the City of Oakland community, specifically East Oakland's diversity, education, industry and sports culture. The Verdese Carter Recreation Center is operated by the Police Athletic League (PAL) and proposes to work in collaboration with local community leaders and youth to design and install the mural inside the recreation center to provide inspiration to program participants and visitors.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission accept the informational report on the mural installation at Verdese Carter Recreation Center to provide inspiration to youth participants and visitors.

SUMMARY

Staff from the Oakland Public Works (OPW) and the Office of Parks and Recreation (OPR) request endorsement for the Conditional Use Permit in the design and implementation of Bishop Floyd L. Begin Plaza Renovation (Begin Plaza) Project funded by Housing-Related Parks Program (HRPP). The project includes improvements to approximately 12,833 square feet of the 19,020 square foot site located at 2251 San Pablo Ave, Oakland (see attachment A, Site Plan).

The project's scope addresses current visibility and security issues that are the result of high walls, sunken areas, and large pines and other trees that obscure visibility into and through the site. The project will address these issues through: removal of high walls that are a primary safety issue; leveling the plaza to improve visibility into and through the site; removal of large pines and other trees obstructing visibility while preserving and thinning the canopy of native oaks; planting new drought-tolerant trees, installing a playground, lights, picnic and game table area; and beautifying the park with public art and new landscaping and perimeter fencing.

FISCAL IMPACT

No fiscal impact is anticipated for Office of Parks & Recreation (OPR). However, the plaza may afford OPR with potential opportunities for programming since the Plaza will have new amenities of a park facility (playground, picnic area, open space). The estimated construction cost is \$700,000. The improvements are funded by Housing-Related Parks Program (HRPP).

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Bishop Floyd L. Begin Plaza is located at 2251 San Pablo Avenue between 21st Street and 22nd Street and Martin Luther King Jr. Way, and across from Alameda County Services building. The project will improve the visibility into and through the site from both the street level and neighboring the recently completed Cathedral Garden's affordable multifamily building by:

- 1. Eliminating the existing bunker-like walls to improve visibility throughout.
- 2. Removing existing pine trees and smaller evergreen trees that prohibit natural light from entering the plaza and causes visual obstruction for visibility to the site, the primary concerns for security and safety issues.
- 3. Installing new pedestrian lights and improving two existing street lights to enhance evening security.
- 4. Creating a new playground structure for 5 to 12 year old children.
- 5. Planting new drought-tolerant small trees along the street frontage to provide shading, wind-shielding and enhance the street edge without inhibiting visibility.
- 6. Create a picnic and game table area.
- 7. Provide a large, level open area for play and group activities.

The project is currently in 95% design phase. Construction of the project is anticipated to begin in May 2016 and complete by October 2016.

BACKGROUND

Bishop Floyd L. Begin Plaza is named for Bishop Floyd L. Begin, who was Bishop of Oakland Cathedral from 1962 until his death in 1977. It is a small plaza whose neighbors include the Greyhound bus station, freeway off ramp, the Veteran's Administration medical center, liquor stores, Alameda County Social Services, and a new 100 unit affordable rental housing complex, Cathedral Gardens.

Begin Plaza was designed and constructed in the late 1970's as a forecourt to the new Oakland Cathedral which damaged beyond repair during the 1989 earthquake and later demolished. The plaza was designed with massive concrete walls (some over five feet high) that serve as planter boxes to hold four Coastal Live Oaks and fifteen Pine trees on the limited site.

Over the years, the trees have become overgrown and overcrowded. The tree canopy over the plaza shields illegal activities in the plaza from observation by police and City staff due to dense shade, and restriction of light and visibility.

In August of 2014, Oakland Police Department completed a "Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design" report on the project site. The report stated the biggest issue with the current plaza is the design. The existing design of the plaza creates a space where illegitimate users can conduct criminal activity without being seen, and makes it impossible for police to enforce park rules by observation. By the time police enter the interior plaza area to see behind trees and the walls illegitimate users have already concealed their activity.

The existing Begin Plaza was being used by people sleeping on the benches, illegal drug activities, homeless encampment, and littering/garbage. In December 2014, the plaza condition was so bad that the City had to close the park and fenced the plaza with chain link fence.

In June 2014, City Of Oakland was awarded a grant through the State Department of Housing Development and Community's (HCD) Housing Related Parks Program Grant. The Grant provides \$928,530 funds to renovate the plaza. The project has been vetted through a total of 10

community meetings for over 14 months). Three community meetings were held with the Cathedral Garden Building owners, residents, and the neighborhood. The community provided overwhelming support for the new Begin Plaza plan.

The Bishop Floyd L. Begin Plaza Renovation project is part of the overall plan for improvements to the area, funded by the Housing-Related Parks Program (HRPP). The project will eliminate features (bunker walls, overgrown trees, poor lighting, and poor visibility) that contribute to negative activities, security and safety concerns of the neighborhood. It will also provide new features to invite families and the public to use and enjoy the plaza.

RECOMMENDATION

Oakland Public Works Department recommends that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission endorse the Bishop Floyd L. Begin Plaza Renovation Project and recommend approval to the Planning Commission for the Design Review, Conditional Use and Tree Permit applications.







CONDITIONAL USE PERMIT INFORMATION

What is a Conditional Use Permit?

The Zoning Ordinance describes two different types of uses in each zoning district: 1) permitted uses; and 2) conditional uses. Conditional uses are those which require special consideration from the City. - 3) any other relevant impact of the development.

An Asset for the Neighborhood

That the location, design, and site planning of the proposed development will provide a convenient and functional living, working, shopping, or civic environment, and will be as attractive as the nature of the use and its location and setting warrant.

Enhances the Area

That the proposed development will enhance the successful operation of the surrounding area in its basic community functions, or will provide an essential service to the community or region.

Meets Design Review Standards

That the proposal conforms to all applicable Regular Design Review criteria set forth in the design review procedure in Section 17.136.050.

Complies with the General Plan and other adopted City Plans That the proposal conforms in all significant respects with the Oakland General Plan and with any other applicable plan or development control map which has been adopted by the City Council.
