B. REQUEST FOR THE PARKS AND RECREATION ADVISORY COMMISSION TO RECOMMEND TO THE RULES AND LEGISLATION COMMITTEE TO NAME THE GROVE IN DEFREMERY PARK IN HONOR OF BOBBY HUTTON

The staff report was presented by Council President Lynette McElhaney and District 3 staff member Alexander Marqusee. The Council President requested that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission recommend to the Rules and Legislation Committee to name the grove in deFremery Park in honor of Bobby Hutton, the first member of the Black Panther party. He was also the 'first to fall' after his death during a tragic shootout near deFremery Park in 1968. His death marked a turning point in the history of Oakland and for the Black Panther Party. Each year, the local community commemorates his passing with a celebration in the park and has requested the naming of a portion of the park in Bobby Hutton's honor. 2016 marks the 5th anniversary of the founding of the Black Panther Party.

SUMMARY

Oakland Parks and Recreation received a request from the East Bay Front Runners and Walkers, a non-profit organization, that is affiliated with Road Runners Club of America, a nationwide organization that provides advice, support and liability insurance for recreational running clubs. East Bay Front Runner and Walkers are requesting for permission to collect on-site registration fees and sell limited merchandise during the 5K and 10K Pride Run/Walk, proceeds raised from the event will be donated to several local non-profit organizations. A Post Event Report from the 2015 Pride Run/Walk is attached.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is positive fiscal impact to Oakland Parks and Recreation. The East Bay Front Runners and Walkers are paying all rental fees associated with the event.

BACKGROUND

Since 2005, the East Bay Front Runners and Walkers (EBFR&W) have held their Pride Run/Walk around Lake Merritt. The Pride Run/Walk is timed, and prizes are awarded to the winners in various categories. The EBFR&W's has come before the Commission in 2011, 2012, 2013, 2014 and 2015 requesting to collect onsite registration fees and sales of limited merchandise and was granted approval of their request each year.

Dear Commissioners:

East Bay Front Runners and Walkers is a group of lesbians, gay men, bisexuals, transgenders, and friends who enjoy exercising outdoors. The club holds a run/walk every Saturday morning at a scenic location in the East Bay, including Lake Merritt, the Emeryville-Berkeley shoreline, and Bay Farm Island. The Saturday morning run/walks are non-competitive and very informal; participants simply meet at the announced location and then run or walk together.

Since 2005, the club has held an annual Pride Run/Walk consisting of 5K and 10K loops around Lake Merritt to encourage healthy recreation, particularly among those who are interested in a competitive event. The Pride Run/Walk is timed, and the winners in various categories are recognized. All participants receive simple refreshments (muffins, bagels, fruit, and juice) and a pair of EBFR&W socks bearing the club's initials. A few informational booths have been set up by a local chiropractor and a gym, but they sell no goods.

Net proceeds from the Pride Run/Walk event have been donated to several local nonprofit organizations, and we plan to continue doing this in future years. The club has endeavored to turn over all event proceeds after expenses to recipient organizations. (Ordinary club expenses are supported by annual membership dues and not by the Pride Run event.) The 2015 Pride Run/Walk event held by East Bay Front Runners and Walkers produced \$2,500 that was donated to the following organizations:

- Pacific Center in Berkeley, which provides professional counseling and advocacy to enhance the well-being and self-respect of lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender individuals.
- Oakland East Bay Gay Men's Chorus, a 40 to 50 voice gay men's chorus that performs a
 wide variety of music each year in concert and in numerous church, community and
 outreach performances.

Recipient organizations in 2016 have not yet been determined.

The number of participants each year has varied a little, but has remained at about 150 including those who ran or walked and those who volunteered on race day. In 2015, 122 persons registered, although some did not participate on race day. Runners and walkers were encouraged to preregister using the club's website (www.eastbayfrontrunners.org). As planned, most participants in the 2015 event registered in advance. Participants were encouraged to do so: advance registration was \$25, while same-day registration was \$30. The number of registrants were as follows:

Pre-registered, prepaid: 108 Registered/paid on-site: 12

108 (\$25 each) 14 (\$30 each)

In 2016, East Bay Front Runners and Walkers hopes to maintain or expand the reach of its annual Pride Run/Walk, both in the number of participants and in the funds raised for donation to worthy organizations. To assist in meeting this goal, the club requests permission to accept registration fees on race day at the event in Lakeside Park on October 8, 2016. Pre-registration will continue to be encouraged, using the club's website. As in 2015, we anticipate that most participants will pre-register, even if given a choice to register on-site, but having the ability to accept on-site registration enhances the event's appeal and increases the number of participants. We hope to reach a goal of approximately 200 registrants in 2016, with fees collected on-site to be no more than about \$1.000.

In 2016, no on-site donations will be solicited either for East Bay Front Runners and Walkers or for the recipient organizations. No sale of food items will take place. We do request permission to sell one merchandise item on-site. The EBFR&W club produces socks bearing the club's initials, and one pair of socks is given to each participant in the run/walk. We request permission to sell additional pairs of socks to any participants who might want them (we sold no pairs of socks at the 2015 Pride Run/Walk, but sold 2 pair the previous year). Socks would be sold approximately at cost (about \$7 per pair), not as a fund-raising measure but simply as a convenience to participants.

East Bay Front Runners and Walkers is a nonprofit organization with 501(c)(3) status and is affiliated with Road Runners Club of America (www.rrca.org), a nationwide organization that provides advice, support, and liability insurance for recreational running clubs. Liability insurance for East Bay Front Runners and Walkers' Pride Run/Walks is supplied through RRCA.

Thank you for your consideration, and please do not hesitate to let me know if I can provide additional information. Members of our club will be more than willing to attend a Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission meeting and answer any questions.

FISCAL IMPACT

BACKGROUND

The Art Deco Society is a Historic Preservation Group with a mission to save and bring awareness to structures and cultural contributions of the 1920s and 1930s. RECOMMENDATION



EXECUTIVE SUMMARY / OUTCOME

Oakland Parks and Recreation received a request from Aurora Lopez and Sagnicthe Salazar, Program Directors for The Xicana Moratorium Coalition, for permission to have community and local arts and crafts merchandise vendors collect donations at their Annual Festival at San Antonio Park on Sunday, August 28, 2016. The funds raised will be used to cover the costs of presenting the festival, e.g. stage rental, clean-up, tables/chairs, and to continue to do future community events like this one to promote support for local talent and artists.

FISCAL IMPACT

The San Antonio Recreation Center will collect rental fees in the amount of \$1,170 paid by The Xicana Moratorium Coalition for this event. This is a positive fiscal impact.

BACKGROUND

Xicana Moratorium has been promoting this event for 36 years, three (3) of those years at San Antonio Park. This year they are requesting to have vendors and to allow the collection of funds. Each event is free to the community and normally attracts about 200 attendees. Many of the participating vendors are community based organizations and local community artist who offer arts and crafts items for sale. They anticipate collecting \$200-\$300 from donations.

Xicana Moratorium Coalition is expected to have 5 to 10 arts & crafts vendors. There will be no food vendors, all food will be free at this event. The vendors pay table/booth fee/donation of \$20. Vendors also donate their arts for raffling as part of the agreement. This festival is dedicated to bringing the community together and building unity through the arts. This event also allows the showcasing and exposure as well as support for local talent in the Oakland community.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission approve the request to allow The Xicana Moratorium Coalition to have community merchants collect donations at their 37th Annual Festival at San Antonio Park on Sunday August 28, 2016. Aurora Lopez and Sagnicthe Salazar, Program Directors, are aware that additional permits will be required by the merchants and the Xicana Moratorium Coalition provided their request is granted.

Dear Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission:

Xicana Moratorium Coalition (XMC) would like to request your support in hosting the 37th Annual Xicana Moratorium Day on Sunday August 28th in San Antonio Park. Xicana Moratorium Coalition is a Coalition that has been around for over 20 years in the East Bay working with Raza (latino) youth to build leadership, relearn history and traditions, and work to create change around issues impacting our community. XMC works with middle school, high school and college age youth and is completely grassroot - all individuals, both adults and youth, are volunteer. Our youth have worked on various community festivals, garden projects, mural making, and support for families impacted by violence. The aim of our festivals and events is to do education in our communities around issues impacting us, such as immigration, the prison system, lack of quality education, violence in the streets, etc., and we work to empower both our young people and community to make changes.

Xicana Moratorium Day is a community gathering and festival to both honor a history of resistance and oppression within Raza communities in the U.S. and abroad, as well as a gathering to continue bringing community together to educate and organize around ongoing issues within our communities locally and abroad, and to celebrating the ongoing resistance, resiliency and culture of Raza people.

The original Chicano Moratorium Day was held on August 29th, 1970 at Ruben Salazar Park in Los Angeles, Ca. This nation wide gathering was organized as a peaceful protest in response to the Vietnam War and the disproportionate number of Chicanos dying at war. It was also a call to action for Chicanos to unite and put an end to the cultural, institutional, and political attacks. More than twenty thousand people from around the nation attended this gathering. What began as a peaceful protest ended in a devastating nightmare for brown people. Uniformed with riot gear, the LAPD rushed the park with the excuse that a group of young people had stolen a 6 pack from a near by liquor store and ran into the crowd of protestors. The Los Angeles Police riot left many people severely beaten, including students, elders, and organizers. Among the many injured, three people were murdered by the LAPD, Angel Diaz, Lynn Ward from the Brown Berets, and Ruben Salazar. Ruben Salazar was a news reporter for the LA Times who represented one of the first voices in mainstream media who brought to light the issues and concerns of the Raza community.

This year's event will be taking place on August 28th 2016 from 5am to 5pm. This event always takes place the last Sunday of August to commemorate the original Moratorium Day which also took place the last Sunday of August. We start off with a sun rise ceremony which is a indigenous tradition to pray to the sun in community and give blessings to our communities and for the day. After sun rise we begin set up for the event and Aztec dancers begin prepare to dance from 10-12pm to celebrate our culture, honor our history, and give blessings for the day. After the Aztec dancers we begin the festival which takes place from 12-5pm and it includes, cultural artists, community speakers, and local bands for families and community to enjoy while they are also learning about current struggles and organizing efforts. During this time we BBQ which we give out for free to all in attendance. Our young people also prepare activities for kids and monitor kids who want to get in the jumper. Lastly we like to invite local community organizations to table and local artists to vend.

The funds that would be collected at the event would be from sales for local vendors and we would also like to collect donations for the food and event in general. We want to make sure local art is supported and thriving which is why we like to invite vendors to sale anything from paintings to hand made bags. We collect donations because that helps us continue our work as this event and all events we put on are free to the community and are able to happen through donations and fundraisers that our youth organize. There will be about 20 vendors in total. There are no food vendors, only free food that we provide for all participants. We collect about \$150 in total worth of donations from participants.

We really hope that PRAC will support the continuation of this event that has been going on for the last 35 years, for three of those years now in Oakland. We hope that this event can be institutionalized in the city and be part of Oakland culture. We thank you in advance for allowing us on the agenda and support Xicana Moratorium Day.





EXECUTIVE SUMMARY / OUTCOME

In collaboration with Oakland Public Works (OPW) Supervisor Herman Miller, Oakland Parks & Recreation (OPR) Supervising Naturalist Stephanie Benavidez, and Friends of Joaquin Miller Park, OaklandTrails.org has identified two trail sections in Joaquin Miller Park that would benefit from the installation of new steps:

- Lower Palos Colorados Trail (6–8 new steps)
- Fern Ravine Trail (below Sequoia-Bayview Trail, 8-10 new steps)

These hiker-only trails were built decades ago, are severely over-grade, and suffer from erosion. The installation of steps will stabilize the surface and provide a safer path for hikers. A secondary outcome will likely be a deterrent for illegal mountain bike use of the trails.

The materials, clear 6x6 redwood timbers, have been approved by OPW.

OaklandTrails.org would like PRAC to approve the installation of new steps.

FISCAL IMPACT

There should be no fiscal impact to the City of Oakland. OaklandTrails.org will fund this project, and will provide the volunteers needed to install the steps per OPW guidelines. The estimated budget cost to replace the steps is \$1,500.

PROJECT / PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Oakland Trails.org would like to fund and install new steps in Joaquin Miller Park to improve hiker safety. The steps will be replaced with redwood timbers approved by OPW Safety will be improved by 1) stabilizing the hiking surface of over-grade trails, and 2) deterring illegal mountain bike use of the trails.

BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

The scope of this work has been approved by OPR and OPW. The project has also been shared with Friends of Sausal Creek, Friends of Joaquin Miller Park, and the Bicycle Trails Council of the East Bay. There has been no opposition from these stakeholder groups.







The mission of Oakland Volunteer Park Patrol (OVPP) is to improve the quality and safety of City parks. OVPP participants will be given special training to assist park users, support emergency responders, and report park issues to the proper City of Oakland agencies.

OVPP, now being established in Dimond Canyon and Joaquin Miller Park, is a pilot program for a potential citywide, volunteer park patrol effort.

FISCAL IMPACT

OaklandTrails.org is the co-founder of OVPP and will fund costs incurred for:

- graphic design
- website management
- jerseys and backpacks for volunteers
- printing

The estimated budget is \$2,500 for years 1 and 2.

REASON FOR SUPPLEMENTAL REPORT

At the April 13, 2016 Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission (PRAC) meeting, the PRAC provided several revision to staff's recommendation to amend Chapter 12.64 Park and Recreation Area Use Regulations of the Oakland Municipal Code (OMC) and Section 12.60.070 of the OMC, Bicycle Operation Rules-Violations-Penalty as related to use in parks. Staff has prepared a supplemental report requesting the PRAC approve the revised recommendation to City Council.

FISCAL IMPACT

The fiscal impact of the proposed ordinance change will be the cost to produce and install new park use signs with updated OMC rules. Many park rule signs are outdated, have graffiti on them and were slated for replacement. Since the April, 2016 staff report to PRAC, OPW provided a lower cost for sign replacement. The revised estimated cost is \$25,000 (250 signs at \$100 each). The cost of signs will be covered within the Oakland Public Works (OPW) budget in Fund 4400 - City Facilities Fund. Attachment C is a sample draft of the proposed new park sign that will be produced as the City's general park sign.

BACKGROUND

At the April 13, 2016 PRAC meeting the Commission reviewed and conducted a thorough discussion of the OMC relating to park use. PRAC made several modifications to staff's recommendation. Modifications made by PRAC are indicated by <u>underscoring</u> and deletions are indicated by <u>strike through type</u>.

12.64.060 - Games.

No person shall engage in any game of baseball, cricket, soccer, football, croquet or any other game with ball <u>and/or bat</u>, within the limits of any public park in the city, except where authorized by the OPR.

12.64.090 - Injuring trees and other properties.

It is unlawful for any person to trespass upon the grass of any public park in the city or to pick flowers from the same, or to cut, break or in any way injure, damage or deface the trees, grass, shrubs, turf, buildings, fences, benches, fountains, statuary or any fixtures connected therewith, or to foul any fountains or springs within said park any public park in the city.

12.64.100 - Disorderly conduct, vandalism, sleeping on benehes, or pilfering.

Disorderly conduct, pilfering, or vandalizing or sleeping on benches or seats in any public park is strictly prohibited.

12.64.101 - Playgrounds/Play area.

The Director may designate playground areas where the equipment shall be exclusively used or occupied by persons of a specific age range. Areas so designated shall be posted with one or more signs giving notice of the restricted use. Playground areas and equipment shall be used only as intended and shall be used by person of ages as designated with their chaperones or guardians.

12.64.120 - Park noise, musical instrument, and sound reproduction device regulations.

Permits issued for the operation of a sound amplification system or non-amplified sound device shall specify the location of such system or device within the park and the position of each loudspeaker shall be as specified by the Director so as to minimize, to the extent practicable, the amount of amplified sound to be audible in adjacent residential properties. No loudspeaker shall be permitted to be placed in a public park within three hundred (300) feet of any residential structure. In no event shall a permittee cause amplified or non-amplified sound to exceed eighty (80) decibels at any boundary of the park in which sound is being produced.

Note: PRAC requested staff determine an acceptable decibel level.

Article 11. - Park Permits

12.64.250 - Statement of principles.

All parks within the city are held in trust for the use of the public. Included within such use are public assembly, communication of thoughts between citizens and discussion of public questions. These uses of the city's parks are recognized as privileges, immunities, rights, and liberties belonging to all citizens, regardless of sex, race, religion, color, national origin, or political or philosophical persuasion. It is also recognized that the right to use the parks is not absolute, but relative, and must be exercised in subordination to the general comfort and convenience and in consonance with peace and good order.

This code is being reviewed by the City Attorney's Office to identify language to include all protected classes.

12.64.310 - Action on application for permit.

- A. Park Use Permits for Private Events. The Director of OPR shall grant or deny applications for park use permits for private events on or before fifteen (15) calendar days after the filing of the application unless the time for such granting or denial of the permit has been waived by the applicant in writing.
- B. Applications for OPD Permits for Special Events. The Chief of Police or his designee shall grant or deny applications for special events in parks pursuant to Title 9, Chapter 9.52 of the Oakland Municipal Code.
- C. Park Use Permits for Special Events. The Director shall grant or deny applications for park use permits for special events on or before thirty (30) days after the filing of the application unless the time for such granting or denial of the permit has been waived by the applicant in writing. D. Park Use Permits for Musical or Other Entertainment. The Director shall grant or deny applications for park use permits for musical or other entertainment on or before thirty (30) fifteen (15) days after the filing of the application unless the time for such granting or denial of the permit has been waived by the applicant in writing.

ANALYSIS AND POLICY ALTERNATIVES

PRAC's suggested revisions were incorporated with the exception of the change to OMC 12.64.120 Park Noise. The Commission requested that staff provide an acceptable decibel level for sound and noise in parks. Staff researched different methods of measuring sound decibels including measurement tools, policy of similar cities, and existing codes and laws. Staff received input from Oakland Police Department (OPD) who expressed that officers are not trained on and do not have a reliable method of measuring the level of decibel sound. In addition, existing OMC sound measurement requirement of 50 feet is consistent with California Vehicle Code 27007 (Attachment B). After considering all factors, staff recommends the existing language is retained.

Park signs at most neighborhood parks have misinformation about the prohibition of sound and musical instruments in a park without a permit. Amending Section 12.64.120 Park Noise prohibits amplified and non-amplified sound that can be heard fifty (50) or more feet away from the source or between the hours of 9 p.m. to 7 a.m., except upon the issuance of a permit. The PRAC may, in its discretion, further restrict such hours in specific parks where such operation would unreasonably disturb or damage the comfort, peace, health or safety of persons or businesses.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission approve the recommendation to City Council to amend Chapter 12.64 of the Oakland Municipal Code, Parks and Recreation Area Use Regulations; Section 12.60.070 of the Oakland Municipal Code, Bicycle Operation Rules-Violations-Penalty as related to use in parks.

27007.

No driver of a vehicle shall operate, or permit the operation of, any sound amplification system which can be heard outside the vehicle from 50 or more feet when the vehicle is being operated upon a highway, unless that system is being operated to request assistance or warn of a hazardous situation.

This section does not apply to authorized emergency vehicles or vehicles operated by gas, electric, communications, or water utilities. This section does not apply to the sound systems of vehicles used for advertising, or in parades, political or other special events, except that the use of sound systems on those vehicles may be prohibited by a local authority by ordinance or resolution.
