Oakland Parks & Recreation received a request from San Francisco Mime Troupe (SFMT), a IRC 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, for permission to collect donations and to sell event related merchandise at Lakeside Park on July 27 and July 28, 2016. Approval from the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission (PRAC) is required per O.M.C. section 12.64.080.

Approval from the PRAC is required per O.M.C. section 12.64.080.

All work provided is at no cost to the home owner. Rebuilding Together Oakland is requesting approval to collect onsite donations, ticket sales at door and host a silent auction at their Annual Gather Together Fundraiser. All funds collected will be used to achieve the programmatic goals of Rebuilding Together Oakland | Eastbay and the homeowners they serve. Approval from the PRAC is required per O.M.C. Dragon boating is a 2,500 year old sport that originated in China, but is now truly international, with teams in North America, Europe, Asia, Africa, and Australia. On May 5, 2016, the Tree Services Division denied tree removal permit application ND16-035 for 654 Longridge Road to remove two trees. The Applicant (Igal Sarfaty) requested to remove two Deodar cedar trees on his property. Providing the following reasons (a) causing property damage to the foundation of the pool wall and (b) posed an immediate hazard to the home owner's property. A City arborist evaluated the trees and determined the Applicant's assessment was not valid.

Desmona Armstrong, Oakland Parks & Recreation Central Reservations, presented the staff report for Item 8G. Oakland Parks & Recreation received a request from DopeOnly, (DO) a brand management and marketing firm, for permission to collect funds at their community based social gathering known as Cool Water. This event was created as a social get together to promote synergy within the greater Oakland community and has become known as a grand melting pot of people from all walks of life.

There are approximately 1000 attendees expected between the ages of 30 to 50. The Jack London Aquatic Center can accommodate approximately 400 guests outside and another 300 inside. An Oakland based security firm will be on hand to manage the crowds. According to the event organizers, because Cool Water is such a popular community event, they will forego traditional advertisement and will rely on word-of-mouth promotions.

Oakland Parks & Recreation received a request from Lao Iu Mien Culture Association, Inc. to collect funds at their annual scholarship fundraising event. Proceeds from the event will benefit graduating Iu Mien High School students' pursuit of higher education.

I. REQUEST FOR THE OAKLAND PARKS AND RECREATION ADVISORY COMMISSION TO APPROVE THE INSTALLATION OF NEW STEPS IN JOAQUIN MILLER PARK IN ORDER TO IMPROVE SAFETY ON HIKING TRAILS

Stan Dodson from the Friends of Joaquin Miller Park presented the report for Item 81. In collaboration with Oakland Public Works (OPW) Supervisor Herman Miller, Oakland Parks & Recreation (OPR) Supervising Naturalist Stephanie Benavidez, and Friends of Joaquin Miller Park, OaklandTrails.org has identified two trail sections in Joaquin Miller Park that would benefit from the replacement of steps. These areas are located at:

- Lower Palos Colorados Trail (6–8 new steps)
- Fern Ravine Trail (below Sequoia-Bayview Trail, 8–10 steps)

The steps on hiker-only trails were built decades ago, are severely over-grade, and suffer from erosion. The new steps will stabilize the surface and provide a safer path for hikers. A secondary outcome will likely be a deterrent for illegal mountain bike use of the trails. Signs could be used to advertise the new steps to attempt to mitigate injury to illegal mountain bikers.

The steps are expected to have a minimal life span of approximately 10 years given the use of redwood which is more resilient than most, and will naturally decompose into the earth. Depending on the use, the steps could last 15 to 20 years.

Motion: Commissioner Miller entertained a motion to grant the staff recommendation to approve the installation of replacement steps in Joaquin Miller Park in locations described in order to improve safety on hiking trails. Moved by: Commissioner Wu Second by: Commissioner Reilly. Vote: Yes — Corbin, Howze, Kadera-Redmond, Marshall, Miller, Peterson, Reilly and Wu. Motion: Passed.

J. <u>INFORMATIONAL REPORT: "POINT BY CANOGLE" WALKING TOURS IN DIMOND PARK, DIMOND CANYON PARK, AND JOAQUIN MILLER PARK</u>

Stan Dodson from Friends of Joaquin Miller Park presented the informational report for Item 8J. OaklandTrails.org will produce three "Point by Canogle" audio hiking tours for Oakland. The free smartphone application guides users by telling stories triggered by GPS.

In Phase 1, OaklandTrails.org plans to produce three separate tours:

- Grand Tour Dimond Park to Chabot Space & Science Center (5.25 miles)
- Redwoods Tour 3-mile loop in Joaquin Miller Park
- Dimond Business District Tour 1.5 miles in the heart of Dimond

OaklandTrails.org will raise the \$9,000 to produce the project. The organization will also work with several agencies and other organizations to create the content for the hiking tours.

K. INFORMATIONAL REPORT: OAKLAND VOLUNTEER PARK PATROL.

Stan Dodson from Friends of Joaquin Miller Park presented the informational report for Item 8K. The mission of Oakland Volunteer Park Patrol (OVPP) is to improve the quality and safety of City parks. OVPP participants will be given training to assist park users, support emergency responders, and report park issues to the proper City of Oakland agencies.

OVPP, now being established in Dimond Canyon and Joaquin Miller Park, is a pilot program for a potential citywide, volunteer park patrol effort.

Project organizers are working with an exploratory committee including several City department staff, community organizations and Vice Mayor Annie Campbell Washington to develop a framework of activities and protocols. A sample of the duties or activities include, patrolling designated parks, reporting maintenance issues on trails or other park facilities, assisting first responders in search and rescue functions and help park users understand park rules and regulations. Volunteers may receive training regarding how to report crimes but this is not the primary goal of the unit.

A mockup of the Oakland Volunteer Park Patrol recruitment handout was distributed to the Commission. The brochure included information regarding the OVPP's mission statement, duties and eligibility criteria. To mitigate any perception that OVPP's purpose is that of enforcement, the Commission recommended changing the shape of the patch/emblem depicted on the cover of the brochure as resembles the shape of the traditional police badge.

Motion: Commissioner Miller entertained a motion to accept the informational report on the Oakland Volunteer Park Patrol with a follow-up report reequested in May 2017. Moved by: Commissioner Kadera-Redmond Second by: Commissioner Marshall. Vote: Yes — Corbin, Howze, Kadera-Redmond, Marshall, Miller and Wu. Motion: Passed.

Staff prepared a supplemental report summarizing the PRAC changes and requested direction on 12.64.120 – Park noise, musical instrument, and reproduction devise regulations.

After discussion, the Commission agreed that the item should be returned to the subcommittee for the purpose of addressing the issues raised by the PRAC. These include:

FISCAL IMPACT

BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

This is the 57th year that the SFMT has performed in the Bay Area parks with free theatrical performances. The SFMT has rented Lakeside Park in the past and has come before the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission for approval for collection of donation and selling event related merchandise. The events have been well attended and well planned.

The estimate attendance is 250. Existing park facilities are sufficient to support this event with no need for additional restroom facilities or crowd control measures.

The merchandise for sale will include hats, shirts, recorded music, books and bags. Prices will range from \$5 to \$30.

In 2015, SFMT rented Lakeside Park. The two day collection of on-site donations totaled \$2,291.00.

SUMMARY

PRAC approval is required in order for Burger Boogaloo to solicit entrance fees and to sell food, merchandise, and beverages at a City of Oakland park, in accordance with Oakland Municipal Code Section 12.64.080. This is Burger Boogaloo's 4th annual 2-day music festival held at Mosswood Park on June 25-26, 2016. Last year's Burger Boogaloo event at Mosswood Park had over 3,000 attendees per day and provided entertainment for music fans of all ages. Burger Boogaloo is requesting the approval of soliciting an onsite entrance fee in which proceeds will help cover the cost of musicians, equipment, marketing, staffing, and facility usage and donation fees. In addition, Burger Boogaloo is requesting the approval to sell merchandise, food concessions and alcoholic beverages. Best Beverage Catering Company will be contracted to facilitate all management and security of alcohol sales. Best Beverage Catering is a reputable company that has managed such events as Outside Lands Music Festival in Golden Gate Park and Treasure Island Music Festival. Burger Boogaloo has also secured National Construction Rentals to provide full fencing around perimeter of event, as well as, a secured designated alcohol zone. Local food concessions will be provided by Oakland merchants.

FISCAL IMPACT

Mosswood Recreation Center will charge approximately \$9,000 for rental usage of the park for the 2-day event. The revenues will be deposited to the Fund 1820 – OPR Self-Sustaining fund, which supports on-going programs, events and activities. For the 2-day event, Mosswood will provide 3 staff to help monitor this event for a total impact of approximately \$930, which will be covered by the rental usage fees.

Burger Boogaloo will directly provide lighting, sound, equipment, advertising, staffing, medical care, temporary fencing, and security by National Event Staffing.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The mission of Burger Boogaloo is to showcase local musicians and bring together the arts community in Oakland, CA and the surrounding areas. This festival will be held at the Mosswood Amphitheater from $1:00 \, \mathrm{pm} - 10:00 \, \mathrm{pm}$ on June 25-26, 2016 and is supported by the Eastbay Express, SF Guardian and many local merchants. The event will be hosted by John Waters, an American film director, screenwriter, author, and actor, for the second year in a row. With the

success of last year's event Burger Boogaloo organizers strive to make this an annual event with Oakland Parks & Recreation and continue to attract local and legendary performers.

Set-up for this event will occur on June 23-24. Burger Boogaloo obtains security and maintenance crew, medical staff, fencing, and portable restrooms. Mosswood Recreation Center staff will be available during set-up time to monitor and provide assistance if necessary. In accordance with Oakland Municipal Code:12.64.360, the City requires that temporary or portable toilets be made available at the ratio of one per every 500 people. Burger Boogaloo will be providing 100 portable restroooms, 5 of which are ADA accessible, in compliance with the City's standards.

Security will be provided by National Event Staffing. Approximately 30-40 security staff will be present both inside and outside of the event at numerous locations including the parking lot, inside the recreation center, backstage, at the entrance, near the stage, around the concession booths, and spread amongst the attendees.

BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

Burger Boogaloo, now in its fourth year at Mosswood Park, was organized by Marc Ribak and Amy Caver, with the help of Sean Borhman of Burger Records. Burger Records features a lineup of over 100 fantastic Rock/Pop music acts. Of these acts, about 20-25 will perform on two stages at the 2016 summer event. More details, including a list of performers, can be found on their website at www.burgerboogaloo.com.

Burger Boogaloo provides an opportunity to showcase local talent not only in the music industry, but in the food industry as well. Last year featured 11 vendors serving a variety of food and drink, from burgers and beers to vegan treats and gournet coffee.

RECOMMENDATION

Oakland Parks & Recreation staff recommends that the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission approve the request to solicit entrance fees and for the sale of food concession, merchandise and alcoholic beverages for the 4th Annual Burger Boogaloo at Mosswood Park on June 25-26, 2016.

Hi, I would like to thank you for making it possible for us to host the Burger Boogaloo music event at Oakland CA's Mosswood Park the last three years. It has been a great joy working with the city on these events, and learning from its dedicated staff and officials. There is an enthusiasm in Oakland that is different from San Francisco, and I'm grateful I've had the opportunity to bring together the arts community in this vibrant city.

Since its conception, I've organized the Burger Boogaloo with the help of the friendly staffers at Mosswood Park. The festival has brought out Rock & Roll Hall of Famer's, like Ronnie Spector, as well as local favorites like Jonathan Richman and Shannon and The Clams. The event takes place at the historic Mosswood Park Amphitheatre between the hours of Noon- 10PM on the last weekend of June. Nestled in the redwoods, yet located close to BART, Mosswood Park provides a fun atmosphere for music fans and concert goers.

They are requesting to collect funds onsite for a Prize Drawing or Fund-A-Need at their 5th Annual Women's Leadership Luncheon Fundraiser. This is Family Paths, Inc. second year hosting their fundraising event at an OPR facility. Family Paths Inc. fundraisers are essential to the continuation and expansion of their programs and services. Approval from the PRAC is required per O.M.C. Section 12.64.080.

FISCAL IMPACT

There will be a positive fiscal impact to Oakland Parks & Recreation. Family Paths Inc. is paying all rental fees associated with the event estimated at \$780.00.

PROJECT / PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

This is Family Paths Inc. 5th Annual Women's Leadership Luncheon fundraiser. Attached is an article of last year's event in their Newsletter/Annual Report, which was held for the first time at the Lakeside Park Garden Center, featuring international child and women's advocate, Sudha Shetty of UC Berkeley's Goldman School of Public Policy.

Tickets will be sold in advance online for \$65.00-\$100.00 each, depending on package purchased. In previous years, they have held a prize drawing or Fund-A- Need to raise additional funds onsite. Last year's drawing raised approximately \$1,200. 



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











SJC's mission is to protect and advance the rights of immigrants and their families through direct legal representation in immigration court. All of SJC's services are fixed low fees and pro bono. SJC is requesting to collect onsite donations at their Gala Benefit Dinner on Sunday, October 16, 2016, at the Lake Merritt Sailboat House. Approval from the PRAC is required per O.M.C. section 12.64.080.

FISCAL IMPACT

There will be a positive fiscal impact to Oakland Parks & Recreation. Social Justice Collaborative is paying all rental fees associated with the event estimated at \$1422.50.

PROJECT / PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

SJC's Gala Benefit Dinner is a fundraising event to increase awareness and support low cost direct legal services that SJC provides to low-income immigrants in the Bay Area. Registration and sponsorships will be collected prior to the event. However, the key component of the fundraiser at the Gala Benefit Dinner is the inspirational speakers of the evening and SJC staff will request monetary donations from guests at the event.

The established attendance is 120. The building facilities are sufficient to support this event with no need for additional restroom facilities or crowd control measures.

BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

SUMMARY

Oakland Parks & Recreation received a request from Rebuilding Together Oakland | Eastbay, IRC 501(c)(3)a non-profit organization that provides free home rehabilitation modifications and repairs, performs safe and healthy home assessments, and installs fall prevention measures through its Safe at Home volunteers program. All work provided is at no cost to the home owner. Rebuilding Together Oakland is requesting approval to collect onsite donations, ticket sales at door and host a silent auction at their Annual Gather Together Fundraiser. All funds collected will be used to achieve the programmatic goals of Rebuilding Together Oakland | Eastbay and the homeowners they serve. Approval from the PRAC is required per O.M.C. Section 12.64.080.

FISCAL IMPACT

There will be a positive fiscal impact to Oakland Parks & Recreation. Rebuilding Together Oakland | East Bay is paying all rental fees associated with the event estimated at \$1650.00.

PROJECT / PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Rebuilding Together Oakland | Eastbay has a strategy of continuous, sustained community engagement efforts showing that neighbor helping neighbor never goes out of style. Businesses are encouraged to financially support Build Days and to engage their staff as community volunteers, work with City officials, Fire Departments and community civic organizations to be the change they want to see in their communities.

All event sponsorships are in place long before the event date. Tickets are also purchased in advance. However on occasion a pre-registered ticket will be paid for onsite; there are no walk-in tickets for purchase.

Rebuilding Together Oakland | Eastbay is requesting to collect the occasional pre-registered tickets of \$100 onsite. Mode of payments for all transactions is credit or debit card through a SQUARE reader.

The estimated attendance is 150. Existing building facilities are sufficient to support the event with no need for additional restroom facilities or crowd control measures.

BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

Rebuilding Together Oakland | Eastbay, is a non-profit organization that provides free home rehabilitation modifications and repairs for low-income homeowners. The majority of those homeowners live on less than \$18,000 a year. They are seniors and disabled individuals, many of whom are veterans and/or caring for family members. All home repairs done by Rebuilding Together Oakland | Eastbay are provided at no cost to homeowners. Funds to do this work comes from individual donors, grants, city and county contracts (with Oakland, Hayward and Alameda County), corporate funders typically through team sponsorships, skilled volunteers and donated or discounted material through vendor contracts.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission approve the request from Rebuilding Together Oakland | Eastbay to collect on-site donations at their Annual Gather Together Fundraising Event, at Lake Merritt Sailboat House on Thursday, October 6, 2016.

Business are encouraged to financially support Build Days and to engage their staff as community volunteers, we work with City Officials, the Fire Department, and community civic organizations to be the change we want to see in our communities.

Request to collect funds on-site

All event sponsorship are in place long prior to the event. Tickets are purchased in advance, but on occasion a pre-registered ticket will be paid for onsite. There are no walk-in tickets for purchase. The tickets are \$100. Not items are being sold onsite. The bar is open bar. Mode of payments for all ticket transactions is credit or debit card through a SQUARE reader. A Silent Auction will be held. Bids on paper will be made. A winner announced. Payment will be via credit or debit card using a SQUARE reader. There will also be a text to give component to the event, where attendees have an opportunity to support the work of the organization through individual donations. These opportunities are made through online pledges. No transaction will take place, but will be fulfilled at a future date.

All funds will be used to achieve the programmatic goals of Rebuilding Together Oakland and the homeowners we serve.

This letter is in response to the amendment to your organization's Articles of Incorporation filed with the state on March 13, 2002. We have updated our records to reflect the name change as indicated above.

Our records indicate that a determination letter issued in May 1995 granted your organization exemption from federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. That letter is still in effect.

Based on information subsequently submitted, we classified your organization as one that is not a private foundation within the meaning of section 509(a) of the Code because it is an organization described in sections 509(a)(1) and 170(b)(1)(A)(vi).

This classification was based on the assumption that your organization's operations would continue as stated in the application. If your organization's sources of support, or its character, method of operations, or purposes have changed, please let us know so we can consider the effect of the change on the exempt status and foundation status of your organization.

Your organization is required to file Form 990, Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax, only if its gross receipts each year are normally more than \$25,000. If a return is required, it must be filed by the 15th day of the fifth month after the end of the organization's annual accounting period. The law imposes a penalty of \$20 a day, up to a maximum of \$10,000, when a return is filed late, unless there is reasonable cause for the delay.

All exempt organizations (unless specifically excluded) are liable for taxes under the Federal insurance Contributions Act (social security taxes) on remuneration of \$100 or more paid to each employee during a calendar year. Your organization is not liable for the tax imposed under the Federal Unemployment Tax Act (FUTA).

Organizations that are not private foundations are not subject to the excise taxes under Chapter 42 of the Code. However, these organizations are not automatically exempt from other federal excise taxes.

Donors may deduct contributions to your organization as provided in section 170 of the Code. Bequests, legacies, devises, transfers, or gifts to your organization or for its use are deductible for federal estate and gift tax purposes if they meet the applicable provisions of sections 2055, 2106, and 2522 of the Code.

SUMMARY

Oakland Parks & Recreation received a request from the California Dragon Boat Association (CDBA), a IRC 501(c)(3) non-profit organization with nearly 1,000 members that runs many dragon boat races and events in the Bay Area. Dragon boating is a 2,500 year old sport that originated in China, but is now truly international, with teams in North America, Europe, Asia, Africa, and Australia. CDBA is requesting approval to collect funds onsite for food sales and merchandise at their 21st Annual Northern California International Dragon Boat Festival to be held at Lakeside Park and Lake Merritt Sailboat House on Saturday, September 17, 2016 and Sunday, September 18, 2016. All proceeds from this event benefit their nationally recognized CDBA Youth Dragon Boat program, which promotes teamwork, leadership, cultural awareness, health and fitness among high school youth through a yearlong dragon boat program offered at Bay Area high schools and youth organizations. Approval from the PRAC is required per O.M.C. Section 12.64.080.

FISCAL IMPACT

There will be a positive fiscal impact to Oakland Parks & Recreation. California Dragon Boat Association is paying all rental fees associated with the event.

PROJECT / PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The International Dragon Boat Festival is organized by the CDBA. It is the largest competitive dragon boat festival in the United States, regularly hosting close to 130 teams from all over the United States, Canada, Europe, and Asia. The festival is a major event in the Bay Area, and is distinctive from other community festivals and Bay Area sports events in its unique blend of cultural heritage, athletic competition, and community festival activities. Over the years, the CDBA has developed the festival into a major community event that attracts families, young professionals, athletes, seniors, and more.

The following funds are being requested to collect onsite:

- Food sales The event typically has a combination of food vendors and food trucks that sell lunch and snacks for the public. Prices normally range from \$3 to \$10 depending on the item being sold.
- Official merchandise sales The CDBA sells official festival merchandise, primarily t-shirts, athletic shirts, jackets, and sweatshirts, with the festival logo on it. Prices typically range from \$10 to \$50 depending on the item being sold.
- Other paddling / fitness and merchandise sales Other vendors will be onsite that sell
 paddling or fitness oriented clothing and equipment (i.e., paddles, life jackets, paddle bags,
 paddling shorts, etc.) and including Asian cultural children's books, handmade candles,
 artisan chocolate, etc. These prices vary widely by product type. For example, a children's
 book may cost around \$10, while a carbon fiber dragon boat paddle may cost around \$150.

The estimated attendance is 3500. CDBA will provide 7 portable restroom facilities to accommodate the number of attendees in accordance with O.M.C. Section 12.64.360, which provides for the provision of temporary restroom facilities at the ratio of one to every 500 persons.

BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

The CDBA was founded in 1996 and promotes strong, healthy communities in the Bay Area through high quality dragon boat programs. The organization is one of the most well-respected dragon boat organizations in the United States, with extensive adult, college, and youth dragon boat programs.

The Dragon Boat Festival is one of three major holidays celebrated in Chinese communities around the world. A dragon boat team consists of 20 paddlers, a drummer, and a steersperson, and is heavily reliant on timing and teamwork. There are no "stars" in dragon boating, as the success of the boat depends upon how well the team works together. Due to its ability to bring teams together, dragon boating has been exceptionally popular with corporate, community, and civic organizations.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission approve the request from California Dragon Boat Association to collect funds onsite for food sales, official event merchandise and other paddling/fitness merchandise at the Dragon Boat Races and Cultural Festival at Lakeside Park and Sailboat House on Saturday, September 17, 2016 and Sunday, September 18, 2016.

On behalf of the California Dragon Boat Association (CDBA), we would like to submit this request for approval to collect funds on site for the 21st Annual Northern California International Dragon Boat Festival, to be held at Lake Merritt on September 17 and 18, 2016. In this Proposal Letter, we have provided the following, per the PRAC requirements:


- Brief history of the California Dragon Boat Association;

- Organization and program benefitting from collected funds.

THE CALIFORNIA DRAGON BOAT ASSOCIATION (CDBA) AND DRAGON BOAT RACING

The CDBA, founded in 1996, promotes strong, healthy communities in the Bay Area through high quality dragon boat programs. The organization is one of the most well-respected dragon boat organizations in the United States, with extensive adult, college, and youth dragon boat programs. The CDBA is a non-profit, 501(c)3 organization with nearly 1,000 members that also runs many dragon boat races and events in the Bay Area. We started as a partnership with Self Help for the Elderly, a senior-serving organization with whom we still work closely and contribute to annually. The CDBA is a volunteer run organization.

Dragon boating is a 2,500 year old sport that originated in China, but is now truly international, with teams in North America, Europe, Asia, Africa, and Australia. The Dragon Boat Festival is one of three major holidays celebrated in Chinese communities around the world. A dragon boat team consists of 20 paddlers, a drummer, and a steersperson, and is heavily reliant on timing and teamwork. There are no "stars" in dragon boating, as the success of the boat depends upon how well the team works together. Due to its ability to bring teams together, dragon boating has been exceptionally popular with corporate, community, and civic organizations.

Additionally, dragon boating is very accessible from both a cost and physical needs perspective. The CDBA provides the boats, sites, equipment, and coaches necessary to learn dragon boating, and it is something which can be learned at a basic level in a very short time. It is also very physical accessible, which has led to the development of many cancer survivor and sight impaired teams.



THE NORTHERN CALIFORNIA INTERNATIONAL DRAGON BOAT FESTIVAL

The International Dragon Boat Festival is organized by the CDBA. It is the largest competitive dragon boat festival in the United States, regularly hosting close to 130 teams from all over the United States, Canada, Europe, and Asia. The Festival is a major event in the Bay Area, and is distinctive from other community festivals and Bay Area sports events in its unique blend of cultural heritage, athletic competition, and community festival activities.


Over the years, the CDBA has developed the festival into a major community event that attracts families, young professionals, athletes, seniors, and more. The festival includes the following elements:

- Dragon Boat Racing The racing features competitive level teams from around the world, novice teams representing many of the Bay Area's major corporations and community organizations, and high school and college teams.
- Health & Wellness Pavilion In the past this has included the well-known Sunscreen Bar, eyeglass cleaning, body fat and blood pressure measurement, massage, spin art, and airbrush tattoos.
- Cultural Stage The stage features two days of high quality performers and entertainment, such as lion dance, taiko drumming, Chinese acrobats and folk dance, martial artists, Hawaiian dancing, magicians, gospel choirs, and much more.
- Dragon Land This children and family activity area, centered around a large activity pavilion, has been a major attraction for the family audience and includes arts and crafts, games, roving dragons, Chinese stilt walkers, magicians, face painting, and animal balloons.
- Opening Ceremony Every year, the CDBA holds an Opening Ceremony where Buddhist monks
 present a traditional blessing ceremony that historically is associated with dragon boat racing, where
 the elected officials and community leaders "dot the eye" of the dragon to bring good luck to all
 teams.
- Vendors / Booths The festival features a modest vendor area, including food trucks, artisan food vendors, arts and crafts, and fitness or paddling oriented vendors.
- Shuttle Buses In order to increase accessibility and to promote sustainability goals, the CDBA funds free shuttle buses to the event.

KEY CATEGORIES OF FUNDS TO BE COLLECTED ON-SITE

The CDBA collects the following on-site funds:

- Food sales The event typically has a combination of food vendors and food trucks who sell lunch and snacks for the public. Prices normally range from \$3 to \$10 depending on the item being sold.
- Official merchandise sales The CDBA sells official festival merchandise, primarily t-shirts, athletic shirts, jackets, and sweatshirts, with the festival logo on it. Prices typically range from \$10 to \$50 depending on what is being sold.
- Other paddling / fitness and merchandise sales In addition, we have other vendors who sell paddling or fitness oriented clothing and equipment (i.e. paddles, life jackets, paddle bags, paddling shorts, etc.) and other merchandise including Asian cultural children's books, handmade candles, artisan chocolate, etc. These prices vary widely by product type. For example, a children's book can cost around \$10, while a carbon fiber dragon boat paddle can cost around \$150.



REASON FOR ON-SITE FUND COLLECTION

The event is a cultural and dragon boat festival, and as such, we have vendors who reinforce this theme and provide additional activities for the public and participants. The limited number of food booths and food trucks are there to serve the public and paddlers and to encourage a longer length of stay. Also, we market ourselves as a family festival, so having snacks and food available for children is important.

ORGANIZATION AND PROGRAM BENEFITTING FROM COLLECTED FUNDS

The food and merchandise booths, as well as the festival merchandise, do not generate large amounts of revenue for the CDBA. However, all proceeds from our festival benefit our nationally recognized CDBA Youth Dragon Boat program, which promotes teamwork, leadership, cultural awareness, and health and fitness among high school youth through a year-long dragon boat program offered at Bay Area high schools and youth organizations. The program serves a wide diversity of youth, but in particular has been able to reach many immigrant high school youth who do not traditionally participate in competitive sports activities, and therefore would not have been otherwise able to realize the benefits of participating in a team sport. Many of the youth who participate in our programs do not have parents who are involved as coaches or team managers in soccer or baseball programs, so for most, dragon boating is their first experience with a team sport. Furthermore, many high school sports have certain height, size, or physical skill or ability requirements, but dragon boating is accessible to all, including those with disabilities. Many of the youth who participate have never thought about fitness or athletic competition, but after a year or two are able to compete at a very elite level in dragon boating. The program is offered either free or at very low cost to participating youth.

SUMMARY

Public Art Program Staff recommends that the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission recommend approval of the mural design by Attitudinal Healing Connection, and artists Justin Metoyer-Mullon and Daniel Panko for the Durant Mini Park Public Art Project in West Oakland. The proposed project, commissioned by the Public Art Program in compliance with the associated grant funds for general park improvements, will beautify the park with a community-inspired mural created by a local organization, Attitudinal Healing Connection, serving the needs of the West Oakland community.

The project is being administered through the Public Art Program, Cultural Arts Unit, Economic and Workforce Development Department, in conjunction with the park improvements administered through the Public Works Project Delivery Division in 2015. The Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission must review and approve all public art project designs proposed for Oakland Parks and Recreation facilities, either as part of a larger capital improvement design review, or through an independent review when the artwork is designed independently.

FISCAL IMPACT

The Durant Mini Park Public Art Project is funded through City of Oakland percent for art funds associated with the California State Proposition 84 project grant secured to make the general park improvements (per Ordinance Number 11066 C.M.S). The grant specifically committed to funding a mural as a component of the park improvements. Attitudinal Healing and the artist team will be compensated for the creation of the mural as a subcontractor to the Beliveau Engineering contract in the amount of eighteen thousand dollars (\$18,000) for project administration, artist fees, supplies, and installation costs. There is no direct fiscal impact for Oakland Parks and Recreation for creation of the mural.

PROJECT / PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Durant Mini Park is located on 29th Street in West Oakland (District 3) on Martin Luther King Blvd. Attitudinal Healing Connection (AHC), the West Oakland-based nonprofit community organization, was subcontracted with the Durant Mini Park's General Contractor, Beliveau Engineering Contractors, Inc., to develop and install a public art mural as part of the park improvements funded Revised 5/16/16

through a Proposition 84 state grant, which specified the inclusion of a mural as part of the park improvements. AHC commenced work in March, and the artist team conducted outreach at a community event in the park on March 19th, 2016 to identify themes and inform the mural's composition prior to design development.

The park is used by local families and children and is often the site of memorials for community members lost to violence. The artists were asked to develop a design which would honor the community's values, including nature, family and animals, as well as compliment the young children's playground equipment and community gardens located at the park. The mural will be created with acrylic mural paints and spray paint, coated with TSW 800, an anti-graffiti semi-gloss clear coat, which also provides a UV protective barrier.

The design proposal is attached, as well as a summary of the design, artist resume and site images.

BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

Due to the time constraints related to the grant fund source and new public art contracting requirements for public improvement projects, for the Durant Mini Park Public Art Project, the Public Art Program coordinated with Public Works staff to subcontract the scope of work to the local, community arts organization Attitudinal Healing Connection, with demonstrated experience working on murals in West Oakland. Once the organization was under subcontract they identified the two artists to work on the project. Local community was engaged in the subject and design development during the local community event held at the park on March 19th, 2016.

Preliminary design concepts were reviewed and feedback provided at the Public Art Advisory Committee (PAAC) meeting held on May 2, 2016, and final review is scheduled for the PAAC meeting on June 6, 2016. The design will also be presented to the community for final review on June 2, 2016 at the local RACC meeting. Pending final approval by the PAAC and recommended approval from the PRAC, the mural is scheduled to be created on site June 10 – June 19, 2016.

The project must be completed by June 30, 2016 to meet Proposition 84 grant requirements. Community will also be invited to celebrate the mural installation.

RECOMMENDATION

Public Art Program Staff recommends that the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission recommend approval of the mural design by Attitudinal Healing Connection, and artists Justin Metoyer-Mullon and Daniel Panko for the Durant Mini Park Public Art Project in West Oakland. The proposed project, commissioned by the Public Art Program in compliance with the associated grant funds for general park improvements, will beautify the park with a community-inspired mural created by a local organization, Attitudinal Healing Connection, serving the needs of the West Oakland community.



ATTITUDINAL HEALING CONNECTION Durant Mini Park Design Narrative

Lead artists for the Durant Mini-Park Mural are Justin Metoyer-Mullon and Daniel Panko. The design process began by engaging community members at a community led public event held at the Durant Mini Park. Our goal was to engage individuals, and in particular children who may use the park, an opportunity to influence the design elements. We prepped painting and chalking stations where people were encouraged to freely paint and draw images they like. We envision to create a visually engaging, beautiful, culturally relevant and family oriented environment and have selected several elements from the community engagement process to include in the Durant Mini-Park Mural.

Several animals, listed mostly by youth, were incorporated into the mural surrounding a silhouette image of a family viewing the sunset in a world only seen in our imaginations. One of the parent's hands rest on several books that will reflect the names and writings of Authors and researchers such as Zora Neal Hurston and other personal heroes mentioned by adults at the community engagement. Quetzacoatl, the Feathered Serpent is depicted and enters the composition from the background haze wrapping under the land and re-emerging in the foreground on the southern side of the wall. Quetzacoatl is a symbolic representation of wisdom, knowledge, transformation and the wind in several indigenous cultures of the Americas. Other animals included from community engagement are the Jaguar, the lion, turtles and dolphins. We selected a brightly colored species of turtle to further enhance the color palette and match other brightly colored elements of the mural in the serpents body and flowers including symbols for peace, life, love, heritage, the infinite and others with brightly colored petals. We've layered imagery that is reflective of our community, culturally, symbolically, philosophically by creating an image that is beautiful for children to look at and holds elements with their own myths and stories to be told.

Meaning of the elements are as follows:


Celestial Lion: Love, Courage, Consistency, Leadership, Astrological Leo, reminder of the need for humility


Jaguar: Spirituallity, awareness, keen senses, magical power, focused mentality Quetzacoatl, The Feathered Serpent: transformation, wisdom, knowledge, the wind Painted Turtle: Resilience, survival beauty in an unlikely form

Family: Unity, togetherness, love, generational connectivity, education, transfer of knowledge and admiration of nature's beauty

LONGRIDGE ROAD, OAKLAND, CALIFORNIA

SUMMARY

On May 5, 2016, the Tree Services Division denied tree removal permit application ND16-035 for 654 Longridge Road to remove two trees. The Applicant (Igal Sarfaty) requested to remove two Deodar cedar trees on his property. Providing the following reasons (a) causing property damage to the foundation of the pool wall and (b) posed an immediate hazard to the home owner's property. A City arborist evaluated the trees and determined the Applicant's assessment was not valid.

The Appellant (Igal Sarfaty) appealed the tree permit decision on May 12, 2016. The Appellant has not provided additional written reasons for the appeal prior to the preparation of this report. The PRAC is the hearing body for tree removal permit appeals, per Chapter 12.36.110 of the Oakland Municipal Code (OMC).

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no fiscal impact.

BACKGROUND

The two Deodar cedar trees proposed for removal are growing at the rear of the property at 654 Longridge Road. The trees are easily visible from Mandana Blvd., and from this perspective, are in front of the Appellant's fence (Attachment A). The trees are located down slope from the home and pool area. Portions of the trees overhang the patio area surrounding the pool. (Attachment B)

On April 6, 2016 Tree Services received a non-development tree removal application ND16-035 for 654 Longridge Road (*Attachment C*). The request to remove two Deodar cedars was denied (*Attachment D*). The trees are protected by the Protected Trees Ordinance (PTO), Chapter 12.36 of the OMC.

A non-development tree removal application for the same two trees was applied for by the Appellant in November 2012 (*Attachment E*) under ND12-164. The reason for removal given under application ND12-164 was excessive leaf litter over the yard and pool, which must be cleaned daily. Tree Services denied the tree removal application ND12-164 (*Attachment F*).

DISCUSSION

Tree Services denied tree removal permit application ND16-035 on May 5, 2016. City staff determined:

- The roots of the Deodar cedar trees are not damaging the foundation of the pool. Examination of the concrete retaining wall up slope from the trees did not reveal any cracks or uplifting often associated with root damage (Attachment G). In selected areas, soil was removed from the base of the wall and no roots were present and/or in contact with the retaining wall. The soil was already disturbed in this area for an unknown reason.
- There were no signs or symptoms of internal decay, or tree instability. While past pruning
 of the trees has not been ideal, the trees do not pose an immediate hazard as claimed.
 Tree Services believes that proper monitoring of the trees and sensible pruning when
 necessary will mitigate the tree structural concerns of the Applicant.

On May 12, 2016 the tree permit decision was appealed by Igal Sarfaty (Attachment H). Chapter 12.36.110(C) of the OMC requires the Appellant to "state specifically wherein it is claimed there was an error or abuse of discretion" by City staff, "or wherein such decision is not supported by the evidence in the record". The Appellant did not address this requirement prior to the preparation of this report. The Appellant may present additional information at the PRAC hearing.

Tree Services processed tree removal application ND16-035 based on a claim that the trees were causing property damage and were an immediate hazard. A City arborist, Tree Risk Assessment Qualified[®] by the International Society of Arboriculture, assessed the Deodar cedars and found the Applicant's claims to be invalid.

Chapter 12.36.110(C) of the OMC states, "In considering the appeal, the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission shall determine whether the proposed tree removal conforms to the applicable criteria. It may sustain the decision of Oakland Public Works or require such changes or impose such reasonable conditions of approval as are, in its judgment, necessary to ensure conformity to said criteria."

RECOMMENDATION

The Oakland Public Works Department recommends that the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission:

Deny the appeal by Mr. Igal Sarfaty of 654 Longridge Road.







Dear Mr. Sarsaty,

As requested on March 30th 2016, I visited the above site to inspect and comment on 2 Deodar Cedar Trees (Cedrus deodara) at rear side of the house and your concern for the future health and safety of this tree has prompted this visit.

Overview: The 2 Deodar Cedar Trees are mature trees approximate 85' feet tall; the 1st tree measured for diameter 32" at DBH (diameter breast height) and the 2nd tree measured for diameter 35" at DBH. Both trees are in poor condition growing very close to the pool where the root systems are damaging the foundation walls of the pool.





Site Observations: The 2 Deodar Cedar Trees are growing in clay soil conditions. Irrigation system is not present around these trees. These trees had been over growing due of the improper pruning in the past. One of them it has been over raise up the canopy by leaving only 30% of foliage and the 2nd one it has been topped off in the past. These 2 trees due of their condition and location are recommended to be removed because they are an **immediate hazard** to home owner property.

These 2 trees needs to be removed before causes more huge damages to the pool and we cannot do any root pruning due of their age and size; that only will make more hazardous these trees because roots support the trees and absorb water. Introduction

The trees in question are two Deodar cedar trees (*Cedrus deodara*) growing at the rear of the property. The trunks of the trees are easily accessed from Mandana Blvd. An arborist report claims the trees are an immediate hazard to the homeowner's property and that the roots of the trees are damaging the foundation walls of the pool.

Investigation Methods

The trees were examined for outward signs of defects that may compromise the health and safety of the tree, such as open cavities, presence of decay or signs of internal decay (fungal fruiting bodies such as mushrooms or conks), excessive dead wood, or evidence of recent change in lean (soil mounding behind the lean and/or soil cracking, root plate lifting or movement). The lower trunk and root crown of the trees were probed to check for decay. A mallet was used to sound the trunks to determine the possibility of unseen internal cavities along the trunk. The health of the trees was also evaluated by visually inspecting foliage color and density, branch health, branch structure and overall vigor. The area surrounding the tree was also examined for evidence of the tree impacting the foundation of the concrete retaining wall and nearby structures.

Limits of Assessment

All observations were made from the ground. The evaluation of the trees does not include belowground assessment of the roots, advanced assessment for internal decay, or detailed inspection of the upper crown by climbing or using an aerial lift.

Observations

Overall, the trees appeared in good health. The following was noted:

- 1. No wood decay was apparent
- 2. Fungal fruiting bodies were absent
- 3. No loose bark or missing bark plates
- 4. No open cavities in the trunk or root flare

- 5. When sounded with a mallet, the trunks of the trees did not have any hollow tones often associated with internal cavities.
- 6. No soil mounding or soil cracking that would be associated with a change in lean.
- 7. Both trees have straight vertical trunks
- 8. Normal needle size and density
- 9. Minimal dieback of twigs and branches
- 10. Tree #1 starting at approximately 70 feet, the central leader is missing and lateral limbs are forming a new top. Lower branches were excessively removed in the past leaving the canopy relatively small in comparison to the height of the tree.
- 11. Tree #2 a codominant leader originates from the main trunk at approximately 15 feet. The angle of attached of this stem is not excessively narrow, which would indicate a greater possibility of failure. The wide angle of attachment indicates included bark will be less likely.
- 12. Tree #1 is 7 feet 3 inches downslope from the concrete retaining wall. Tree #2 is 11 feet downslope from the concrete retaining wall.
- 13. Examination of the concrete retaining wall upslope from the trees did not reveal any cracks or uplifting often associated with root damage. In selected areas, soil was removed from the base of the wall and no roots were present and/or in contact with the retaining wall. The soil was already disturbed in this area for an unknown reason. A few pencil sized roots were visible away from the retaining wall, but not large enough to cause structural damage.

Discussion

No missing bark plates were visible at the base of either tree. This condition can indicate an area of dead tissue caused by decay fungi. If extensive decay is present in a tree there is often some indication of the problem. It can be seen in obvious ways such as large open trunk cavities. Symptoms of wood decay can be more subtle, such as the presence of a dried up conk, the fruiting body of a wood destroying fungus. It is possible for wood decay to be hidden inside a tree with no outward symptoms. I observed nothing that would indicate there are wood decay problems with these trees.

Tree #1 has been topped in the past and two new vertical branches have grown to create a new top. They are replacing a single central leader. Using binoculars, no decay or cavity was observed where the leader was removed. If decay is present a limb could be weakly attached and could fall from that location at some point in the future. The property owner should have the tree inspected where the leader was removed. This tree was heavily pruned in the past. The lower branches were excessively removed leaving the canopy relatively small in comparison to the height of the tree. While this practice of pruning is undesirable, it does not present an imminent hazard to life or property.

Tree #2 has a much fuller canopy, but has been extensively pruned on the pool side of the tree. The codominant leader originating from the main trunk at 15 feet is attached at a sufficiently wide angle to reduce the likelihood of failure. As with tree #1, the canopy of the tree should be inspected and individual branches decreased in length or removed to ensure future safety as part of the routine maintenance of the tree. Areas of previous large cuts should be inspected for decay.

The concrete retaining wall for the pool was also inspected for signs of root related damage. There were no roots visibly in contact with the wall. Small pencil sized roots were visible, but roots of this size would not result in damage. Small excavations carried out near the base of the wall revealed no roots in contact with the wall. The trees are 7 feet 3 inches and 11 feet from the wall. The distance of the wall from the trees and the location of the wall upslope from the trees make significant impacts on the wall by the tree roots unlikely.

The Tree Division does consider public opinion when making the tree removal decision. Two neighbors at 622 and 626 Mandana Blvd. want the trees to remain.

Conclusion

The Protected Tree Ordinance (PTO) allows the removal of a tree if it is unhealthy or a potential hazard to life or property. The two Deodar cedar trees are healthy and there is insufficient evidence to suggest that the roots from the trees are causing damage to the concrete retaining wall. The Tree Division believes that proper monitoring of the trees and sensible pruning when necessary will mitigate the structural concerns of the trees. Therefore, at this time based on the observations noted, tree removal is not justified based on the current health of the trees and stated claims of property damage caused by the trees.

The trees are to be preserved.

DECISION

The applicant requested the removal of one cedar tree growing over the backyard, because leaves (conifer needles) fall over the yard and pool, and he has to clean them up daily.



Two deodar cedar trees are growing at the rear of the property, just beyond the pool deck and fence, with part of the crowns overhanging the yard. Many limbs are gone from the pool side of the trunks, removed in prior years to reduce the overhangs. The site was inspected by city staff on 12-20-12. There was no red tag on the tree proposed for removal, nor a red summary notice on either street frontage of the property. It is unknown which cedar tree is proposed for removal.

In order to approve a tree removal, one of the removal objectives listed above has to be accomplished, from Chapter 12.36.050(A) of the Oakland Municipal Code, the Protected Trees Ordinance (PTO). All trees drop leaves. For evergreen trees like deodar cedar, some needles drop all year-round, whereas deciduous trees will shed all of their leaves during a shorter time period in the fall and winter. If a tree is removed, it is a permanent and guaranteed way to stop leaves from falling. However, Oakland's tree ordinance does not have a "eliminate leaves from falling" objective that would allow Tree Services to approve the tree removal in question. Therefore, the request to remove one of the cedar trees does not meet any of the approval criteria and Tree Services has to deny the application.

The PTO requires Tree Services to consider public opinion when making the decision to approve or deny tree removal permits. Two neighbors on the Mandana Boulevard side of the property objected to the applicant's request to remove a tree. Both neighbors want the screening and privacy provided by the tree to remain. In 2009, the property owner of 654 Longridge applied to remove both cedar trees. Property owners at the following Mandana addresses objected to the proposal: 610, 622, 626, 630, 638, 646, 654 and 664. The Lakeshore Homeowners Association also objected to the tree removals. If the red tags had been posted for this year's permit, perhaps the amount of opposition would have been similar to that received in 2009. In denying the current request to remove a cedar tree, Tree Services also considered the public opposition noted above.

OAKLAND MUNICIPAL CODE SECTION 12.36.060 CONDITIONS OF DECISION

The following conditions are imposed:

- 1. Defense, Indemnification and Hold Harmless. To the maximum extent permitted by law, the applicant shall defend (with counsel acceptable to the City), indemnify, and hold harmless the City of Oakland, the Oakland City Council, the Oakland Public Works Agency and its respective agents, officers, employees and volunteers (hereafter collectively called City) from any liability, damages, claim, judgment, loss (direct or indirect), action, causes of action or proceeding (including legal costs, attorneys' fees, expert witness or consultant fees, City Attorney or staff time, expenses or costs) (collectively called "Action") against the City to attack, set aside, void or annul, (a) a decision by the City relating to this tree permit matter, City's CEQA approvals and determination, and/or notices in the tree permit matter; or (b) implementation of such. The City may elect, in its sole discretion, to participate in the defense of said Action and the applicant shall reimburse the City for its reasonable legal costs and attorneys' fees.
- 2. Letter of Agreement. Within ten (10) calendar days of the filing of any Action as specified in condition 1 above, the applicant and/or its contractor shall execute a Letter of Agreement with the City, acceptable to the Office of the City Attorney, which memorializes the above obligations. These obligations and the Letter of Agreement shall

survive termination, extinguishment or invalidation of the approval. Failure to timely execute the Letter of Agreement does not relieve the applicant of any of the obligations contained in this Section or any other requirements or conditions of approval that may be imposed by the City.

*This decision of the Public Works Agency, Tree Services Section, may be appealed by the applicant, or the owner of any "adjoining" or "confronting" property, to the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission within five (5) working days after the date of this decision and by 3:30 p.m., otherwise the permit is effective. The term "adjoining" means immediately next to, and the term "confronting" means in front of or in back of. An appeal shall be on a form prescribed by and filed with Tree Services, at 7101 Edgewater Drive, Building #4. The appeal shall state specifically wherein it is claimed there was error or abuse of discretion by the City or wherein such decision is not supported by the evidence in the record. There is a \$50.00 fee to file an appeal. Failure to timely appeal this decision and raise any and all issues in your appeal may preclude you from challenging this determination in court. If the appeal is not finally disposed of by the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission within thirty (30) working days of the date of the decision by the Tree Services Section, the decision shall be deemed affirmed, and the permit appeal dented.

SUMMARY

Staff from the Public Works Department (OPW) and the Office of Parks and Recreation request approval of the design and implementation of the Lincoln Square Park Plaza Project and the associated Design Review, Conditional Use, and Tree Removal and Protection permits. The project includes improvements to the corner of the park at 10th and Harrison Streets that will provide paving, seating, site furniture and landscaping.

FISCAL IMPACT

There will be no fiscal impact on the Office of Parks and Recreation. The estimated construction cost is \$200,000. The improvements are funded by Measure WW- Regional Open Space, Wildlife, Shoreline and Parks Bond Extension funds.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The project includes site improvements to Lincoln Square Park at the corner of 10th and Harrison Streets, including paving, seating, site furniture and landscaping at an underutilized corner behind the existing gym building. The project Includes Tree Protection Permit (T1600019) to remove four (4) trees and to protect five (5) trees. No alterations to building or existing mural are proposed.

BACKGROUND

The Lincoln Square Park Plaza project was envisioned during the 2009/2010 master plan process for the entire park. The community requested more useable open space area particularly for senior exercise and social events, as most of the outdoor park space is programmed for children and outdoor active sports. The first community design meeting was held in January of 2016 with successive meetings following to complete in July of 2016. The concept plan will be refined with community in June 2016. Community members continually expressed their sustained support for the project and desire to activate the space with a new design and passive recreation/leisure elements.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission endorse the Lincoln Square Park Plaza Project and recommend approval to the Bureau of Planning, Zoning Manager for the Design Review, Conditional Use and Tree Permit applications.
