B. REQUEST APPROVAL OF DESIGN AND LOCATION OF A SKATE STRUCTURE IN MONTCLAIR PARK

Oakland Parks and Recreation Foundation Director, Ken Lupoff presented the staff report for Item 7B on behalf of Vice Mayor Campbell Washington. Young Oakland residents in search of recreational skateboarding activity space asked the Office of Vice Mayor and District 4 Councilmember Annie Campbell Washington, For The Town, and the Oakland Parks and Recreation Foundation (OPRF) to assist them in replacing and upgrading the skate structure previously located in Montclair Park. It is requested that the PRAC provide input and approval of the design and location of the skate structure.

The newly designed skate structure would be located in the underutilized lower basketball court adjacent to the restroom. Programs, community groups or events will be displaced as a result of erecting the structure in this location. Nor will Parks & Recreation staff provide programing or supervision over its use.

C. INFORMATIONAL REPORT TO RECEIVE PUBLIC INPUT ON PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO CITYWIDE PARK RULES

SPECIFICALLY CHAPTER 12.64 OF THE OAKLAND MUNICPAL CODE, PARK AND RECREATION AREA USE REGULATIONS AND SECTION 12.60.070 OF THE OAKLAND MUNICIPAL CODE, BICYCLE OPERATION RULES-VIOLATIONS-PENALTY AS RELATED TO USE IN PARKS

The Oakland Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission heard the Informational Staff Report presented by Gail McMillon, Parks & Recreation Assistant. Staff requested the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission accept the informational report and receive public input on the proposed citywide park rule amendments to

Chapter 12.64 of the Oakland Municipal Code (OMC), Park and Recreation Area Use Regulations and Section 12.60.070 of the OMC, Bicycle Operation Rules-Violations-Penalty. The recommended amendments were the result of a Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission task force effort to review potential ordinance changes for park rules and signage as it relates to children play areas, bikes in parks and other park rule usage.

Public Comments Summary:

The Commission heard comments from approximately 37 speakers. The community was divided over the duration and volume of sound generated by individual musicians, permitted and non-permitted (pop-up) event organizers and participants around all parts of Lakeside Park. Many speakers expressed continued distress and duress over what was commonly described as non-stop amplified noise or sound late into the evenings during the week and throughout the weekend. Some described frustrations with delayed responses to complaints from Oakland Police. While still there were some who supported music and activities at the park, but wanted to see efforts to curtail some of the disruptions. Various speakers viewed the issue of playing music in the park as their right to do so in a publicly own space and that culturally, for some, playing music is a religious and spiritual expression.

Concerns were expressed about the effects of amplified sound on the bird sanctuary.

Because of the growing public interest and concern regarding sustainable adoption of changes to the OMC, the Commissioner requested staff convene another public meeting in order to continue community dialogue and capture additional suggestions to possibly augment changes to the OMC particularly as is related to noise.

Motion: Commissioner Miller entertained a motion to approve the staff recommendation to receive informational report and further recommend Oakland Parks & Recreation convene a public meeting gather additional feedback regarding changes to the OMC as written. Moved by: Commissioner Kadera-Redmond. Second by: Commissioner Howze. Vote: Yes - Corbin, Howze, Kadera-Redmond, Miller, Reilly, Rosenbloom and Wu. Motion: Passed.

SUMMARY

Oakland Parks & Recreation received a request from Mrs. Regina Wilson-Henry and her teen son Isaiah Henry to place a commemorative plaque on one of the park benches near the children's play area in William 'Bill' Patterson Park in memory of sixteen year-old Reggina Jeffries-Wilson, niece of Regina Wilson-Henry. Family and friends still mourn the loss of young Reggina who was killed in a senseless random act of violence in downtown Oakland earlier this year. William "Bill" Patterson Park was chosen because of the family's fond memories of Reggina at the frequent family gatherings there and their deep historical connection to the park and community spanning more than forty years. The plaque will read as follows:

Dedicated to the loving memory of Reggina Jefferies-Wilson Our Dancing Angel Will Forever Be In Our Hearts

FISCAL IMPACT

A donation of \$600 will be made to the Oakland Parks and Recreation Foundation to have a plaque purchased and installed. The plaque installation process is in accordance with Oakland Public Works construction requirements. The donor will assist with maintaining the plaque by washing the plaque periodically.

BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

Mrs. Regina Wilson-Henry and her son Isaiah Henry contacted OPR staff regarding Isaiah completing his Eagle Scout project in William 'Bill' Patterson Park. Mrs. Wilson-Henry explained that Isaiah wanted to perform the project in this community in recognition of his family's 40 plus year connection to 'Patterson' (Brookfield) Park and the greater Brookfield community. As part of the project, Mrs. Wilson-Henry requested that Isaiah be able to perform various repairs and paint certain areas of the park (i.e. park benches, tables etc.).

Subsequent to this initial request, the Wilson-Henry family suffered the loss of young Reggina Jeffries-Wilson who also grew up in the local community and frequented the park. The Wilson-

Henry family contacted OPR staff regarding the placement of a commemorative plaque on one of the park benches near the children's play area following the completion of the work to be performed as part of her son's scout project.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission grant the Henry-Wilson Family permission to place a commemorative plaque on a bench near the children's play area in William "Bill" Paterson Park in memory of Reggina Jeffries-Wilson.

SUMMARY

Oakland Parks & Recreation received a request from Bay Area Black Market (BAMA) an organization created to serve the community by promoting black businesses through internet advertising and marketplace events such as Bay Area Black Marketplace. BAMA is requesting to collect funds onsite through vendor sales of food, beverages, merchandise, and raffle tickets and collection of donations at the Community Marketplace on November 25, 2016 from 8:00AM to 8:00PM at the Lakeside Park Garden Center. Five percent of the funds collected from the Bay Area Black Market will go to Ador of Hope, an IRC 501(c)(3) non-profit organization that provides Transitional Housing for Homeless and re-entry support into the Community. Approval from the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission is required per O.M.C. section 12.64.080.

FISCAL IMPACT

Bay Area Black Market is paying all rental fees associated with the event estimated at \$1450.

PROJECT / PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The Bay Area Black Marketplace is a FREE quarterly event that showcases and celebrates Bay Area Black businesses from all business sectors. Their mission is to encourage the Black consumer to spend larger portions of their income with Black owned businesses. The event showcases 40 vendors and has over 200 shoppers throughout the course of the day.

RECREATION CENTER PUBLIC ART PROJECT IN NORTH OAKLAND

SUMMARY

Public Art Program Staff recommends that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission approve the artwork conceptual design by Oakland-based artist team Joaquin Newman and Eduardo Pineda for the Golden Gate Recreation Center Public Art Project in North Oakland. The project, commissioned by the Public Art Program in compliance with the associated grant funds for general park improvements, will beautify the facility with artwork composed of three design elements located at the front entry, interior lobby and teen lounge.

The project is being administered through the Public Art Program, Cultural Affairs Unit, Economic and Workforce Development Department, in conjunction with the recently completed new recreation center construction. The Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission must review and approve all public art project designs proposed for Oakland Parks and Recreation facilities, either as part of a larger capital improvement design review, or through an independent review when the artwork is designed independently.

FISCAL IMPACT

The Golden Gate Recreation Center Public Art Project is funded through City of Oakland percent for art funds associated with the California State Proposition 84 project grant secured to make the general facility improvements (per Ordinance Number 11066 C.M.S). The grant specifically committed to funding three artworks as a component of the capital improvement project. The artist team will be contracted directly for design development and off-site fabrication of the artwork. The total budget for the project is up to seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000). A portion of the fabrication and installation scope will be administered through a licensed general contractor in coordination with Public Works Project Delivery Division. There is no direct fiscal impact to Oakland Parks and Recreation for creation of the artworks.

PROJECT / PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The Charles Porter Golden Gate Recreation Center is located at 1075 62nd St, Oakland, CA 94608 (District 1).

The Recreation Center is used by local families and children, and offers a range of programming,

classes, and camps. It includes a gym with an indoor basketball/volleyball court, a dance studio that opens to the outside, ceramics kiln, teen lounge, commercial kitchen, baseball field, picnic sites, a new play area, walking track and patio area. The new Center has been open to the public since April 2016.

For this Public Art commission, the artist team of Joaquin Alejandro Newman and Eduardo Pineda will create permanent work for the exterior and interior spaces of the recreation center. In the artists' words, "Our themes are: Building things together through generations; recognizing our past, equity for all, community enriched by connection to international cultures, neighborhood evolution, and embracing new locals that support and sustain community." They will create three distinct but related art installations including: a hand-painted mural reflecting community and recreation center history for the exterior entryway; an interior lobby suspended sculpture composed of community images reflecting moments in time and the present uses of the recreation center; and an interactive mural design created with recreation program youth for the teen lounge (a requirement of the grant). The artists propose to engage the local community in their final design development through workshops to be held at the GGRC, and are already coordinating with staff and community representatives to collaborate on workshops.

All proposed materials are intended to require minimal maintenance. The exterior mural will be painted in NovaColors with a protective system created by SPARC in Los Angeles. This includes B17, a hard consolidation coat to protect against vandalism, weather, and UV light. An additional wax coating makes graffiti clean-up easy and nontoxic and is recommended for potentially active sites. The Lobby panels will be printed with artist's acrylics and coated with Golden UVLS, artistic varnish that protects against UV light. The Teen Lounge panels will be printed with artist's acrylics and coated with a hard automotive varnish to protect against scratching. The wood panels are rugged. NovaColors are the standard for professional outdoor murals. The artist's acrylics on panels are used for museum artworks.

The design proposal and artists' resumes are attached.

BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

For the Golden Gate Recreation Center Public Art Project Phase One artist selection, a community-based selection panel met on June 28, 2016 in the Multi-Purpose Room of the Golden Gate Recreation Center to review artists' credentials from the eligible pool of seventeen candidates, and recommended six finalists for interviews. The recommended finalists include Lynne-Rachel Altman, Alan Leon, Joaquin Newman and Eduardo Pineda, Johanna Poethig, Trust Your Struggle Collective and Fan Lee Warren. Public Art Program staff conducted a project / site orientation meeting on July 18, 2016, to provide the finalists with the project parameters and proposal requirements. Community selection panel representatives additionally gave finalists background information about the center and neighborhood. The selection panel met again on September 7, 2016 to interview the six finalists and to review their preliminary concept proposals. They reached a recommendation after careful consideration and discussion of the merits of each presentation.

Voting members of the Golden Gate Recreation Center Public Art Project selection panel were community representatives Josephine Lee, Carl Metzger, Octavia Conley and Francisco Mariscal,

and project architect Brian Leonard. Advisory (non-voting) panel members included City of Oakland CIP Coordinator Denise Louie, and Recreation Center Directors Elena Bermeo and Alaina Fuglestad. The panel was facilitated by then Acting Cultural Arts Manager Kristen Zaremba and Public Art Project Manager Joe Saxe.

The Public Art Advisory Committee (PAAC) approved the panel's recommendation of artists Joaquin Newman and Eduardo Pineda for the Golden Gate Recreation Center Public Art Project at the monthly PAAC meeting held on September 12, 2016. Pending recommended conceptual design approval by the PRAC and final design approval by the PAAC, the artwork is scheduled to be created in the artists' studios and on site November – December, 2016.

The artists propose to engage the local community in their final design development through workshops to be held at the GGRC.

The project must be completed by December 31, 2016 to meet grant requirements.

RECOMMENDATION

Public Art Program Staff recommends that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission approve the artwork conceptual design by artists Joaquin Newman and Eduardo Pineda for the Golden Gate Recreation Center Public Art Project in North Oakland. The proposed project, commissioned by the Public Art Program in compliance with the associated grant funds, will beautify the community center with artwork created with community engagement, serving the needs of the Golden Gate neighborhood.

SUMMARY

Staff from the Oakland Public Works Department (OPW) and the Oakland Parks & Recreation (OPR) request endorsement for the Conditional Use Permit in the design and implementation of Rainbow Recreation Center Expansion and Improvement project funded in part by Proposition 84 Statewide Parks Program Grant (Prop 84). The project includes improvement to the approximately 1.85 acre park located at 5800 International Boulevard in East Oakland. The project will demolish 4,100 square feet of the existing recreation center and builds a new 8,200 square foot recreation center with multiple use rooms, computer room, commercial kitchen, pantry, daycare, lobby, office, restrooms, storage and other support spaces. On site, the project will renovate the unused tennis court into a soccer and flag football practice field as well as add picnic areas, exercise equipment, butterfly and demonstration gardens, riparian habitat near the creek, swings to the existing play area, parking upgrade, trash enclosure, landscaping, irrigation, pathway and lighting improvements. The existing gymnasium structure will remain and only exterior cosmetic improvements are proposed.

FISCAL IMPACT

The project will require long term maintenance based on the above listed elements. Litter removal and graffiti abatement are routine maintenance tasks. The new landscaping and trees will require irrigation, weeding and pruning, but will be selected to minimize the amount as well as water-conservation measures. Typically, the contractor shall be responsible for a 2 year plant establishment as part of the project.

The new building will also require maintenance, annual inspections and repairs as necessary, fire assembly permits. However, it is replaced with efficient energy saving light fixtures, motion sensors, new roofing consisting of modern, durable materials, new HVAC system, new plumbing fixtures and other features that provide years of longevity. OPR will need to budget for new furniture and equipment to replace existing dilapidated items as well as computers for the computer room and staff. Capital improvement project funding cannot pay for furniture, furnishings and equipment.

Landscape maintenance is funded by the Landscape and Lighting Assessment District (Fund 2310) and Comprehensive Cleanup (Fund 1720). Building maintenance, park lighting, graffiti abatement and playground repairs are funded by the internal Facilities Fund (Fund 4400). The estimated construction cost is \$6,800,000 with a total project cost estimated at \$9,300,000. The project receives \$5,000,000 from Prop 84, the 2006 Safe Drinking Water Bond Act and \$928,000 from Housing Related Parks Program Grant. Additional funding sources are to be identified.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Rainbow Recreation Center is located at 5800 International Boulevard, Oakland, CA 94621, in the East Oakland/Seminary district of the City of Oakland. The project scope consists of:

- Welcoming and open lobby which can be used for activity
- 2 multi-purpose rooms that can be opened up into 1 large room and access to the outdoor for indoor/outdoor flexibility
- Kitchen that accommodates cooking classes and community events
- Pantry and storage to accommodate food distribution
- Computer Room
- Daycare with separate tot restroom
- Offices, restrooms with showers, storage and other required support spaces
- Renovate existing unused tennis court into new practice field for popular soccer and flag football sports with new remote-controlled sports lighting
- Picnic areas to enhance park enjoyment and allow gatherings
- Improving landscaping and irrigation control for sustainability
- Butterfly and demonstration gardens
- Exercise equipment and new swing
- Renovated parking area with bioswales to treat Stormwater on site

Per the City's green building ordinance, the building must achieve Silver Certification under the Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) program and Bay Friendly landscape certification.

BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

Constructed in 1978, the Central East Oakland Recreation Center was renamed Rainbow Recreation Center in 1980. It is an over-crowded, aging facility. The needed programs have outgrown the building and staff currently cannot implement multiple programs at the facility. The Rainbow Recreation Center was identified as a priority project for District 6 and is listed in the Park Prioritization list for Fiscal Year (FY) 2011-13, approved by Council under Resolution No. 83725 C.M.S. in February 2012.

In May 17, 2011, Council approved Rainbow Recreation Center as one of six projects to apply for Round 2 of the competitive Prop 84 grant in Resolution No. 83367 C.M.S. As part of the Prop 84 competitive grant application process in 2011, outreach and 6 public meetings with the community, ranging from youths to seniors were held at various locations within District 6 to ensure access and gain input for the grant project scope. Residents and park users developed a plan that would bring needed activity space into their neighborhood as well as accommodate ongoing and new community events. Although the project initially was not awarded a grant, the State later notified the City of available funding. Upon completing the consultant award process approved by Council in Resolution no. 85723 on June 10, 2015, four additional community focus group meetings were conducted between September 2015 and June 2016 to refine the project scope.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission endorse the Conditional Use Permit for the Rainbow Recreation Center Expansion and Improvement project and recommend approval to the Planning Commission for the Design Review application. The proposed project will result in improved and sustainable facilities, flexible use and promote community through added opportunities.






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


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EXHIBIT C - BUILDING ELEVATION




EAST ELEVATION
