A. Overview of the Open Space, Conservation and Recreation (OSCAR) - Barry Miller

• Former Chair Barry Miller provided the Commission with a Power Point overview of the Open Space, Conservation and Recreation. The General Plan is required of every city and county in California, however, Oakland has not conducted a comprehensive update in 20 years. The General Plan consists of various independent documents including; Historic Preservation (1994); OSCAR – Open Space, Conservation, Recreation (1996); LUTE – Land Use, Transportation (1998); Safety (2004 and Housing (2015). While some plans have been updated since 1998, OSCAR is referenced for policies on parks issues. The Commission discussed how the PRAC can help get funding to update the OSCAR and create a Parks Master Plan. It was determined that support of the City Council would be needed to accomplish both goals.

The Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission reviewed the staff report for item 7A, prepared and presented by Zermaine Thomas.

Parks and Recreation staff received a request from the Iron Souls Motorcycle Club (ISMC) to host their 23rd Annual Holiday Party at the Lakeside Park Garden Center on Saturday, December 16, 2017 from 8:00pm to 12:00am. Organizers also requested permission to sell entry tickets, raffle tickets, beer, wine and collect proceeds from their live auction.

The ISMC is a non-profit organization of men passionate about motorcycle riding and giving back to the Oakland community. C. REQUEST FOR THE PARKS AND RECREATION ADVISORY COMMISSION TO APPROVE NAMES FOR FOUR UNNAMED TRAILS IN DIMOND CANYON AND JOAQUIN MILLER PARK

The Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission reviewed the staff report for item 7C, prepared by Dana Riley and presented by Zermaine Thomas and Stan Dodson, representative of Oakland Trails and Oakland Volunteer Park Patrol.

There are currently four well used yet unnamed trails in Joaquin Miller Park (JMP) and Dimond Canyon (DC). This scenario poses a safety risk that needs to be resolved. Stan

Dodson, as a representative of Oakland Trails and Oakland Volunteer Park Patrol, asked the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission (PRAC) to authorize Juanita's, Camp, Scout's and Towhee as names for these trails. The proposed names were discussed and considered at three public meetings. The Friends of Joaquin Miller Park convened two public meetings once in July and again in September 2017. Friends of Sausal Creek convened one meeting in August 2017. The Towhee trail was not considered at the Joaquin Miller meeting as the trial is located outside of their jurisdiction.

Mr. Dodson further explained that naming the trails was a public safety necessity and that it was imperative to have maps printed for trails users. He added that the maps would be a tool for first responders in their attempt to locate the lost or injured.

In further discussion, the public process for naming the trails was questioned as well as the meaning of the proposed names. Some members also thought that the process for selecting the names was insufficiently inclusive. Also, naming rights of public spaces was a topic of concern.

The Vice Chair, supported by the Chair, made an initial call to table the item until the Naming Rights Sub Committee could think through the naming process, selection of names and development of proposed policies. Mr. Dodson and Director Williams reemphasized the risk to public safety by leaving the trails unnamed. Mr. Dodson reiterated the broader stakeholder participation in selecting the names including local business and neighborhood associations, the Alameda County Historical Society, hikers and bikers, dog walkers, Woodminster and others. He informed the Commission that the current supply of maps was running out and that Oakland Trails anticipated going to print and distribution as soon as possible with the updated version.

Director Williams added that naming trails was not related to sponsorships or naming rights and that no one financially benefits from the process.

Mr. Dodson responded to the Commissions inquiry regarding the possibility of installing temporary names or markers would not be cost effective.

Director Williams expressed appreciation for the Commission's desire to have a broader community engagement and further consideration of other names for the four trails, but stated that Mr. Dodson's work with Oakland Trails was solving an outstanding public safety concern. He assured the Commission that a conversation regarding naming rights and sponsorships would immediately follow in Director's report and that he would not advise prolonging the process.

Commissioner Wu offered a brief historical summary on the Naming Rights Committee. She stated that the Committee's scope of authority has shifted and morphed from its initial charge of addressing bench dedication and that it has moved to park sponsorships and corporate funding. She added that until the Committee's focus is determined, items should not be held up. Commissioner Wu also expressed uncertainty of PRAC's jurisdiction on naming trails.

Commissioner Rosenbloom supports Mr. Dobson's commitment to the community and his work with groups representing broader stakeholder communities. While understanding that naming and mapping have significant power, he expressed concern about integrating the issues of naming the short trails in question. He suggested specific timelines be put in place if another process and names are to be considered. Commissioner Rosenbloom reminded the Commission that the community groups behind supporting the trail names worked diligently to bring the item for its consideration. And cautioned against cynicism regarding PRAC's role.

Commissioner Wu shared Commissioner Rosenbloom's concern signaling PRAC's role. The Commissioner stated that during her service of seven years, she has observed that the Commission has strayed more toward micro managing than not and has possibly undermined the body's value and participation in city government. She expressed concerned about moving in that direction again and shared that diligence was done in choosing the trail names.

Motion: Commissioner Kadera-Redmond entertained a motion to approve the names (Juanita's, Camp, Scout's and Towhee) for four unnamed trails in Dimond Canyon and Joaquin Miller Park. Moved by: Commissioner Howze: Second by: Commissioner Wu: Vote: Yes – Cole, Corbin, Du Bois, Howze, Kadera-Redmond, Reilly, Rosenbloom, Torres and Wu Motion: Passed.

Commissioner Corbin also reported on a shooting on the street near the park and community's concerns regarding the growing homeless encampment due to the lack of a recreation facility.

Commissioner Howze: Attended the National Recreation and Parks Association Conference hosted in New Orleans in September. She a Power Point handout referencing community collaboration and parks enhancement.

Director Williams informed the Commission that every recreation center should have a RAC some form of organized community participation and requested that the Commission consider creating a template of what a RAC should like.

The Naming Rights Committee was reaffirmed and includes, Commissioners Corbin, Marshal and Reilly. Commission Cole will consider taking a seat. Commissioner Corbin will consider stepping if other choose to join.

Oakland Parks staff and Ken Lupoff from the Oakland Parks and Recreation Foundation will provide follow-up on the Commission request.



SUMMARY

The Jack London Aquatic Center (JLAC) contains a public non-motorized boat launching and landing site on the Oakland Estuary. The California State Coastal Conservancy San Francisco Bay Area Water Trail ("Water Trail") program has asked the City to consider designating the JLAC as a Water Trail site in order to provide enhanced public access to the Oakland Estuary and San Francisco Bay waters.

Designation results in the location being added to the Water Trail website, installation of Water Trail signage, and opportunities to apply for funding to improve the site.

Staff recommends that the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission recommend approval to designate the JLAC as a Water Trail site as the designation will provide improved public information and access to the waters of the Oakland Estuary.

FISCAL IMPACT

There are no costs associated with becoming a designated Bay Area Water Trail site. Oakland Parks and Recreation (OPR) staff will need to meet with Coastal Conservancy staff and Oakland Public Works (OPW) staff to designate a location for the sign that does not interfere with boating operations, utilities, or pedestrian access and install the sign. There are existing posts and railings at JLAC that the signs can be installed onto and OPW does not anticipate a problem using them. The water trail program supplies the signs.

BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

The California State Legislature enacted the Water Trail Act (AB 1296) in 2005 establishing the San Francisco Bay Area Water Trail, a growing network of launching and landing sites that allows non-motorized small boat users to better enjoy the historic, scenic, cultural, and environmental richness of San Francisco Bay. The Water Trail is implemented under the leadership of the State Coastal Conservancy, working in close collaboration with the Association of Bay Area Governments / Metropolitan Transportation Commission, the San Francisco Bay Conservation and Development Commission, and the California Division of Boating and Waterways. The Water Trail benefits the region by improving and increasing recreational access for non-motorized small boat use by persons of all abilities and fosters stewardship of the Bay and reduces impacts to sensitive wildlife and habitat

through education of boaters. The Water Trail provides economic benefits to waterfront and water-oriented businesses by promoting opportunities for single and multi-day excursions on the Bay.

The Jack London Aquatic Center Boating Instruction and Safety Center boating docks and launch ramp were built with the intention of providing public access to the Oakland Estuary. It is one of six locations in Oakland where members of the public can launch non-motorized small boats. Water Trail designation would provide the public with increased access to information about the site through the Water Trail website (sfbaywatertrail.org).

Water Trail staff have visited JLAC and met with OPR staff to gather site description information. If Park and Recreation Advisory Commission approval is given, JLAC will be considered for designation at a quarterly Water Trail Implementation Meeting by the Water Trail's Project Management Team and Advisory Committee. Upon approval JLAC will formally join the Water Trail.

All site designations include the condition to install a Water Trail sign (including logo and Water Trail website address), which identifies the site as part of the Water Trail, and an educational sign as shown in Exhibits A, B, and C. The sign locations will be determined in consultation with OPR and OPW staff.

Designated Water Trail sites are also eligible to apply for funding for improved access and usability for persons with disabilities, creation of on-site boat storage (short-term or long-term storage), creation of other boater amenities such as showers, boat wash, drinking fountains, creation of new launch facilities or improvements/repairs to existing launch facilities, creation of new parking and/or restrooms or improvements/repairs to existing parking and restrooms and creation of new camping facilities or improvements to existing camping facilities for boaters. Several of these are needed at JLAC.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Park and Recreation Advisory Commission recommend approval to designate JLAC as a San Francisco Bay Area Water Trail Site.

Proposal Letter

For those who have daughters, there are some universal truths common among parents; you want them to be safe, develop good decision-making skills, and be empowered to live their truth. Living in a society that continues to challenge the ideals of morality, ethics, social justice, and gender equality, the demand to build a strong community of Sistas to secure a legacy in which our young queens are able to thrive, is evident.

Organization History

A Sista's Touch (AST) is a newly incorporated 501c3 nonprofit public benefited organization with a mission is to nurture and acknowledge positive personal and professional influences of African American women of all generations in the community; with a foundational focus on our adolescent girls. Formed in 2017 to serve the Oakland and Greater Bay Area communities, our aim is to address local issues from a three-fold perspective: Edify, Elevate, and Celebrate Excellence. Our model of character cultivation through the experience of Sistas who have achieved success, begets a strengthened community for a profound legacy of Sistas.

Beginning in 2018, program development will focus on our new campaign: For Our Daughters. Curriculum will be designed to mature our young Sistas in the areas of self-efficacy, physical & mental developmental health, social media safety, and legacy formation. One of the spearheading topics we will address in 2018 is the sex exploitation and human trafficking epidemic in our local communities. To put our mission in action, AST will be organizing an event to raise awareness and to mitigate the effects of this epidemic on Our Daughters, our families, and our communities.

> We Run Oakland: For Our Daughters, a charity walk/run event to build community engagement and involvement in Oakland to increase awareness and resources to prevent Our Daughters from the epidemic of human trafficking.

The event is targeted for the end of the school year to ensure our girls have the knowledge and resources to defend their safety leading into the summer break; a heightened season for leisure time and predatory behavior.

Event Overview

This written proposal is to request the use of Oakland Parks and Recreation facility: Lakeside Park Pergola at Lake Merritt, to support the "We Run Oakland: For Our Daughters" charity walk/run event.

The purpose of the event is to afford a holistic: mind, body, spirit approach to civic engagement for a population fundamental to our mission and a common cause central to the legacy of our children, community, and our city. The goal of *We Run Oakland: For Our Daughters* is to realize the vision of garnering community support for our young Sistas and to mobilize against the perils of sex trafficking through awareness and edification.

We Run Oakland: For Our Daughters will solicit registrants to walk/run the 3.1-mile distance around Lake Merritt as well as sponsors to provide education, resources, giveaways, and donations to support Our Daughters, parents, families, and community interests in understanding and mitigating sex trafficking in our community. The event will be a fun time for all community members to cultivate mindfulness, exercise the body, and connect spiritually with those who seek to create a positive society For Our Daughters.

Request to Collect On-Site Funds

This written proposal is also to request the option to collect on-site funds for the purpose of receiving donations to support future programming ideas aimed at the For Our Daughters campaign.

To maximize the opportunity to secure physical and financial support for this and future programming events organized by A Sista's Touch, the ability to receive funds in the form of donations is requested. Monies collected on-site will be in electronic formats only (i.e Apple Pay, Cash, PayPal, and Google Wallet apps), NO cash will be collect. Donation amounts will be at the discretion of the donor, but not to exceed \$100 for a single transaction.

Rationale

The ability of nonprofit organizations to develop and deliver programming events to support their mission, is driven primarily by donations. Large, long-standing, and well established nonprofit organizations have the capacity to receive various size grants for support. Newly established nonprofit organizations, like A Sista's Touch, are limited to community based donations for support until fiscal responsibility is demonstrated. The ability to receive on-site donations from individuals who happenstance on our preplanned event at Lakeside Park and have the desire to donate, will allow AST to capitalize on community contributions in the moment.

Benefits

The benefits of receiving on-site funding increases the opportunity for AST to enlarge financial support from individuals who feel inclined to donate in real time, rather than depending on a deferred method of support by directing potential donors to our website. Additionally, the presentation of readiness through the receipt of on-site donations exhibits the technological advancement and quality customer service AST espouses.



FISCAL IMPACT

The Hemophilia Foundation of Northern California is paying all rental fees associated with the event estimated at \$2651.00.

PROJECT / PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

HFNC is proud to be one of thirty-two chapters participating in the National Hemophilia Foundation (HFNC) Hemophilia Walk program. It is made possible through the generous support of all their sponsors. In 2008, HFNC created a collaborative fundraising program that would help chapters raise the funds needed to support research and provide programs and direct services to people with bleeding disorders. In seven years of the program, HFNC and its chapters have raised more than \$13 million and engaged 60,000 walkers with over 4,600 teams. This fundraiser will be HFNC's largest event dedicated to researching better treatments and cures for bleeding and clotting disorders, and to prevent the complications of these disorders through awareness, education, advocacy and research.

The estimated attendance is 900.



SUMMARY

Staff recommends that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission (PRAC) make a recommendation to the City Council to amend Chapter 12.64 Park and Recreation Area Use Regulations of the Oakland Municipal Code (OMC), Section 12.60.020 of the OMC, Bicycle Operation Rules-Violations-Penalty, and Section 1.28.020 of the OMC, Violations as Infractions to modernize park and recreation rules to better meet the needs of park users.

FISCAL IMPACT

The fiscal impact of the proposed ordinance changes will be the cost to produce and install new signs with the updated O.M.C. regulations. Improved regulations and new signs clarifying responsible park usage may result in reduced maintenance costs. The estimated cost to replace signs citywide is \$25,000 (250 signs at \$100 each). The cost of signs will be funded from the adopted budget within the Oakland Public Works Department (OPW) Fund 4400 – City Facilities Fund.

OPW confirmed funding for 28 new park rule signs and is beginning the installation process. Oakland Parks Recreation & Youth Development (OPRYD) provided OPW with a list of the parks and locations for installation of the first 28 signs.

BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

Since October, 2015, staff has been working to amend the code language of the Oakland Municipal Code related to park use rules and regulation and park signage. OPRYD provided several forums for the community to offer suggestions, recommendations, and feedback on appropriate language and user-friendly rules to create a more positive experience for park users. On November 4, 2015, the PRAC selected three commission members to serve on a task force to review potential ordinance changes and provide suggestions pertaining to park rules and signage, emerging issues and safety concerns within parks, the need to update signage for clarity of park uses, and the ability to enforce the policies by the Oakland Police Department. The task force continued to meet with community members, park users, and city employees to review existing park rules and ordinances for the purposes of gathering information for recommendations to be considered by the City Council.

On April 13, 2016, the PRAC approved staff's recommendation to amend OMC Chapter 12.64 – Parks and Recreation Area Use Regulations, OMC Section 12.60.020 – Bicycle Operation Rules-Violations and Chapter 1.28.020 – Violations as Infractions with an amendment of seven additional minor modifications to the OMC as recommended by PRAC.

At the May 11, 2016 PRAC meeting, OPRYD presented six of the seven modifications and requested direction for the remaining code, OMC Section 12.64.120. The PRAC came to a consensus that OMC Section 12.64.120 be returned to the subcommittee to address the following issues raised by the PRAC:

- Incorporate language relevant to noise regulations that is mindful of cultural practices
- Construct ordinance language in a way that allows the public to self-measure or monitor behavior

Public Hearings and the Task Force meetings were held in 2017 and the task force continued to meet on a regular basis. In 2018 the Task Force reviewed the recommended changes with various City Departments. After thorough review and receipt of community input, the OPRYD is recommending approval of the changes as indicated on Exhibit A.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission make a recommendation to the City Council to amend Chapter 12.64 of the OMC, Park and Recreation Area Use Regulations; Section 12.60.020 of the OMC, Bicycle Operation Rules-Violations-Penalty as related to use in parks; and Section 1.28.020 of the OMC, Violations as Infractions.

No person shall carry firearms or discharge any firearms in any public park in the city or shoot birds or throw stones or other missiles within the boundaries of said parks or disturb the waterfowl on Lake Merritt or on any pond or in any way disturb any bird in any of said parks.

12.64.070 – Weapons and Remote/Transmitter Controlled Aircraft — Disturbing birds and wildlife.

No person shall carry firearms or discharge any firearms in any public park in the city or shoot birds or throw stones or other <u>projectiles</u> within the boundaries of said parks or disturb the waterfowl on Lake Merritt or on any pond or in any way disturb any bird or wildlife in any of said parks. No person shall use remote/transmitter controlled aircraft in any way that disturbs birds or wildlife in parks.

12.64.080 - Selling wares, gaming, obscenity.

It is unlawful for any person to sell or offer for sale any goods, wares, merchandise, foods, confections, refreshments or other article within any public park, public building or public grounds in the city, without the order or permission therefor of the commission, department or board which has jurisdiction therein. The terms "public building" and "public grounds," as used herein, shall include the Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum Complex and public parking lots adjacent thereto when completed.

No gaming shall be allowed in said parks, buildings or grounds nor any obscene or indecent act performed therein.

12.64.080 - Selling wares, food, or services, and collection of funds

It is unlawful for any person to sell or offer for sale any goods, wares, merchandise, foods, confections, refreshments, <u>services</u> or other article, <u>or to collect funds for registration fees, entrance fees, donations, or other collection of money</u> within any public park, <u>public building or public grounds</u> in the city, without the permission of the <u>PRAC or</u> department which has jurisdiction therein.

12.64.090 - Injuring trees and other properties.

12.64.090 - Injuring trees and other properties.

It is unlawful for any person to trespass upon the pick grass of any public park in the city or to pick flowers from the same, or to cut, break or in anywise any way

12.64.100 - Disorderly conduct, vandalism, sleeping on benches, or pilfering.

Disorderly conduct, pilfering, <u>or vandalizing</u>, or sleeping on benches or seats in any public park is strictly prohibited.

12.64.101 - Playgrounds/Play areas.

A. Definitions. For purpose of this section, the following definitions shall apply unless the context indicates or requires a different meaning.

ADULT. A person eighteen (18) years of age or older.

CHILDREN. A person twelve (12) years of age or younger.

PLAYGROUNDS/PLAY AREAS. The area within a city park bounded by signs that identify the designated area as a children's play area pursuant to this section. The Director may designate playground/play areas where the equipment

shall be exclusively used or occupied by persons of a specific age range.

B. It shall be unlawful for any adult to enter or remain in a designated playground/play area, where signage is posted, unless the adult is supervising and/or accompanying child(ren) who is/are then visiting the play area.

C. It shall be unlawful for any person to camp or remain in a designated playground/play area anytime it is not open, including outside park hours, overnight and during construction or renovations.

D. Any person who violates this section shall be subject to the penalties set forth in § Section 1.28.010 – Violations a misdemeanor.

12.64.110 - Hours of use of parks.

The Parks and Recreation Commission may fix the hours during which the parks, or any particular park, is open to public use. No person, other than a city employee in the performance of his or her duty, shall enter or remain in any park during the time when it is not open for public use.

12.64.120 - Park noise regulation.

No person shall operate, or permit the operation of, any sound amplification system (including portable or car audio equipment) so that sound can be heard fifty (50) or more feet away from the source in any park within the city, except upon the issuance of a permit therefor by the Director of Parks, Recreation and Cultural Affairs and payment of the fee specified in the master fee schedule.

Permits issued for the operation of a sound amplification system shall specify the location of any bandstand and the position of each loudspeaker shall be as specified by the said Director so as to minimize, to the extent practicable, the amount of amplified sound to be audible in adjacent residential properties. No loudspeaker shall be permitted to be placed in a public park within three hundred (300) feet of any residential structure. In no event shall a permittee cause amplified sound to exceed eighty (80) decibels at any boundary of the park in which amplified sound is being produced.

Estuary Park and Duck Pond Stage area of Lakeside Park may be exempted from these requirements if and only if the following findings are made by the Director of Parks, Recreation and Cultural Affairs:

12.64.110 - Hours of use of parks.

The Parks and Recreation CommissionPRAC may fix the hours during which the parks, or any particular park, is open to public use and may therein fix hours for certain activities within the parks open hours. No person, other than a city employee in the performance of his or her duty, shall enter or remain in any park during the time when it is not open for public use.

12.64.120 - Park sound regulation.

Persons shall limit the level of sound to play, operate, or permit the operation of, any sound amplification system or non-amplified sound devices including but not limited to portable or car audio equipment, musical instrument, horn, radio, tape recorder or other device for producing or causing any sound from the source of the immediate intended use or purpose and shall not exceed one hundred (100) feet in any park within the city.

Sound in parks for private and special events including music and cultural events and performances shall be regulated as specified in Section 8.18.010–Excessive and annoying noises prohibited and Section 8.18.020–Persistent noise a nuisance with or without a permit from the City.

The PRAC may, in its discretion, restrict park hours in specific parks where sound would unreasonably disturb or damage the comfort, peace, health or safety of persons or businesses.

Refer to Section 12.64.292 for the process of obtaining permits for the operation of any sound amplification system or non-amplified sound devices for private events, special events, and music and cultural events and performances.

C. The applicant has paid all required fees and deposits for the event in question, and has met all additional regulatory requirements which may apply to the event in question.

12.64.130 - Traffic regulations.

It is unlawful for any person to drive or ride within the boundaries of any public park in the city at a rate of speed exceeding fifteen (15) miles per hour, or for any person to ride or drive within the limits of said parks upon any other than the avenues and roads provided therefor, and no wagon or vehicle of burden shall pass through the said parks except upon such road or avenue as shall be designated by the Board of Park Directors for such transportation.

No person shall enter or leave any of said parks except by such gates, roads, paths or avenues as may be for such purpose provided and arranged.

No vehicle for hire shall stand upon any part of any public park in the city for the purpose of hire, except in waiting for persons taken by it into such park, except at such points as may be specially designated by the Board of Park Directors.

12.64.140 - Motor vehicles in parks.

It is unlawful for any person to operate or drive any motorcycle or other motor vehicle in, over or upon an equestrian or pedestrian path or trail or any other portion of any public park in the city except on such roadway or parking area regularly set apart for the use of such motor and other vehicles.

12.64.150 - Washing or repairing motor vehicles in parks

It is unlawful for any person to wash, polish or repair any motor vehicle within any public park area in the city.

12.64.160 - Fires

No person shall be permitted to make or kindle a fire of any kind within any public park in the city except at designated barbecue areas approved by the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission.

It is unlawful for any person to drive or ride within the boundaries of any public park in the city at a rate of speed exceeding fifteen (15) miles per hour, or for any person to ride or drive within the limits of said parks upon any other than the avenues and roads provided therefor, and no wagon or vehicle of burden shall pass through the said parks except upon such road or avenue as shall be designated by the PRAC Board of Park Directors for such transportation.

No person shall enter or leave any of said parks except by such gates, roads, paths or avenues as may be for such purpose provided and arranged.

No vehicle for hire shall stand upon any part of any public park in the city for the purpose of hire, except in waiting for persons taken by it into such park, except at such points as may be specially designated by the <u>PRACBoard of Park Directors</u>.

12.64.140 - MeteryVehicles in parks.

It is unlawful for any person to operate or drive any motorcycle or other motorvehicle in, over or upon an equestrian or pedestrian path or trail or any other portion of any public park in the city except on such roadway or parking area regularly set apart for the use of such motor and other vehicles.

12.64.160 – Fires and barbecues.

A. No person shall be permitted to make or kindle a fire of any kind within any public park in the city except in a device provided or designated by PRAC or the

D. Boats and Boat Races. No person shall be permitted to use the shores of Lake Merritt as a landing place for boats, or keep thereat boats for hire or floating boat houses with pleasure boats for hire, or keep boats of any kind in Lake Merritt, except under a permit from the Recreation Commission for such purpose, and only at places designated by and under restrictions and regulations promulgated by the Board of Park Directors or the Recreation Commission; and no regattas, boat races, or other special events involving the use of Lake Merritt shall take place thereon without permission granted by the Recreation Commission.

12.64.210 - Fishing in Lake Merritt.

D. Injury to Turf. It is unlawful for any person to wilfully or maliciously injure the turf on any golf course.

E. Sales on. It is unlawful for any person to sell golf balls, golf equipment, food, drinks, or other commodities, on the Oakland Municipal Golf Course, or upon any private or public golf course in the city, except pursuant to express permission of the person in charge of the management thereof.

It is unlawful for any person to sell golf balls, golf equipment, food, drinks, or other commodities, or provide golf lessons, on the Oakland Municipal Golf Course, or uponany private or public golf course in the city, except pursuant to express permission of the person in charge of the management thereof.

Article 11. – Park Permits

12.64.250 - Statement of principles.

All parks within the city are held in trust for the use of the public. Included within such use are public assembly, communication of thoughts between citizens and discussion of public questions. These uses of the city's parks are

12.64.270 - Compliance required.

No person shall enter, be or remain in any park of the city unless he or she complies with this article and other provisions of this code.

No use of any park for a private or special event may be made without issuance of a permit therefor. All applications for use of any park must be accompanied by the fee prescribed in the master fee schedule, signed or co-signed by an adult, which adult shall agree to be responsible for said exclusive use. No use permit will be granted, if, prior to the time the application was filed, the city has scheduled a city-sponsored event at the same time and place as the activity proposed in the application.

12.64.280 - Permit required.

No use of any park for a private or special event may be made without issuance of a permit therefor. All applications for use of any park must be accompanied by the fee prescribed in the <u>mMaster fee sSchedule</u>, signed or co-signed by an adult, which adult shall agree to be responsible for said exclusive use. No use permit will be granted, if, prior to the time the application was filed, the city has scheduled a city-sponsored event at the same time and place as the activity proposed in the application.

12.64.290 - Private event park use application.

Any person applying for a private event permit hereunder shall file an application for such permit with the PRCS Central Reservations Unit not less than fifteen (15) working days nor more than eleven (11) months

12.64.290 —Permit for private, picnic and related events. Private event park use application.

Any person applying for a private event permit for a picnic and related event, hereunder shall file an application for such permit with the PRCS OPR Central Reservations Unit not less than fifteen (15) workingthirty (30) days nor more than eleven (11) months prior to the proposed use of said park. The Director may

prior to the proposed use of said park. The Director may waive the fifteen (15) working day period if applicant waives all appeal rights.

12.64.291 - Park use permit for special events.

Any person applying for a park use permit for a special event shal file an application for such permit with the PRCS Central Reservations Unit not less than ninety (90) days nor more than eleven (11) months prior to the proposed use of said park. The Director may waive the ninety (90) day period if the applicant waives all appeal rights.

In addition to applying for a park use permit, the applicant must apply for a special event permit with the Oakland Police Department for approval by the Chief of Police or his designee pursuant to the requirements enumerated in <u>Chapter 9.52</u> of <u>Title 9</u> of the Oakland Municipal Code. However, the Chief of Police, in consultation with the Director of Parks, Recreation and Cultural Services or his or her authorized representative, shall retain the authority to delegate the issuance of special event permits for certain routine events in city parks not likely to result in impacts on the public safety and welfare to the PRCS Central Reservations Unit.

Should the Chief of Police delegate the issuance of OPD special event permits to the Director of PRCS pursuant to this subsection, the Director shall cause PRCS to notify the Oakland Police Department of the issuance of any such permit at least ten (10) working days before the event commences.

12.64.291 - Permit for special events.

Any person applying for a park use permit for a special event shall file an application for such permit with the <u>PRCS-OPR</u> Central Reservations Unit not less than ninety (90) <u>sixty (60)</u> days nor more than eleven (11) months prior to the proposed use of said park. The Director may waive the ninety (90) <u>sixty (60)</u> day period if the applicant waives all appeal rights.

In addition to applying for a park use permit, the applicant must apply for a special event permit with the Oakland Police Department (OPD) for approval by the Chief of Police or her or his designee pursuant to the requirements enumerated in Chapter 9.52 of Title 9 of the Oakland Municipal Code. However, the Chief of Police, in consultation with the Director of Parks, Recreation and Cultural Services or his or her authorized representative, shall retain the authority to delegate the issuance of special event permits for certain routine events in city parks not likely to result in impacts on the public safety and welfare to the PRCS Central Reservations Unit.

Should the Chief of Police delegate the issuance of OPD special event permits to the Director of PRCS pursuant to this subsection, the Director shall cause PRCS to notify the Oakland Police Department of the issuance of any such permit at least ten (10) working days before the event commences.

Estimated number of parking spaces required.

12.64.310 - Action on application for permit.

A. <u>Permits for Private, Picnic, and Related Events</u>. The Director of <u>OPR PRCS</u> shall grant or deny <u>applications for permits</u> for private, <u>picnic or related events</u> on or before fifteen (15) calendar days after the filing of the application unless the time for such granting or denial of the permit has been waived by the applicant in writing.

B. Applications for OPD Permits for Special Events. 12.64.320 - Criteria for issuance of permit.

An application for a park use permit for a private or special event should be granted unless any one or more of the following conditions apply:

B. That the applicant has made no provision for temporary toilet facilities as required in this article;

C. That the applicant has made no provision for crowd control monitors as required in this article;

 D. That the applicant has made no provision for cleanup services as required in this article;

E. That the applicant has refused to agree in writing to comply with the regulations for the use of parks as provided for in this code or has failed to provide a reasonable means of informing all persons participating in the proposed activity of the regulations;

B. Applications for OPD Permits for Special Events. The Chief of Police or his designee shall grant or deny applications for special events in parks pursuant to Title 9, Chapter 9.52 of the Oakland Municipal Code.

Nothing precludes the Chief from delegating to the Director of PRCS this authority pursuant to Section 12.64.291, in which case the Director shall approve, conditionally approve, or deny the application no later than fifteen (15) calendar days after the filing of a complete application. The Director shall grant or deny applications for permits for musical or other entertainment on or before fifteen (15) days after the filing of the application unless the time for such granting or denial of the permit has been waived by the applicant in writing.

12.64.320 - Criteria for issuance of permit.

An application for a park use A permit for a private picnic or related events, special events or musical or other entertainment events should be granted unless any one or more of the following conditions apply:

A. That a permit has been granted for the same park and on the same day and time for which the application in question pertains;

B. That the applicant has made no provision for temporary toilet facilities as required in this article;

C. That the applicant has made no provision for crowd control monitors as required in this article;

D. That the applicant has made no provision for cleanup services as required in this article;

E. That the applicant has refused to agree in writing to comply with the regulations for the use of parks as provided for in this code or has failed to provide a reasonable means of informing all persons participating in the proposed activity of the regulations;

F. That the applicant has refused to execute the indemnification agreement provided for in this article;

- I. That the proposed activity involves the sale of goods, wares, merchandise, foods, confections, refreshments, or other articles, and the permission of the Director has not been secured, as required by Section 12.64.080
- J. That the applicant has not secured a certificate of insurance as provided for in this article if insurance is required for the proposed activity.

K. For a park use permit for special event. That the applicant has not filed an application with the Police Department for a special event permit as defined in Title 9, Chapter 9.52

12.64.330 - Right of appeal.

For a permit application to hold a special event in a park, the reconsideration process as provided for in <u>Title 9</u>, Article 9.52.90 shall apply, whether the decision from which the appeal is taken is made by the Chief or by the Director of PRCS pursuant to <u>Section 12.64.291</u>.

An applicant whose application for a park use permit for a private event has been denied or any person claiming to be adversely affected by the issuance of a park use permit for a private event may appeal the decision within five working days of the decision. The appeal shall be heard before the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission (PRAC) pursuant to the hearing and appeals process adopted by that body. The decision of the PRAC shall be final.

Upon receipt of such appeal, the Director shall set the appeal at the next available Park and Recreation Advisory Commission meeting

- H. That the applicant has not secured a charitable solicitation permit as provided for in Chapter 5.18 of this code, if such permit is required thereby for the proposed activity;
- I. That the proposed activity involves the sale of goods, wares, merchandise, foods, confections, refreshments, or other articles, and the permission of the PRAC or department Director has not been secured, as required by Section 12.64.080;
- J. That the applicant has not secured a certificate of insurance as provided for in this article if insurance is required for the proposed activity.
- K. For a park use permit for special event. That the applicant has not filed an application with the Police Department for a special event permit as defined in Title 9, Chapter 9.52.
- L. The applicant has a prior history of events in parks which include verified, unresolved complaints of excessive noise, or poor security and crowd control and/or poor parking control.

12.64.330 - Right of appeal.

For a permit application to hold a special event in a park, the reconsideration process as provided for in Title 9, Article 9.52.90 shall apply, whether the decision from which the appeal is taken is made by the Chief or by the Director of PRCS pursuant to Section 12.64.291.

An applicant whose application for a permit for a private event <u>or musical or other entertainment</u> has been denied or any person claiming to be adversely affected by the issuance of a park use permit for a private event <u>or musical or other entertainment</u> may appeal the decision within five working days of the decision. The appeal shall be heard before the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission (PRAC) pursuant to the hearing and appeals process adopted by that body. The decision of the PRAC shall be final.

Upon receipt of such appeal, the Director shall set the appeal at the next available Park and Recreation Advisory Commission PRAC meeting. The

12.64,410 - Administrative Regulations

The City Administrator is hereby authorized to adopt rules and regulations consistent with this chapter as needed to implement this chapter, subject to the review and approval of the Office of the City Attorney, and to develop all related forms and/or other materials and take other steps as needed to implement this chapter, and make such interpretations of this chapter as he or she may consider necessary to achieve the purposes of this chapter.

12.60.020 - Bicycle operation rules—Violation—Penalty.

It is unlawful to operate a bicycle on any trailwithin the city in an unsafe, reckless, dangerous or negligent manner. No person shall operate a bicycle in a City park in excess of fifteen (15) miles per hour, nor in excess of five miles per hour when passing pedestrians or equestrians or when approaching and negotiating a blind turn, nor at a greater speed thenthan is reasonable or prudent. Within city parks, bicyclists can ride on named designated paths and trails only and are prohibited from operating bicycles off-trail. Bicyclists must obey all posted signs and rules. Bicyclists must yield and call out by voice or bell when passing pedestrians, or other bicyclists, and must keep right except to pass and then must pass to the left if practicable.
